WASHINGTON, D. C.-(NEA)-Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal has promised his next press conference an historic answer to the embarrassing question, "Are you a candidate for the Vice Presidency and would you run if nominated by the Democratic convention?"

The word has leaked out that the Secretary's secretaries are having a tough time trying to think up the right answer to that \$64 nifty. In the interest of trying to be helpful, it therefore becomes a duty and a privilege for anyone having construc-tive ideas on this subject to send in suggestions and help get the Hon. Secretary out of the Hon. hole. For some strange reason, public officials who are painfully, stubbornly sure of themselves on most issues, become tongue-tied and club-footed, and







