### Atty. Clark To Resign Post

WASHINGTON, April 1 (UP)—Attorney General Tom C. Clark has informed the White House that he intends to leave the Cabinet by July 1, administration officials said today.

These sources said that like all top government officials, Clark submitted his resignation shortly before President Truman began his new term in January. Mr. Truman has taken no action on it.

They said that Clark will follow up his January letter with a more formal letter of resignation, probably in June. He will tell Mr. Truman, it was said, that he wants to re-enter private law practice.

At present, Clark is the oldest member of Mr. Truman's cabinet in point of service. He was named Attorney General in June, 1945, after eight years of service in various Justice Department posts.

Clark's withdrawal from the cabinet has long been rumored. Speculation about his successor as attorney general has centered around Clark Clifford, the President's special counsel.

### Three Times and Out

HOBART, Okla., (UP)—Mrs. Nettus Solan has been granted her third divorce within two years from the same man. J. W. Sloan, Mrs. Sloan divorced Edward J. Hayes before she married Sloan. She tried three times to reconcile her marriage with the second husband but this time she says the divorce is going to stick.

"Since the United States was jet-propelled into leadership, we have become citizens of the world," said Mrs. John J. Perry at a dinner in her honor held Thursday night at the First Methodist Church.

Mrs. Perry, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, urged the women here for the Sixth District convention to "keep step" in order to lend their force in bringing about world peace. She said that women's clubs are a "cross section of community life" and can be a great power in the world. She closed her address with a quotation from Romans "May we therefore follow after that pattern that makes for peace."

Mrs. Perry was introduced by Mrs. L. L. Blackburn of Baird, first vice-president of the Sixth District.

Russian Children Taught Westerners Are Villians

MOSCOW, April 1 (UP)—The Russians have introduced a parlor game to teach their children that western leaders, including American military governor in Germany, Gen. Lucius D. Clay, are villians, it was disclosed today.

The game, described in the humor weekly "Crocodile," is a variation of the parchesi-type games in which the player throws dice and then moves markers over an obstacle course on a board.

But in the Russian version, the obstacles are Western leaders and the Soviet children are urged to "outfoot" them.

Winston Churchill, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, Gen. Charles De Gaulle of France, Hitler, Goebbels and even Uncle Sam are represented among the "obstacles." The game is called "Meow."

"Texas" was the theme of the dinner which formally opened the Sixth District convention in Ranger and guests at the dinner were welcomed by Mrs. W. E. Cantrell, president of the district and Mayor Lee Dockery. Mrs. Lee Gentry of San Angelo, second vice-president of the district, responded to the welcome.

Miss Ethel Foster of Sterling City, past president of the district and of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and now finance chairman of the General Federation, spoke on the General Federation.

Miss Jo Oylar of Ranger gave a clever reading on "Inside Texas."

Following the dinner and addresses at the dinner the convention moved to the auditorium of the church where a pageant, "Women's Day," was presented.

### Motorcycle Hill Climbing Contest Scheduled Apr. 17

Travelers along the highway between Mineral Wells and Breckenridge, not far west of Metcalf Gap, for years used to wonder at a queer streak of growth which had been swept completely bare of vegetation along the side of a steep hill clear to the top.

The clearing was man-made, having been done along about 1930 to provide the location for one of the most exciting and dangerous of sports—o motorcycle hill climb. Ranger citizens sponsored the contest and several thousand persons attended.

And now the spot has been cleared away again and will be the scene of another hill-climb by daring riders aboard sporting, roaring "motor-bikes" on Sunday, April 17, beginning at 2 p. m. There are expected to be so many entries that five hours of thrilling action will result. The Four Star Motorcycle Hill Climb is sponsored by the Asphalt Aviation Club of Mineral Wells, Harvey W. Evans, president, with the co-operation of the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce.

There will be a 30-foot run which will enable a contestant to get up a speed of 40 miles an hour before he hits the climb, 440 feet long and as steep it looks impossible. But Freeman Matalati, in charge of arrangements, is confident one or more will succeed.

Motorcycles with 45 cubic-inch piston displacement, or under, will meet in the first event; motorcycles of larger displacement in the second contest and then the three best of these two events will meet in the final event. The contests are under the sanction of the American Motorcycle Association. B. K. Pounds, Dallas, is Southwestern district A.M.A. referee. William Cameron, Mineral Wells Index editor, will be local judge, with two others to be designated by the A.M.A. Prizes totaling \$550 will be offered and a large attendance on the part of the public is expected.

### Biggest Slump Of Year Shown By Texas Stores

DALLAS, Tex., April 1 (UP)—Department store sales in four major Texas cities last week showed the biggest slump of the year, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas reported today.

Nineteen reporting firms in Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio reported an average decline of 20 per cent in the week ending March 26, as compared with the corresponding week last year.

Seven stores in Dallas and four in Fort Worth reported an average decrease of 22 per cent; five in Houston showed a decline of 18 per cent, and three in San Antonio noted a 20 per cent drop.

For the four weeks ending March 26, compared with a similar period in 1948, the decline was only nine per cent with Dallas sales off seven per cent, Houston off eight per cent, Fort Worth off 10 per cent and San Antonio 14 per cent.

Although department store sales are running below those of a year ago, they still are averaging more than three and one-half times the volume during an average week in the 1935-39 period, the Reserve Bank's report showed.

