We were confronted with a deep dark mystery this morning and while the mystery has been solved, it brought forth a warning from Postmaster T. E. Crawley.

Billy has improved slowly with his treatments. They have helped him in his walking, but not enough to prevent him from another operation. Dr. Murphy will operate on his left foot and leg in June. The muscles which control his toes are paralyzed and his toes are drawing up under his foot, so surgery is the only thing left. The mechanical therapy treatments did some good but not enough to release his toes.  
Billie doesn't seem to mind having to go through the operation and casts again, he likes his "doctor very much and is so willing to try again. It seems like an endless process, but it's surely worth fighting for.

### SOIL CONSERVATION FILM TO BE SHOWN HERE FEB. 7

An urgent invitation to farmers and land owners of this section is given by R. S. Dudley, Jr., instructor of the Veterans' Vocational agriculture class in Ranger, to see soil conservation films at the Columbia theatre in Ranger Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.

Still pictures will also be shown which were taken in Eastland County and illustrate the effects of soil erosion here at home. The picture is being shown by Mr. Reeves of Rising Star, director of the Upper Leon River Soil Conservation district.

"Raindrops and Soil Erosion" is the name of an important film produced by the Soil Conservation Service and scheduled to be shown here at 10:00 A.M., Feb. 7, at the Columbia theatre.

Raindrops have such an explosive action when they hit bare earth that soil is thrown two and three feet into the air. It is this "churning action" that is causing our serious soil erosion, rather than the runoff water from the fields and pastures. The show clearly demonstrates that it is the force of the falling raindrops that tears the soil particles loose and keeps them in suspension while the runoff water transports the muddy water downhill into the streams.

"Raindrops and Soil Erosion" is a documentary film of such importance that every farmer and rancher should see it, not once, but two or three times, in order to understand the true nature of his soil erosion problem, and to evaluate the erosion control measures used.

Results of several demonstrations are shown in the film that indicates that a canopy of vegetation, trees, or trashy mulch, is essential to an effective erosion control program. A dense cover of grass, for instance, breaks the force of the falling raindrops, and the water readily penetrates the soil, whereas, on unprotected soils, the raindrops hit with a high velocity causing the soil to puddle and seal itself so that a high runoff is obtained.

"Raindrops and Soil Erosion" will be presented by the Work Unit Staff of the Soil Conservation Service at Rising Star and the Eastland County Veterans' Vocational School. Additional slides of local scenes and practices will be presented along with a discussion period after the show.

Admission to the show will be

free and all farmers and business men are urged to attend. You cannot afford to miss this opportunity, said Dudley.

### Black Market In Farm Machinery Is Revealed

CHICAGO—Farm machinery manufacturers said today that despite their efforts to wipe it out, there is a flourishing black market in tractors, combines and other urgently needed farm equipment.

Manufacturers said black market sales usually are made by farmers and individuals over whom they have no control. Many farmers, they said, have sold slightly used tractors to other farmers at prices \$1,000 or more above the manufacturers list price.

The farm equipment makers said they would tell their story of the black market to the House agriculture committee in Washington next week. Rep. Clifford Hoje, R. Kans., committee chairman, announced yesterday that the committee would begin public hearings on the farm black market, Feb. 10.

### War Criminal Takes Own Life

NUERNBERG—Field Marshal Johannes Blaskowitz, former German commander in Netherlands indicted as a war criminal, has committed suicide by leaping over a guard rail outside his cell in Nuernberg jail, it was announced today.

American authorities said Blaskowitz leaped 30 feet into the courtyard of Nuernberg prison last night and died in the hospital today from multiple injuries including a crushed chest.

The jump was made just before Blaskowitz was scheduled to go on trial for war crimes with 14 other top Nazi leaders.

### Albany Fire Takes One Life

ALBANY—One fireman was killed, four business buildings were badly damaged and publication was interrupted on the morning Albany Times-Union in a fire today which caused an estimated \$250,000 damage.

The fire started shortly after midnight in the basement of one of four adjoining buildings occupied by the Alfred Equipment Co. The fireman Emil Durant, was crushed to death between a fire engine and an aerial ladder.

