## Nationalists Glum Over Peace Outlook

Two odd weather incidents—the woman who had to call the police force to free her when she discovered yesterday morning that ice had formed on the outside of her doors and window sashers completely imprisoning her.

She called the desk sergeant and reported, "All the doors to my house are frozen, and I can't get out," she reported breathlessly.

"Why don't you crawl out a window?" asked the sergeant.

"I can't," said the distraught woman. "We have outside shutters and they are frozen too." The overworked sergeant scratched his head. "Did you try pouring hot water around the door jams?"

"... and ruin my carpet?" the voice asked.

The sergeant gave up, and radioed orders to a squad car to free the woman out.

Three minutes later they did.

Then there was the pale pilot that reported that the temperature over Dallas was 60 degrees at 4,000 feet elevation—and another who reported about the same over Wichita Falls.

The right men, the next time the wife gives you that pep talk about your sagging posture, you can scorn her theory and advice.

A specialist in Chicago made the statement today that the average American male with a slight hunch and rounded back is healthier than the muscular male.

To quote the specialist: "A slight slouch and a protruding rear prepares a person for action. That way, he said, a man lives longer because he saves energy by being ready for sudden changes of movement.

Your so-called perfect posture, Adonis is less efficient because he isn't ready for action, he said.

A man might look good standing erect but he couldn't do much good looking prey, he said.

Men with slight slouches have better blood circulation because a rigid, too erect position interferes with circulation, he said.

But too much of a slouch develops a cramped abdomen and chest. And also interferes with circulation, he warned.

Soldiers are obliged to march in straight parade positions but they wouldn't fight well in that posture.

The men that won the war were average men with average postures, he said.

Besides that there's another doctor in San Antonio who told a medical meeting that "a man's got a right to cry when he's feeling down-hearted without being called a sissy."

And to quote this doctor: "a man should sob without restraint instead of trying to hide his grief. By covering up his tears, man has caused himself unnecessary suffering," the doctor said.

"Don't be ashamed of crying," he advised. "If you're happy, laugh. In grief, cry. You have tear glands and should use them."

**Leading Texas Democrat Dies**

Wichita Falls, Jan. 27. (UP)—Bert King, who fought to preserve Texas for Roosevelt Democrats, in 1944, died suddenly yesterday in a barber shop near his office.

The fiery, 64-year-old attorney suffered a heart attack and was pronounced dead a few minutes later.

King had been a prominent Wichita Falls Democrat for 30 years and in 1940 was a representative at the national convention.

He became Baylor County Attorney in 1912, the year he was graduated from the University of Texas law school. Then he served as Baylor County Judge before moving to Wichita Falls in 1918. King had been ill for a week.

### Rent Controls May Bring On Big Struggle

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27. (UP)—Landlords "striking" against rent controls today faced a threat of possible court action.

Rent Director Tighe E. Woods said mass withdrawals of homes from the rental market may not be in good faith and within the law. He indicated he would take court action to prevent wholesale evictions if he determines after a thorough study that the withdrawals are illegal.

Members of the Tulsa Owners Association started the wholesale eviction furor when they began distributing 60-day eviction notices. Landlords in other large cities say they may follow suit.

Woods discussed court action in a radio broadcast last night (Mutual). He said it is "questionable" whether landlords "who band together" to withdraw their property from the market are acting "in good faith."

The present rent law says that landlords can withdraw their property, provided they are acting in good faith. Such property, once withdrawn, cannot be rented again while rent controls are in effect.

Woods said that if he finds the landlords are not acting in good faith, he "will petition the courts to restrain any such wholesale evictions." Earlier, the rent director had said he was powerless to prevent them.

The CIO national housing committee yesterday urged Woods to seek injunctions to stop the evictions.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D., La., predicted that the "Tulsa plan" would "boomerang" and result in stiffer eviction controls in the new rent legislation.

### MORE FREEZING RAIN IN STORE FOR WEST TEXAS

Power and telephone linemen worked feverishly today to restore communications and electric service to North Texas cities, as the weather man promised relief from one of the most severe ice storms in recent years.

The mercury was expected to climb above the freezing mark in the north central Texas area, where several cities were without power and numerous towns had interrupted communications yesterday. The ice storm in that region was believed at an end.