### Man Confesses Three Robberies

George Lowe who was picked up by Ranger policemen earlier this week on a suspicion of robbery has confessed to entering three rooms at the Southland Hotel in Ranger robbing them and has been placed in the county jail.

Lowe came to Ranger the first of the week as an employee of a carnival now showing here. On questioning by local police he admitted the robberies and gave up most of the items that he had stolen. Police said today most of the things stolen had been returned but some was still missing.

### Social Security Warning Given

"Individual owners and partners in business concerns sometimes lose old-age benefits because of their failure to file an application," Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene Social Security Administration said today. He said that in a recent claims case there was a loss of \$3,028.28 to a wage earner and his wife due to the failure to file an application. The wage earner in this instance had been a full time employee for several years under social security. This employment was sufficient to give him a permanently insured status. Some time later he became a partner in the firm, and as such, became self-employed, and exempt from coverage by social security. He continued in this capacity until age 70, five years past the time of his and his wife's eligibility to old age insurance benefits. During these five years, total benefits of over three thousand dollars could have been paid to this elderly couple.

Fisher emphasized that if all workers would contact the nearest social security office on attaining age 65, whether or not they intend to continue to work, such loss of benefits could be kept at a minimum.

The Abilene social security office is located at 308 Post Office Building, Abilene.

At a meeting of the board of the Sixth District of TFWC held Thursday afternoon at the Gholson Hotel recognition was given Mrs. C. H. Fee of Cisco and Mrs. H. B. Broadbuss of Colorado City when they were made life members of the Sixth District.

This is the highest honor that can be accorded a member of the district and is an award for long and useful service in the district. Both women are members of pioneer clubs which they have served as presidents and both have held many offices in the district organization.

Mrs. Broadbuss is a past president of the Sixth district, serving during the early years of its history.

#### WOMEN GET INTO FULL SWING OF CONVENTION BUSINESS

Women from over the Sixth District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs continued to arrive in Ranger today to attend the 24th annual convention of the district.

The convention was drawing visitors as well as delegates and among the early arriving visitors were Mrs. W. H. Barker, Mrs. T. M. West, Mrs. Claud Hudspeth, and Mrs. John D. Cochran of San Antonio.

Today's session opened at 7 o'clock this morning when a class in public speaking was conducted by Mrs. Harry Holt of Abilene and Mrs. Hal Hunter of Ranger, head of the speech and english departments of Ranger Junior College.

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#### WASHINGTON, April 1 (UP)—Diplomatic officials today viewed Russia's latest denunciation of the North Atlantic pact as a propaganda maneuver designed to "cast a shadow" over the signing ceremonies here Monday.

While the state department refused to comment immediately, it was learned that high U. S. officials were neither surprised nor upset over the Soviet memorandum sent to the United States and six other pact members.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson was expected to discuss the Russian charges later today at meetings with five western European foreign ministers.

The secretary's appointment list includes French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman, Belgium's Paul-Henri Spaak, Britain's Ernest Bevin, Luxembourg's Joseph Bech, and Portugal's Jose Caeiro Da Mata.

Diplomatic officials said the Soviet criticism, branding the pact a violation of the United Nations charter, had been expected for some time. They look for further Russian propaganda moves between the signing of the pact and its actual ratification, but they predict that the Soviet efforts will prove futile.

LONDON, April 1, (UP)—A foreign office spokesman expressed regret today that Russia has reverted to the Stalin-Lenin theory that the world is and must be divided into two worlds.

The spokesman's comment was the first official government reaction to a Russian note to the sponsoring powers of the Atlantic Pact. The note, made public early today, denounced the pact as an aggressive plan against Russia.

A few hours later, at a noon press conference, the spokesman gave the government's view on the Soviet action.

The government will reply formally to the Russian note in due course, the spokesman said.

He said the reply probably would point out, as Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin did in Commons March 18, that the Atlantic Pact had no secret clauses; and nations which have no aggressive aims or intentions need not fear the alliance.

The British statement made it plain that the Atlantic Pact countries which received the Russian note would reject it and all of its allegations.

The spokesman said the world publication of the note before delivery to the respective foreign offices indicated the basic motive may have been propaganda.

The British spokesman recalled the world hope during the closing years of the war and soon after it that Russia had abandoned the two world thesis of Stalin and Lenin, and was prepared to follow the path of international cooperation.

"We regret that Russia appears to have returned to the Stalinist Leninist theory of division of the world into two camps," he said.

"The note contains more familiar charges than new ones, although there are new ones, too. Among the new ones is the first Soviet reference to the Anglo-Soviet pact and that the Atlantic Pact violates the bilateral treaty".

British and French officials have maintained that the Atlantic alliance need not be a contradiction of the bilateral treaties with Russia, unless Russia becomes an aggressor.

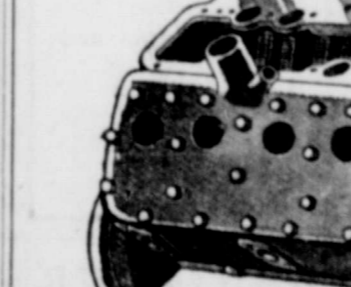



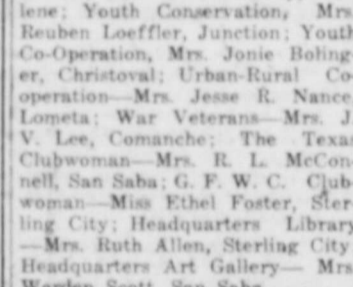
