### Contract To Be Let Wednesday On Caddo Road

According to word received in Ranger, a contract will be let Wednesday for construction on a section of the Ranger - Caddo Road. The contract will be let for the six mile strip from the city limits of Ranger including the unpaved strip. An additional \$36,000 has been allowed for the work, making a total of \$96,000 that will be spent on it.

All right-of-way deeds in both Eastland and Stephens counties have been secured and most of the fences have been set back to the required distance. Members of the highway committee of the Chamber of Commerce are also working on getting the Morton Valley road widened and improved.

### Entity Of Airmen Revealed

AUSTIN, Tex., May 24 (UP)—Bergstrom Air Force Base officials today identified two airmen killed in a crash yesterday as Lts. Richard Goodwin, Steger, Ill., and Harold M. Murphy. Murphy's home address, as released by Lt. Vincent D. Zimmerman, public information officer, was simply "state of Maine." The fliers died when their F-82 twin Mustang cracked-up on a routine flight and exploded at the field just outside Austin. Engine trouble was believed the cause. Both victims were married and their families lived at Austin.

### Jury Hearing 91st District Civil Suit

Testimony was being heard today in a jury trial of a civil suit filed in 91st District Court by Donnie L. Grimes and her husband H. A. Grimes against J. B. Herring of Rising Star, asking judgment of \$1,500 and interest, and rescission of a real estate contract. The suit was filed Nov. 26, 1948, and alleges Donnie L. Grimes, by her husband, entered into a contract of sale with the defendant on April 3, 1948, under which Donnie L. Grimes agreed to sell surface estate of E-2 of of E-2 and NE-4 of section 29, B. B. & C. Railroad Co., survey, and all of the oil, gas and other mineral rights. It was further claimed by the plaintiff that defendant agreed to convey warranty deed and abstract of good marketable title. Plaintiff allegedly paid \$1,500 down on the purchase price of \$4,400 and received possession of the property, but later found the abstract of title to have serious defects. Judgment asked includes the alleged \$1,500 payment, rescission of contract, and that such sum be adjudged a lien against said property, for foreclosure of such lien, for order of sale and for such other and further relief. Sanders, Scott, Sanders and Smith law firm of Amarillo are representing the plaintiff. Conner and Conner of Eastland are counsel for the defense.

### FT. WORTH PROPERTY OWNERS ASK PROTECTION FROM FLOODS

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 24 (UP)—A committee of 12 west side property owners today demanded "real protection" for their flood devastated area and began an investigation to determine if negligence was involved in Trinity River levee breaks last week. The committee was named last night at a meeting of 500 property owners who suffered heavy losses when the muddy flood waters swirled into lowland areas. Top Puryear, committee spokesman, said another meeting may be held Friday night. Puryear indicated the property owners would file damage suits if liability for the breaks is established. A member of the levee board said meanwhile that he understood a plastics firm was preparing to file a damage suit against the district as a result of flood losses. ### Paper Prepared To Keep Pace With Dallas

DALLAS, Tex., May 24 (UP)—The Dallas Morning News today was confident its presses could keep pace with the growth of Dallas. At a corner stone ceremony yesterday, Leven T. Deputy, chairman of the building committee said the Morning News' ultra-modern plant "was built with the purpose of printing some day a half million copies of an 89 page newspaper every day." The principal address was given by the Morning News President E. M. (Ted) Dealey, publisher of the newspaper. "We are now living and laboring in the present," Dealey said. "We are not looking backward. We are reaching forward toward the unlimited horizon of the future of Texas." "Upon each of us rests the responsibility for using these printing presses for good and not for evil." Copies of "35,000 Days In Texas", a history of the newspaper were sealed in the cornerstone along with a film produced by the Morning News and anniversary editions of the paper and its Galveston predecessor. Present at the ceremonies were Mrs. Jeanette Belo Peabody, the only living daughter of Col. A. H. Belo, founder of the News; her son, Alfred H. Belo Peabody of Boston, and Mrs. George B. Dealey, widow of the late president and publisher.

