BERLIN, May 24 (UP)—The western powers today demanded the withdrawal of Russian troops and Soviet controlled railway police from strike-bound railway property in western Berlin. Allied military police and West German police began at once to take over struck elevated railway stations. The

railway police left in most cases without argument. Brig. Gen. Frank L. Howley, American commandant in Berlin, sent a demand to the Soviet railway control officer that he withdraw armed Soviet troops units immediately from the Wannsee station and railway yards near the

elevated station at Schoeneberg.

Howley also sent an ultimatum to railway president, Erwin Kreikmeyer, in the Soviet sector. He gave Kriekmyer until 7 P. M. (11 A. M. CST) to get his heavily-armed railway police out of the U. S. sector.
