AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 24-"The waste of life due to traffic accidents is to prevent the accident," reads a warning issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Offi-

"It is not a question of who is happen merely because of 'bad cidents be avoided.' - there is a definite cause for every one of them, although it is not possible to deermine the precise origin of every mishap.

"Leaders of the safety move ment agree that the most fundaapproach to the solution lies in the education and training of the individual. Safety educaincludes the training of indiiduals to avoid accidents to themelves and to prevent accidents to thers. It involves the acquisition of a certain fund of information, the ability to apply this informaon to concrete situations, and the building up of habits which will make the application of knowledge to situations automatic.