### Mississippi To Lead Revolt

JACKSON, Miss.—Gov. Fielding L. Wright today dedicated Mississippi to the leadership of the Southern revolt against President Truman's civil rights program and called a public meeting on the birthday of Abraham Lincoln to plan an all-out fight to "preserve Southern traditions."

### Social Worker Appeals For Aid To Needy Family

Miss Elsie Glenn, Social Worker, Ranger, today requested this paper to voice her appeal for a destitute Ranger family, which does not fall within the scope of her agency. The family is composed of a widow, an 18 year old boy who is the sole support of his family and who makes very little, a 12 year old boy, a 9 year old boy, and a boy 6 year old.

The family is not asking for food or financial support. The small amount they have is simply not enough to buy the necessities of life and clothing, too, and Miss Glenn is asking that the citizens of Ranger assist in outfitting the family.

The social worker asked particularly that no old or used clothes be given to the family. They have rag and cast offs and are in desperate need of new clothing," she said.

Sizes of the family are given as follows: the mother, size 46, the 18 year old boy; trousers 33, 33, shirts, size 16; the 12 year old boy wears size 14 clothes, and the 9 year old boy, size 9 and the 6 year old boy, size 6.

Miss Glenn asks that all donations of new clothing be left this week at the Ranger City Hall and further request that all clothing needs of the family be met not later than Friday, February 9th.

"I wish to thank the public in advance for this kindness, since I feel sure Ranger will not fail to respond to one of our rare calls for the needy of this community," Miss Glenn stated.

### County Livestock Show Promises To Be One Of Best

"The annual Eastland County Livestock Show to be held at Cisco on February 27 and 28 promises to be the best livestock show ever held in the county under present plans," N. E. Fry, Cisco, president of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association said today.

Fry, prominent noted hereford breeder of Eastland, Callahan and Brown Counties, was re-elected as President of the Livestock organization last October to serve for a second term.

The organization headed by Fry and the Cisco Junior Chamber of Commerce annually sponsor the county show held on the show grounds on the outskirts of Cisco. A large barn was erected for that purpose by the Cisco Livestock Show Association in 1946.

More FFA and 4-H Club calves pigs, lambs and dairy cattle are expected to be shown this year to compete for the \$500.00 in cash prizes. Adults will compete for ribbons only except in the championship awards.

There are no entry fees to the show. Animals from Eastland and all adjoining counties are eligible to compete. Only Eastland County boys animals can participate in the auction to be held on Saturday afternoon, February 28, it was pointed out.

The show animals must be in their places by 10 o'clock a.m. on February 27 and remain until 5 p.m. on February 28, Sutton Crofts, Supt. of show, said.

Plans are also under way for a much bigger horse show this year than in 1947, according to show officials.

### Classes At Police Schools Are Being Well Attended

Sheriff J. B. Williams stated this morning that the Police School being held in Eastland for three weeks under the direction of Wallace Beasley and under the sponsorship of the A&M College in co-operation with the State Board of Vocational Education, got off to a good start yesterday morning. Twelve or more officers were present and a still larger number were on hand for classes this morning.

Classes are being conducted Monday's through Friday's from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. They are being held in the county courtroom at the Eastland county court house.

### Columbus, Ohio Has \$500,000 Fire

COLUMBUS, O.—A general alarm fire destroyed a warehouse in the downtown area here early today with an estimated loss of \$500,000 to the one-story building that contained 82 trucks and buses and merchandise scheduled for delivery.

The spectacular fire in the garage of the Retail Merchants Delivery, Inc., was punctuated by exploding gas tanks and short-circuited horns blaring on the burning vehicles.

### TEXAS SLATED FOR FALLING TEMPERATURE

Snow was falling in the Texas Panhandle early today, as the cloudy skies and rain continued over the rest of the state for the fourth straight day.

An inch of snowfall was reported at Pampa and Amarillo in the Panhandle, while Lubbock, on the South Plains, received a 42 inch rain, the heaviest in the state.

