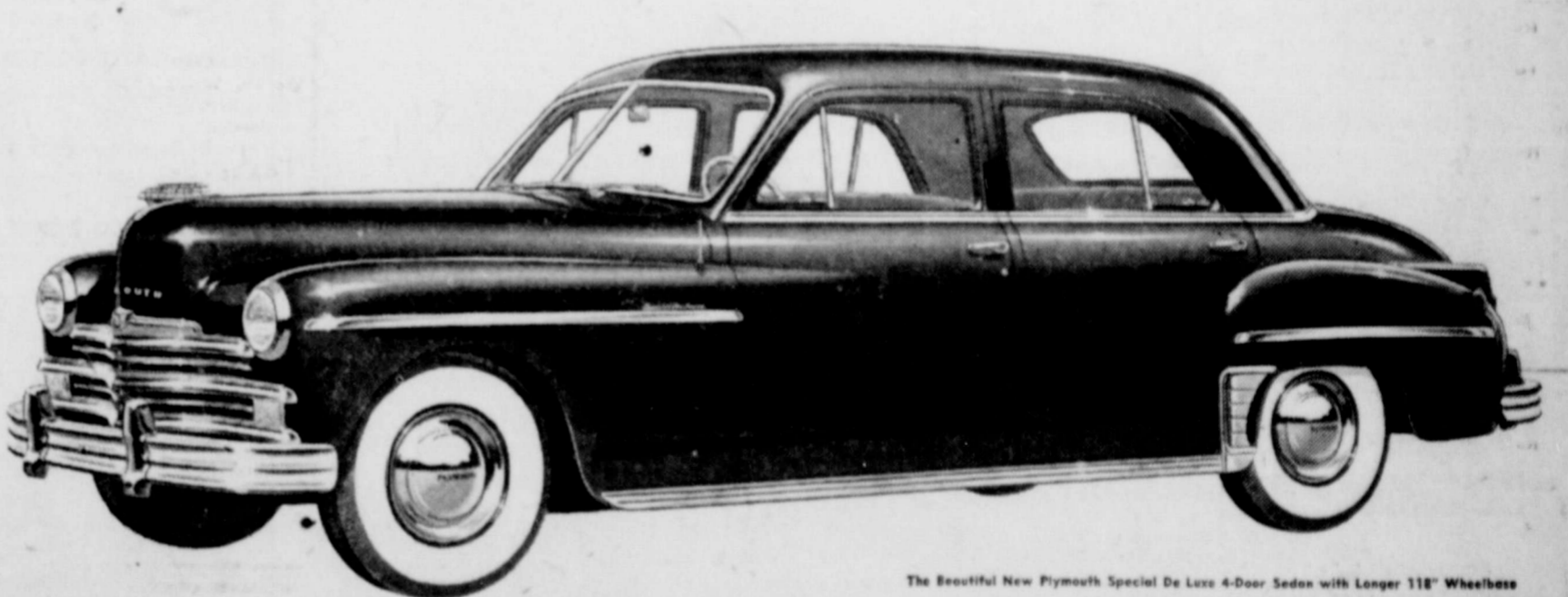

Boos were heard from the crowd of 7,000 as Louis pecked away with his 14 ounce gloves, while his opponent from Hastings, Fla., put up only feeble opposition.

The retired champ floored the 190 pound Ray with a left hook to the chin in the third round, and it might have been all over then had not the bell intervened at the count of seven.

Ray failed to answer the fourth round bell.

The 220 pound Louis is scheduled to fight at Dallas tomorrow night in another exhibition match.

In the main event, Lee Campione, 178 pounder from Chicago, scored a fourth round knockout over 176 pound Billy McCoy of Freeport, Tex.