More freezing rain was seen, however, for the extreme north-west portion of East Texas, and in West Texas from the Pecos Valley eastward. Rising temperatures were forecast for both East and West Texas tomorrow.

The lowest temperature in the state early today was 21 at Clarendon. The warmest spot was Galveston, with 50 degrees.

Two inches of snow had fallen in Amarillo since midnight. The lowest temperature there was 26. More snow was expected in the Panhandle and South Plains today.

At least two persons were killed in traffic accidents as a result of the ice storm. Leslie D. Buron, 21 died Tuesday night in Roscoe as a result of a collision during a sleet storm, and Mrs. Josephine C. Luethner, 66, of Pecos, Ill., was killed near Monahan when an automobile overturned on icy pavement.

### Carnegie Award To El Paso Man

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 27. (UP)—An El Paso, Texas, man today was among 13 persons awarded bronze medals for heroism by the Carnegie hero fund commission.

Willbur D. Calhoun, Sr., Route 2, Sunset Drive, El Paso, was given the award for saving a three-year-old child's life July 15, 1947.

Calhoun, a locomotive fireman, was credited with saving Gloria Cedillos from being killed by a train at El Paso without regard for his personal safety.

The child wandered on a track and fell on a rail while a locomotive pulling cars was backing.

Calhoun swung from the locomotive cab unaided and put one foot on a draw bar as the engine, moving at a speed of 15 miles, neared the child.

He pivoted and jumped three and one-half feet to a foot-board eight inches above the rail, squatted, and without holding to any support, leaped forward and knocked Gloria off the track.

In doing so he had to jump clear of the train as he could not steady himself. The child received a minor laceration while Calhoun sustained wrenched shoulder muscles.

Three of the awards established by the late Andrew Carnegie were awarded posthumously.

### Dr. Boswell Slightly Hurt In Fall Today

Dr. G. C. Boswell suffered minor injuries this morning when he slipped and fell on the ice and was sent to the hospital for treatment and then taken to his home where he remained through the day.

In the fall he suffered a cut on the face and a blow to the eye. After an examination it was felt that no more serious injury had resulted. He stated this afternoon that the only "causality" was his glasses which were broken in the fall.

### School To Be Resumed Friday

It was announced today that classes in all Ranger schools and Ranger Junior College will be resumed Friday morning at the regular hour and students are asked to take note of the announcement.

The schools have been closed since Tues. at noon because of the weather and since indications are that it will have moderated some today and tomorrow, it was felt that classes could be resumed.

In making the announcement Dr. G. C. Boswell, superintendent, stated that work is being resumed Friday in order that classes for the second semester may get into full swing Monday without any delay or confusion.

### March of Dimes Work Progresses

Mrs. J. A. Bates, Ranger chairman of the March of Dimes, stated today that while the weather has slowed the drive in Ranger to some extent that work is still progressing.

She said that the special gifts committee is at work and that the American Legion is preparing to give a benefit dance Saturday night.

Mrs. Bates stated that just as soon as the weather will permit a concerted drive will be made to bring the March of Dimes to a close in Ranger.

### Capital City To Hold Military Ball

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 27. (UP)—Plans for the biggest military ball held in this capital city since the close of the war were announced today by Col. W. C. Wilkes, chairman of the dance committee.

Wilkes said the ball, to be held Feb. 16, will highlight the local observance of national security week and be co-sponsored by the Austin Armed Forces Luncheon Club and the Austin chapter of the Reserve Officers Association.

### Rotary Club Leads District In Attendance

The Ranger Rotary Club scored another 100 per cent attendance record Wednesday and at the same meeting received word that the Ranger club topped the district in attendance during December when the five meetings in the month each drew the full membership of the club.

H. C. Henderson, president, pledged the club to a continued effort in the attendance goal.

J. E. Ervin was in charge of the program and presented Dr. G. C. Boswell who spoke on various points in the Glimmer-Eakin education proposals soon to go before the Texas Legislature.

Dr. Boswell pointed out that the proposed legislation in the report has good and not so good features. He discussed the issue from the standpoint of teachers pay, elective or appointed state superintendent of schools and the state board of education and the per capita allotment to Texas schools.

