

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (UP)-Landlords "striking" against rent controls today faced a threat of possible court action.

Rent Director Tighe E. Woods said mass withdrawls of homes from the rental market may not be in good faith and within the law. He indicated he would take court action to prevent wholsesale evictions if he determines after a thorough study that the withdrawls are illegal.

Members of the Tulsa Owners Association started the wholessale eviction furor when they began distributing 60-day eviction notices. Landlords in other large cities say they may follow suit.

Cabinet Studies Confidence Vote

LONDON Jan. 27 (UP)-Prime Misister Clement Attlee called his cabinet into session today to consider how badly the labor government's prestige was damaged when the opposition demanded a vote of confidence on foreign policy pertaining to Palestine.

The government won the vote, the first demanded on foreign policy since it took office in 1945,

Churchill accused Bevin of lacking sufficient manliness to announ ce the recognition of Israel.

Attlee defended Bevin's handling of the Palestine situation, which Churchill-asserted had been bungled, and accepted Churchill's challenge for a vote of confidence. He said the vote for adjournment would be a vote of confidence in the labor government.

The debate disclosed that both Conservatives and Liberals, as well as some members of the Labor Party itself, were opposed to Bevin's Palestine policy.

Reports swept the House before the vote that the government's majority might be reduced to 20 or 30, or that the government might even be defeated and forced to re-