A light drizzle was reported along the Gulf Coast and rain in the central portion of the state.

The weather man promised no respite from the soupy weather before Saturday. Forecasts called for occasional rain in North and Northwest Texas, where sleet or snow was expected.

Colder temperatures were slated for all of Texas tonight and Friday except along the coast. The falling mercury, however, would not be due to a renewed cold front according to weather bureau reports.

The bureau attributed the approaching cold to "a strong north-easterly circulation off a high pressure area in the north," a breakthrough from the cold wave which has swept the northern states.

Freezing temperatures were expected in North Texas tonight, with readings in the thirties tomorrow. Cloudy skies and rain were to continue.

### Tivis Tomlin Said Still In Serious Condition

Tivis Tomlin, who was cut twice with a knife in an altercation at Cisco Tuesday night, was reported this morning as being still in a serious condition. He is at a Cisco hospital where he was rushed following his receiving the wounds.

S. B. (Buster) Bells, charged in Justice of the Peace Henry Stubblefield's court at Cisco, with assault with intent to murder in connection with the wounding of Tomlin, has posted bond in the case in the amount of \$2,500, Sheriff J. B. Williams told the Eastland Telegram this morning.

Bells chose however to remain in custody and in the jail, at least for the present, Sheriff Williams said.

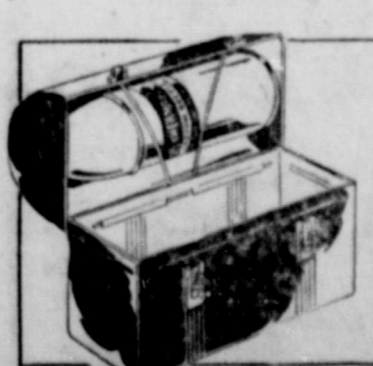

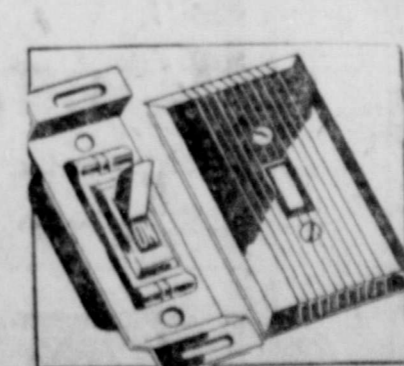

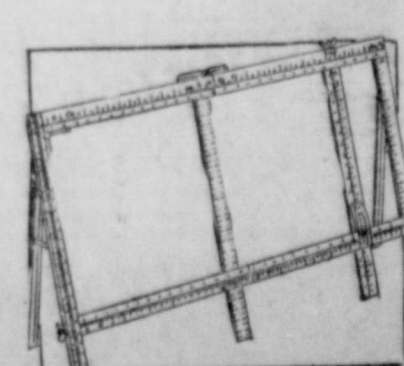

### Sound Waves Used To Kill Pests

LOS ANGELES (UP)—An operation for the destruction of mice and insects by sound was described by Dr. Isadore Rudnick, Pennsylvania State College, at the annual meeting of the Acoustical Society of America.

Dr. Rudnick told of experiments, conducted jointly with Clayton H. Allen and Hubert Frings, in which powerful ultrasonic waves were used to kill mice, cockroaches, yellow fever mosquitos, blowflies, firebats, mealworms and caterpillars.

Sound waves, 10,000 times more intense than the pain level of the human ear, were directed at a range of a few inches and produced death by heat and vibration, Dr. Rudnick said.

### Retired Pastor To Bless Fishermen

SEATTLE (UP)—The Rev. O. L. Haavik has ended more than 26 years in the pastorate of the Ballard Lutheran Church here.

The nationally-known Fishermen's Festival—in which fishermen moving out to the banks from the Port of Seattle were blessed and prayers said for their safety and a good catch—was instituted by the Rev. Mr. Haavik in 1929.

Haavik said although he will no longer step up to the pulpit he will continue to officiate at the Fishermen's Festival.

It is probable that human beings could be killed by the same method if a sufficiently large sound beam could be created, he reported.

