### Cutting Horse Entries Horse New Forty-Six

FORT WORTH, Jan. 21 — Forty-six cutting horses from Wyoming, New Mexico, Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas are entered in the cutting horse competition to be held at the 1948 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show here, Jan. 30 through Feb. 6.

A former cutting horse champion, two former cutting horse champion riders and a grand champion Quarter horse will compete. Emory Birdwell of Grafard, who won the 1946 and 1947 contests here riding "Boots," will ride a new horse named "Scarber" this year. "Boots" was sold shortly before the 1947 show to Don Dodger of Oakland, Cal., for \$2,000.

Fern Sawyer of Crossroads, N. M., will ride her cutting horse "Belen." She took championship honors on "Belen" here in 1944 and at Denver the same year. E. P. Waggoner of Fort Worth has entered "Poco Bueno," grand champion Quarter horse here in 1946 and in Denver in 1947. Time Johnson will be up.

Switching from squad car to cutting horse, Ray Hyatt, police chief of Tulsa, Ok., will ride his horse, "Ponco," in the contests.

The 21 horses making the highest score in the preliminary elimination to be held Jan. 30 at 8 a. m. will compete four at a time in three go-rounds during the show. The four top scorers in the go-rounds will show in the finals at the rodeo night performance Feb. 8. Go-round scores plus final scores will determine the grand champion.

The most recent addition to the collection was the poem "Main Street." On the back of the poem are the family notes, "copy paper for Alenice, three yards of white batiste," and the notation, "35 or 40 a yard."

One poem, "The Thorn" is written in pencil on the stationery of a hotel, and another poem, "Grace Before Drinking" is written on a memo pad.

The manuscripts were donated to the university collection after they were purchased from Henry Watts, New York.

Watts, a co-worker of Kilmer's on the now defunct Literary Digest, asked Kilmer for the manuscripts as souvenirs after Kilmer

threatened to throw them away. Kilmer was shot and killed by a German sniper while serving in the Army during World War I.
