### U. S. Recognition Of Israel Due

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (UP) -Covernment quarters said today the United States will grant full diplomatic recognition Israel immediately following next week's Israel elections.

These sources cited the Export-Import Bank's authorization esterday of a \$100,000,000 (M) oan to the new state as evidence that the last barriers to full "de jure" recognition are down.

The United States gave interim recognition to Israel last May 14, the day the state was created. President Truman indicated in November that this government would consider estanding fullscale recognition as soon as a permanet government was elected. The Israeli elections a r scheduled for Jan. 25.

American experts on Palestine are convinced that after the election, Israel will become mgre closely associated with the Western Decocracies. WASHINGTON, Jan. 20-(UP) - Harry S. Truman was sworn in as president at 12:29 P. M., EST today, and Alben W. Barkley was sworn in as vice president at 12:23 P. M

Truman, Missouri's man of destiny, knelt in solemn prayer today before riding to Capitol Hill and taking the oath as President of the United States.

This happiest - and greatest - day in the life of Mr. Truman started on a happy augury. The weather was perfect for mid-winter - clear skies and above-freezing temperatures.

The President's inaugural day began unusually early even for the early-rising President. He was up at 5:30 A. M., EST, and at 7 A. M., he joined his World War I buddies in rollicking songs at breakfast.