It was voted at the meeting to join the Lions Club in a meeting on Feb. 24 when W. E. Lowery of the state board of vocational education will speak.

Nanking, Jan. 27.—(UP)—Nationalist Government officials were pessimistic today over the possibilities of formal peace with the Communists as a result of the Communist demand that "war criminals" be turned over for punishment.

The cabinet considered the Communist demand during an emergency session last night and decided against replying because the demand was made by a new China news agency commentator and not by an official Communist spokesman.

The Government pinned its hopes for peace on the possibility that Communists leader Mao Tze-Tung would issue an official statement giving a yes or no answer to the Government's request for a peace conference.

Communist armed pressure against Nanking increased meanwhile. Military quarters reported that a Communist scout troop of 100 men attempted to cross the Yangtze River in junks at a point 32 miles northeast of Nanking. These sources said the group was driven back.

Other reports from Hangchow, 150 miles southeast of Nanking, said Nationalist troops estimated at 100,000 still were arriving there from the Yangtze Valley and Nanking area.

The ultimate destination of this force was unknown. It was assumed they would be called upon for a last-ditch defense of central and southeast China should peace talks fail.

American Promised Protection. Shanghai, Jan. 27.—(UP)—An "adequate number" of Marines and American Naval units will be kept in China to protect United States citizens from uncontrolled violence, Vice Admiral Oscar C. Badger said today.

The Western Pacific Fleet Commander indicated, however, that some Marines may be withdrawn to Guam or other Pacific bases, and that most of those remaining in China probably will be quartered aboard ships rather than based ashore.

Several thousands of Marines are at Singtao, the American Naval Base in China, and 67 are aboard the transport Bayfield in Shanghai Harbor to protect Americans here if necessary.

Badger emphasized that the policy of keeping Marine and Naval forces in China was subject to change at the will of the existing government in China and the United States Government.

He did not disclose the exact strength to be retained under present plans.

"We are going to retain enough and not too many," he said. He denied recent reports circulated in some Chinese quarters that large reinforcements have arrived in Tsingtao, saying they were just as false as other reports that the Marines are pulling out entirely.

"Changing conditions," including the absence of violence during the change-over from Nationalist to Communist rule in Peiping, have dictated the decision to reduce the force, Badger said.

Most of the Marines will be based afloat, he said, to refute Chinese Communist charges that the American Navy is violating Chinese sovereignty.

The Marines are not participants in the affairs of China, he added, and do not intend to be. He emphasized that the Mayor of Tsingtao could require Naval headquarters here to evacuate at any time. The areas around Tsingtao are in Communist hands, but the city itself has not been brought under siege.

Badger's statement that the Marine force would be reduced was taken here as indicating decreasing concern regarding possible violence against foreigners. The fact that the change-over from Nationalist to Communist rule was made without incident at Tientsin and Peiping was believed to have reassured authorities regarding the safety of Americans in Nanking, Shanghai, and other cities which may soon come under Communist control.

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## Oil Producers Study Imports

WICHITA, FALLS, Jan. 27 (UP)—A two day conference of the Independent Petroleum Association of America opens here today, with the heavy imports of foreign oil slated as the chief discussion point.

Oil imports have long been the target of opposition of the nation's independent oil producers. Congressman Ed Gossett and Russell B. Brown, General counsel

for the association from Washington, will speak on proposed legislation in the 81st Congress which will affect oil production, at a banquet tonight.

The steel situation and the proposed uniform measurement of natural gas also were expected to be brought under close scrutiny by the association. Such a bill already has found sponsorship in the Texas Legislature.

## Area OIL News

At last we got to a source of information concerning the drilling in and around Sipe Springs! And here are the facts we obtained from our contact:

Crader Oil Co., of Fort Worth Texas No. 1 Sheldon was drilling at approximately 2800 feet when they lost some tools in the hole. All through the week-end they have been doing one of those nasty fishing jobs which are not helped one bit by the weather. At 2525 feet in the Caddo formation they found enough natural oil to show them that they could go back and bottom under that streak and make a well. However, this is to be a deeper test and they intend going on when they recover the things lost in the well.