### Storm Clouds Net More Rain

Ranger people, jittery over the wave of tornadoes, have had two bad nights from clouds that were threatening and which have brought an additional .85 of an inch of rain. Sunday night's fall was .65 of an inch and .20 of an inch fell last night. The clouds both nights had been accompanied with considerable electricity and winds but no damage has been reported so far. Rains last night shot this year's total over the 18 inch mark to surpass the total for the 12 months of 1948 by 1.31 inches. Total fall to date is 18.10 inches and all of 1948 registered only 16.79. The skies were clear at day-break but by 7 o'clock a heavy coating of clouds had rolled over the town.

AUSTIN, May 24, (UP)—A proposed veterans' bonus bill will be heard Wednesday night by the House committee on revenue and taxation. The hearing was scheduled last night, but the committee postponed the discussion on the motion of Rep. Paul T. Wilson of Geneva.

### VISHINSKY MAY SHOW HAND AT MEET TODAY

PARIS, May 24 (UP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky was expected to show his hand today on Russia's new policy concerning Germany. The Western Powers will give Vishinsky a chance at the second session of the council of the Big Four foreign ministers to tell them what he has in mind for the future of Germany. Vishinsky probably will pursue the line he put out at the opening session yesterday, insisting upon four power control of all Germany. That would mean abandonment of the plan for a West German state, and also would give Russia voice and a foothold in the Rhur. The Soviet minister sought unsuccessfully yesterday to have four power control of Germany, as such, made the first item on the agenda. But he did not press his point, and agreed to let the item stand as "political and economic unification of Germany, including allied occupation." Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin of Great Britain will preside today. When he opens the meeting for discussion of the first item he will turn to the minister on his left as the first speaker. That is Vishinsky. It will be Vishinsky's opening to make as broad a statement as he wishes on Germany. If he passes, it will be up to the western ministers to state their position. The talks were scheduled to begin in an atmosphere of almost too-perfect cordiality established yesterday when Vishinsky agreed smilingly to a four-point western agenda for the conference.

### Truck Load Of Clothing Sent Ft. Worth Today

Ranger's gift to the flood victims in Fort Worth left Ranger this morning and was to be delivered to the Salvation Army in Fort Worth on arrival there. An Army truckload of clothing and bed clothing was packed up and sent on its way by mid-morning today. O. R. King, general chairman of the drive today expressed his appreciation and that of the sponsoring churches for the splendid cooperation given the effort by the people of Ranger. King stated that the response was excellent and that the efforts of everyone were appreciated.

### Olden Resident Writes Novel

Mrs. J. B. Gray of Olden, formerly of Ranger, has just completed a 30,000 word novel, "Old Indianola" and is negotiating with several publishers relative to publishing the novel. Mrs. Gray became interested in the stories of Indianola while spending the winter in Victoria and through the fact that her husband's grandmother landed at Old Indianola from Germany in 1854. The book is based on the life of the grandmother who was married to a doctor whose ranching interest extended around Yorktown. The book covers a period from 1854 to 1875 when Indianola was wrecked by a hurricane.

### Former Residents' Addresses Sought

An appeal has been made to the people of Ranger to turn into the Chamber of Commerce the names and addresses of former residents so that material relative to the homecoming in July may be sent to them. The homecoming is being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce to run concurrently with the Jaycee Rodeo and a program of entertainment will be arranged for those that attend the homecoming. F. P. ### ALLIED POLICE, GERMANS TAKE OVER AS RUSSIANS WITHDRAW