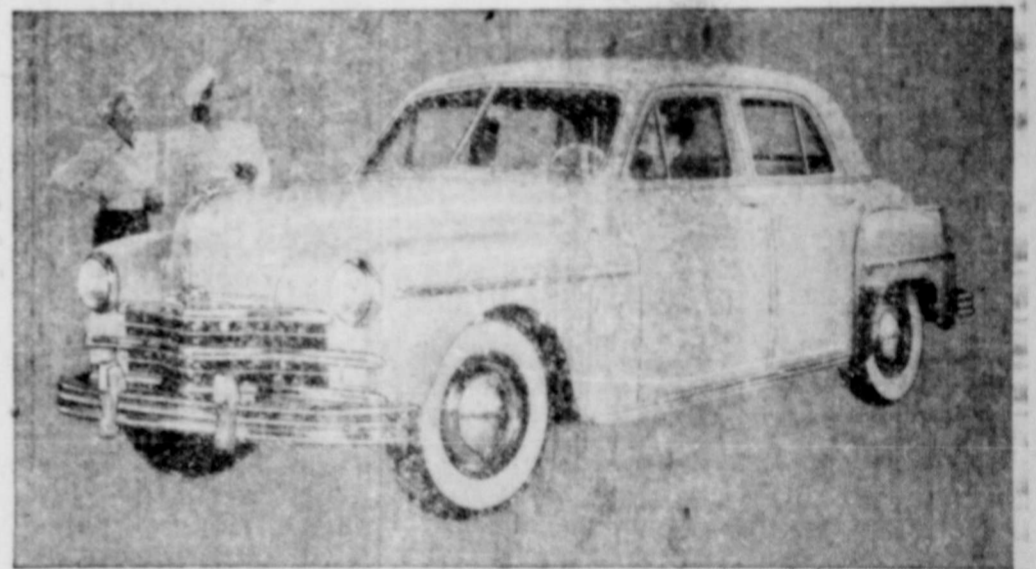

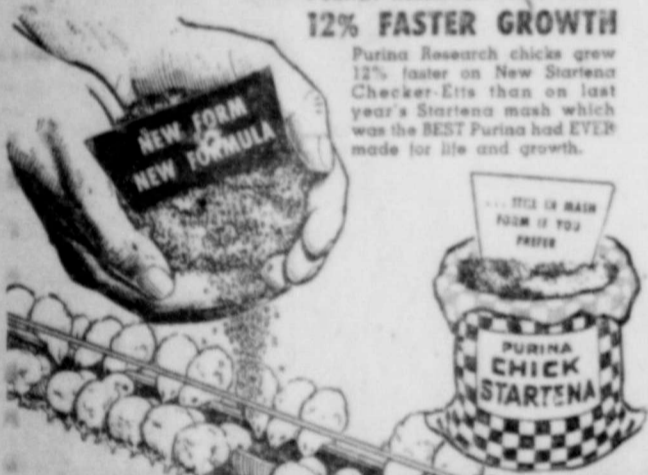

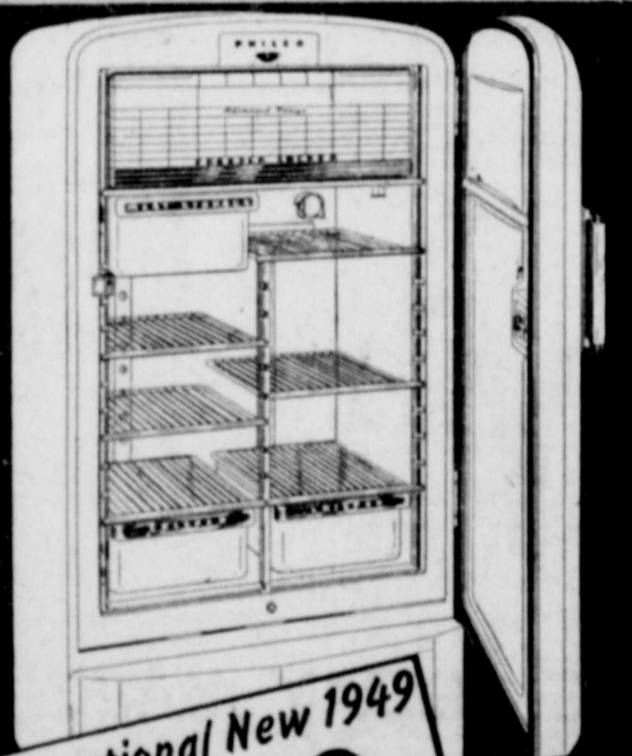