Newton Hughes Drilling Co. of Conroe, Texas drilled on the No. 1 Houser Brothers' tract—about a 400 acre tract out south of Sipe Springs and also on south of the shallow field out from Sipe. The No. 1 Houser is approximately 6 miles south of Sipe Springs. They drilled to 3200 feet but they bottomed higher—could not get the exact depth to which they backed up. The well only made a small flow at a time—some of it came in heads, and weak ones at that. That well has been sitting for about a month. Now they are preparing to reopen the well and recirculate the mud and set pipe. They intended to do that the last of last week, but it is reasonably straight that they have not completed the operation because of the weather.

At least one small tract out from the shallow producing field south of Sipe Springs has been leased recently, and others are being contemplated. We are not allowed to go more into detail at this time, but we do say, watch Sipe Springs when the weather is better. Something may be happening down there any day now. There are at least three formations which should pay off down there and several Operators seem to be becoming interested in trying to find the payoff down there.

Dalport No. 3 Wood still fishing and still no results. Skelley No. 1 Thomas out from Cisco was shut down temporarily Monday afternoon because of the weather. Perhaps that was a good thing because the crew driving from Gorman to work and with the roads what they are someone might have gotten hurt had they continued going up there.

If F. D. Glass's well, the No. 1 M. O. Bailey, does not hold now in the bottom there really must

Feldman's No. 2 Cooper Grocery Co., A. W. Gregg's No. 6 and No. 7 Phillips, F. D. Glass No. 1 H. O. Bailey; National Cooperative Refinery Association's No. 1 Kreil.

**PROPOSED LABOR LAW DUE IN CONGRESS LATE TODAY OR FRI.**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (UP)—The administration planned to send Congress its new labor-management bill late today or tomorrow.

In a single stroke, the bill would remove the Taft-Hartley law from the statute books, revive the Wagner Act with some changes and restore to the labor department some of the powers taken away by the Republican 80th Congress. The measure was scheduled to be introduced by the chairmen of the House and Senate labor committees.

The Senate group is slated to begin hearing tomorrow.

Informed sources said the administration's bill "will not contain a comma, preposition or a definite article that appears in the Taft-Hartley law."

The bill was outlined last night at a White House meeting of president Truman's chief labor advisers. It reportedly calls for abolition of the office of NLRB general counsel and transfer of the mediation service back to the labor department. It would provide a "cooling off" period of 80 days in the case of strikes affecting the national health and safety. And it would permit the government to seek court injunctions in certain labor disputes.

In other congressional developments: Foreign policy — Some Senate leaders believe Russia has unwittingly given President Truman's

big foreign spending program a shot in the arm. They say the Soviet announcement of an "eastern union" to counter the Marshall Plan is bound to swing votes behind Mr. Truman's "cold war" proposals. Sen. Brien McMahon, D. Conn., a member of the foreign relations committee, pointed out that Russian "tough talk" helped push such measures as the British loan, ERP, and the Vandenberg military-support through the Senate.

Communists — The House Un-American Activities Committee said the American Communist party is interested chiefly in "espionage and treasonable activity" against the United States. In the final report drafted by the group during the 80th Congress, it said all other activity of the Communists is designed to hide, camouflage or finance the espionage apparatus. To combat Communism, the committee recommended that the espionage laws be "substantially strengthened."

Defense — Chairman Carl Vinson, D. Ga., of the House armed services committee, served notice that he will plug for the five-year, 70-group Air Force program, despite the President's recommendation for a smaller air force. Writing in "Planes," publication of the Airport Industries Association, Vinson called the 70-group plan a "minimum" for national safety and said he would "insist" on it. Vinson's committee, meanwhile, called Army Secretary Kenneth C. Royall and Gen. Omar N. Bradley to testify on a bill to fix the

strength of the Army and Air Force.

Housing — The Republicans have come up with two public housing programs as substitutes for the administration's. In the House 10 members were ready to introduce a bill that would call for construction of 810,000 public housing units during the next six years. On the Senate side, 14 GOP legislators drew up a slightly different version calling for 600,000 units in the same period. The administration wants to build 1,050,000(M) units over a seven-year period.