BERLIN, May 24 (UP)—The western powers today demanded the withdrawal of Russian troops and Soviet controlled railway police from strike-bound railway property in western Berlin. Allied military police and West German police began at once to take over struck elevated railway stations. The railway police left in most cases without argument. Brig. Gen. Frank L. Howley, American commandant in Berlin, sent a demand to the Soviet railway control officer that he withdraw armed Soviet troops units immediately from the Wannsee station and railway yards near the elevated station at Schoenberg. Howley also sent an ultimatum to railway president, Erwin Kriekmeyer, in the Soviet sector. He gave Kriekmeyer until 7 P. M. (11 A. M. CST) to get his heavily-armed railway police out of the U. S. sector. At that hour, Howley said, west sector German police will take over the railway property. British sector police, sometimes accompanied by British officers, meantime seized control of nine elevated railway stations and sent the railway police back to the Soviet zone. French military police similarly accompanied French sector German police to Tegel station in North Berlin. The Communist railroad defenders there withdrew without a fuss. The three western military governments decided to eject the Soviet-controlled railway police and any Soviet troops from the western sectors of Berlin after casualties in the four-day old railway strike reached three dead and 1,500 injured. Charlottenburg in the British sector was seized two days ago and two more, Zoo and West Kreuz stations, were seized last night after Communists fired into an attacking force of strikers and killed two. The attack occurred at Zoo station. British authorities ordered the Communist railway guards out and sent in their own German police. Then a mob of 2,000 began forming for an attack on West Kreuz Station. British authorities negotiated a joint east-west occupation of West Kreuz Station just a few minutes before the attack was scheduled and then went on to occupy four more, all in the British sector. The British-licensed Social Democrats predicted even more serious disorders. The paper said the Soviet officials held a war parley with top Communist leaders at Soviet headquarters yesterday to map "immediate and drastic" action against the 16,000 West Berlin railroad workers who are striking against the Soviet zone railway administration. The newspaper said the Communists decided to rush all available police forces from the Soviet zone to the outskirts of Berlin, where they would be massed for quick action against key rail installations.

### Treasure Hunt Due To Draw Many

CANYON, May 24 (UP)—An estimated 50,000 persons are expected to visit Palo Duro State Park Saturday to participate in a treasure hunt for lucky coins dropped from an airplane earlier this week. Prizes range from a new automobile to an expense-paid flight to South America and total more than \$25,000 in value. Gov. Beauford Jester, state park officials and other dignitaries have been invited. Twenty-five additional state police cars have been assigned to the area to handle traffic. Dagan is the god of earth in a Babylonian religion.

### Strawn Church To Stage Party

Members of St. Dominic's Episcopal church at Strawn tonight are staging a street program and dance at Strawn highlight of which will be a quiz program conducted by the Rev. James W. McClain, mission priest. Music for the occasion will be furnished by a fiddle band, the Western Swingsters. Square dancing will be featured and prizes will be awarded for the oldest and youngest couples present. Proceeds from the event will go into the church fund and the public is invited to attend.

### Negotiations To Save SHANGHAI BEING HINTED

SHANGHAI, May 24 (UP)—Communist armies tightened a noose around Shanghai today and signs developed that the Nationalist defense garrison was getting ready to evacuate. Several thousand Nationalist soldiers were on the move northward. They were bound for the Woosung area, a few miles down the Whangpoo where the garrison command had ordered a massing of all available boats. Reports circulated that basic changes were being made in the organization of the Shanghai municipal police. They tended to bear out earlier indications that various "discussions" had been going on for some days in search of a solution of the Shanghai problem without bloodshed in the streets. The cautious language of the dispatch coming through a strict army censorship hinted at negotiations for a deal between the Communists and Nationalists by which the Communists could take over the city with a minimum threat of disorders and anarchy. The United States consulate staff considered moving its offices to the rear of the building it now occupies if the situation became worse. The move would be away from the famous bund, across the Whangpoo from which formidable Communist forces were massed. American organizations advised Americans to stay off the streets unless they were engaged in essential activity, and to store up foodstuff against an emergency. By all signs the struggle for possession of the greatest city in the Orient was headed swiftly for a showdown.

### Jerry Belknap More Rational

It was reported today that the condition of Jerry Belknap may be some improved since he seemed more rational today. It was stated that he had taken more nourishment today and had talked with members of his family. He has been in the West Texas Hospital since last Thursday when he was injured when struck by an automobile while attempting to cross the highway on Eastland hill.