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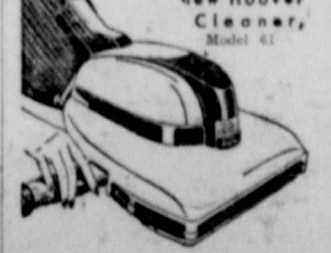

# FOUR SPECIAL OFFERS MADE TO VETERANS

The U. S. Army today offers four special opportunities to veterans of any of the Armed Services, according to S-Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station.

These opportunities are:  
1. Former servicemen with overseas service may enlist directly in one of 8 Army units stationed in the United States, and be guaranteed 3 years of service with the unit. Veterans who join these units will help build up the defensive strength of the Army within the Zone of the Interior and will help train new recruits.  
2. Veterans with or without overseas service can enlist direct-

ly for service in the European Theater, or can choose any one of five famed divisions now stationed in Japan. These units, which won combat laurels during World War II are the 6th, 7th, 24th, and 25th Infantry Divisions and the 11th Airborne.

3. Because the Army is an Army of technicians, men with technical experience can enlist in a non-commissioned grade based on their prior training and experience-up to technical sergeant. More than 200 different skills and trades are employed by the Army.

4. Veterans who are high school graduates, or who can pass an equivalent examination, may choose their own type of training and work in the Army. Prior to Enlisting, they can select any one of 60 or more technical courses and then be guaranteed assignment to one of the schools teaching these courses.

## Shelled Peanut Prices Remain Fairly Steady

Shelled peanut prices strengthened slightly in the Southwestern states and held firm in the Southeast during the past week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Although demand for shelled peanuts continued dull, mills offered very few above requirements for seed stock. Under Southeastern rules, shelled No. 1, Spanish sold at 16 3/4 to 17 cents a pound in carlots, with good delivery bringing 16 1/2-2 cents. Southwestern shellers quoted No. 1's at 16 3/4 to 17 cents.

## Winter Mushrooms Out All Over



Chicago's shoreline presents an unusual winter pattern, as a row of pilings become covered with ice during a sub-zero spell. The pilings gracefully follow the sweep of Lake Michigan against a backdrop of gloomy winter skies and smooth water.

Peanut meal and oil declined along with most other oilseed meals and oils. Southwestern crushers quoted prime crude oil of five per cent refining loss at 26 1/2 to 27 cents a pound, and 41 per cent meal as low as \$93 in carlots.

Small remaining supplies of farmers' stock peanuts moved gradually into trade channels at Commodity Credit Corporation support prices. The support level of 90 per cent of parity will be continued for another year, it has been announced, and will be based on the parity price as of July 15, 1948. The 1948 peanut acreage goal of 2,839,000 acres for the nation, announced February 3, is more than a half-million acres less than farmers harvested for nuts last year.

## SOUTHWESTERN BELL PUTS IN NEW SERVICE

New, Modern Equipment Ties Rural Subscribers Into Local Exchange

Three major telephone construction projects are bringing telephone service to 117 rural families in the vicinity of Eastland according to C. A. Deuschle, manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company here. These projects, two of which have been completed, are being installed at a gross cost of \$45,000, Deuschle said.

One of the construction projects, completed last year, brought up-to-date rural service to several families west of Eastland, along the Cisco highway. A second project now is serving 25 families south and southeast of town, along highway 6 while another, extending north to the Morton Valley area, eventually will connect a large number of additional telephones in that section. About 110 of the new instruments now are in service.

The size and extent of the job is evidenced by the large amount of telephone equipment which is necessary to bring the service to rural telephone users in the Eastland trade territory, Deuschle pointed out.

"When completed, there will be 250 miles of new wire in place, and three miles of cable, strung on 1,300 new poles," the telephone manager said. "It was necessary to build 60 miles of new pole line, and the completed project will serve a total of 139 rural users in United States increased 30 per cent area comprising about 125 square miles around Eastland, increased less than five per cent."