### Arguments Due In Guam Trial

GUAM, May 24 (UP)—Final arguments will be presented today in the trial of Pvt. Calvin Dennis, 27, Seguin, Tex., accused of taking part in the rape-murder of pretty Ruth Farnsworth last December.

Two prosecution attempts yesterday to introduce Pvt. Herman Dennis, 26, Calvin, Tex., as a witness failed after Herman refused to testify against his half-brother. Herman Dennis has been found guilty and sentenced to death for his part in the crime.

Al Reidel, a Berkeley, Cal., criminologist, and Lt. C.M.R.D. James Hackett, Guam police chief, were called to the stand. Hackett testified about an oil-stained smock belonging to Miss Farnsworth found under the driver's seat of a weapons carrier driven by Calvin Dennis.

Calvin's defense attorney claimed Calvin left the jade shop where Miss Farnsworth worked after 8-Sgt. Robert Burns, 32, of Spokane, Wash., hit the red-haired Navy civilian employe. Burns is the third man allegedly involved. All three are negroes.

The defendant's written confession was accepted as evidence.

### Delay Granted In Eisler Case

LONDON, May 24 (UP)—The Bow Street Court granted a three-day delay in extradition proceedings against fugitive Communist Gerhart Eisler today and ordered him back to Britain without bail.

The action was taken over protests from defense council and as Communists demonstrated in the streets for Eisler's freedom. The court action lasted only eight minutes.

Eisler entered the Oak-paneled courtroom at 11:50 A. M. local time (6:30 A. M. EDT). He was dressed in the same rumpled brown suit that he wore on two previous court appearances. Magistrate John F. Eastwood promptly bound him over until Friday when he again will appear in the same court.

The postponement was granted on an American request that the proceedings be delayed to give the United States government more time to prepare evidence. Defense Attorney Dudley Colard objected vigorously to the postponement.

When the delay was ordered over his objections, Colard then demanded that Eisler, who jumped bail in New York, again be released on bail.

Magistrate Eastwood refused. Extra police were on guard as court opened. They ordered the demonstrators off the sidewalks outside the court. But the Communists persisted in handing out leaflets describing Eisler as a "man who has been hounded and persecuted all over the world for the crime of anti-Fascism."

### Navy Psychiatrist Assumes Blame For Setup That Permitted Leap

WASHINGTON, May 24 (UP)—Capt. George N. Raines, top Navy psychiatrist, took full responsibility today for the circumstances that made possible James Forrestal's suicide.

Raines said he ordered the hospital watch over Forrestal relaxed because he felt such treatment was necessary if the former defense secretary was to be cured of the psychoneurotic depressive condition he was suffering.

The psychiatrist acknowledged that the treatment he prescribed involved "a calculated risk of suicide. He attributed Forrestal's death leap Sunday from the 16th floor of the Bethesda Naval Hospital to a "sudden fit of despondency" which he said is "extremely common" in that type of mental depression.

Raines was one of the principal witnesses called to testify before a special board of Naval medical officers investigating Forrestal's suicide. Other witnesses scheduled to appear today were CMDR. R. E. Deen and Hospital Corpsman R. W. Harrison, Jr. When Forrestal was first ad-

mitted to the hospital, he had an attendant night and day. Recently, however, it was decided that removal of the constant watch would be of therapeutic value. A hospital corpsman was assigned to check the room every five minutes.

Harrison was on duty when the suicide occurred. Deen, a physician, was sleeping in an adjoining room.

In his report, Raines said Dr. William C. Menninger had advised him that Forrestal's case history included an alleged suicide attempt at Hobe Sound, Fla., on March 31. Dr. Menninger, president of the American Psychoanalytic Association, examined Forrestal in Florida and recommended that he enter Bethesda.

However, Raines said, at no time during his stay at the hospital did Forrestal make "a suicide gesture or a suicidal at-