Those who use the new system are enjoying a new and improved type of service, the manager declared. Using a new long-span type of construction with high-strength steel wire, which permits 300 to 400 feet between poles the new service is carried over quiet, two-wire lines.

Telephones connected to the new system are modern, "lift-the-receiver" type instruments, and there are no cranks to turn. There is a maximum of eight parties on each line, and due to "divided" ringing, each user hears only three rings in addition to his own.

When completed, this section will have "area-wide" coverage—which means that anyone in this vicinity, living outside the city, can have a telephone if he wants one.

About 20,000 such telephones have been installed in rural homes in Texas since the end of the war Deuschle reported, at a gross estimated cost of \$5,000,000. This year the program will be stepped up still faster, he said, and plans are to install an additional 20,000 this year alone, at a gross estimated cost of \$6,000,000.

"The 117 rural telephones in the Eastland trade territory are a part of our overall program to provide good telephone service to everyone who wants it in the towns and rural district we serve throughout the state," Deuschle said.

The 1947 enrollment in boys 4-H clubs in the state reached an all-time high of 42,350, and broke in several fields, reports W. Potts, boys' 4-H club leader and Texas A. & M. College, in his annual report.

The livestock business of 4-H club boys in Texas has been a four million dollar business, and sold during the year for a total sale price of \$1,493,204, 9,897 pounds were sold for \$204,279, sheep brought in \$108,461 and try and ewe sales totaled \$241,111.

"In this summary," Potts points out, "there are hundreds of individual stories of failures as well as success, but every 4-H club member is better educated, whether he's in the red or black side of the books at the end of the year."

In addition to the individual marketing of livestock, 537 boys and 192 local leaders went to market with group shipments of hogs, sheep and beef calves. Sales

amounted to \$299,253. More than 5,000 acres of land were covered by demonstrations of the production of cotton, corn, sorghum, beans, legumes, and truck crops.

### Water Facilities Program Financed By FHA Says Lane

Farmers who are interested in providing improved facilities for their farms and are unable to arrange for funds elsewhere may take advantage of the types of assistance available through Water Facilities loans of the Farmers Home Administration, County Supervisor George I. Lane stated today. These loans, Mr. Lane pointed out, may be used to construct, repair, rehabilitate, restate or enlarge farmstead facilities and also include such items as reservoirs, dams, ponds, wells, cisterns, pipelines for distribution to points where needed, storage tanks, stock water tanks and spring development.

The Water Facilities program is a rather broad one and under the provisions of Public Law 399, not only provides Federal funds for loans, but technical assistance to individuals, such as planning of the facility to be installed, and advice and guidance about planning and carrying out farm and home operations relating to the facility. Somebody has coined a phrase,

"Running water is the first requirement of successful farming." He might have added that a better water supply spells the difference between success and failure on many a farm. A survey of farms equipped with adequate water reveals increased livestock and food production, and a safe supply of drinking water for the home, and this spells better health conditions.

A farmstead water system to be effective and efficient must be as modern as the new farm buildings or mechanized equipment to increase production on the farm. Farmers are learning the rope and bucket or hand pump are inadequate to serve their needs.

Farmers who desire information on an improved water system such as may be provided through the Farmers Home Administration Water Facilities program may consult with County Supervisor George I. Lane at his office on the 2nd floor of the Eastland National Bank Building, Eastland.

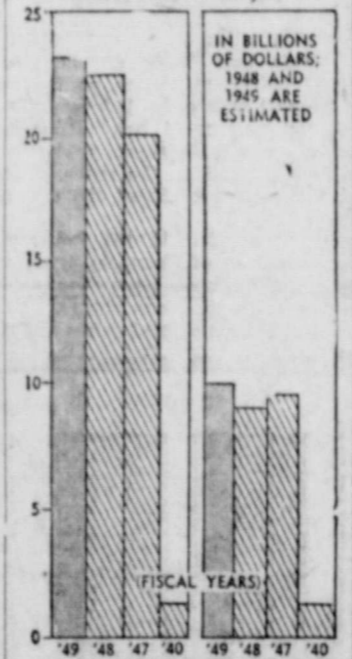
