JUNIOR RODEO TO BEGIN 4-DAY RUN ON SEPTEMBER 8TH

BAIRD — Neither rain, hail, nor VEE can keep a good rodeo down. After the July postponement this year's show was rescheduled for Sept. 8-11, amid a mass of confusion and conflicts, but we believe that this year's show will take its place along with the past performances as being one of the best Junior Rodeos in the Big Country.

The rodeo is sponsored by the Baird FFA Chapter and Callahan County Sheriff's Posse. There will be four performances each beginning at 8 p. m. in the Sheriff's Posse Arena.

This year, as in the past, the contestants will be divided into three age groups, for boys and girls, 12 and under, 13 to 15, and 16 to 19. Prizes will include 24 engraved belt buckles for first place winners, and a saddle to the All Around Cowboy and All Around Cowgirl.

With school underway, the schedule has caused many conflicts, but with the co-operation of contestants, producer, and others, the conflicts have been kept at a minimum, thru the hard work and special set-up efforts of the Rodeo Secretary, Sarah Campbell.

The 1971 Baird Junior Rodeo will be produced by Harold Heath of Grosvenor, and it is common knowledge in rodeo circles that the Heath stock is the best in the Southwest. Also, this year's show will feature the outstanding arena work of rodeo clown, Billy King from Lubbock. His experience of 25 years in rodeo work and performances in 35 different states each year qualify him as one of the top in his field of clowning and bull fighting.

BAIRD SCHOOL ENROLLMENT SLIGHTLY UP FROM LAST YEAR

BAIRD — Enrollment at the Baird Public Schools now totals 376 students for the 1971-72 school year, a gain of 11 pupils over last year's total.

Of the 130 enrolled in high school, 64 students are girls and 66 are boys. They are classified as follows:

Seniors - girls 14, boys 13 - total 27.
Juniors - girls 12, boys 20 - total 32.
Sophomores - girls 21, boys 19 - total 40.

Freshmen - girls 21, boys 14 - total 31.
Elementary and junior high school students by classes are: first grade 27, second grade 30, third grade 29, fourth grade 37, fifth grade 26, sixth grade 37, seventh grade 34 and eighth grade 36.

New services offered this year are vocational classes for high school students, arts and crafts classes for junior high school students and a resource teacher who is available two days a week.

An agreement has been made with Cisco Junior College allowing students who wish to take vocational training to attend classes there and receive credit toward high school graduation.

Two students, Kenny Bradley and Benny Havins are studying automobile mechanics. Minnie Rutherford is enrolled in a class in drafting. Data processing students from Baird are Brenda Moore, Jaymie White and Gary Simpson.

Seventh and eighth grade students will be working with Mrs. Linda Steffens and Mr. John Dillingham in art classes which include leather tooling taught by Mr. Dillingham, and a course in decorative covering taught by Mrs. Steffens, which will include some work in ceramics, foil art, wood work, plaster modeling and water colors. Mr. Robert Stovall teaches these classes to sixth grade students.

Mrs. Rokegan Hicks, resource teacher, will be in the Baird schools each Monday and Tuesday working with various teachers and students.

The speech therapy program which was started last year will be continued. Mrs. Jean Gore, from the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, will be here each Tuesday working with approximately 40 students in speech classes.

one with children since our enrollment is in a critical stage. If you can help in the lunch room temporarily, please let Mr. Reynolds know, or you can contact Mary Green. If every mother would help just one day, each one could see that a good, hot, well-balanced meal is being served, and there would be less complaining because each mother would know what is involved in preparing that meal. Also, you might see that your child is much better off eating in the lunch room each day, although he might not like to eat

everything that is served, than he is going to town and drinking a Coke and eating candy. The school lunches are 40c and that is not much more than that Coke and candy costs and they get much better meal. Do you count yourself among those who are saved? Exactly what did you do that saved you? What assurance do you have that this saved you? Do you have God's word that this is His plan of saving men? Can you recommend it to others as God's way of salvation?

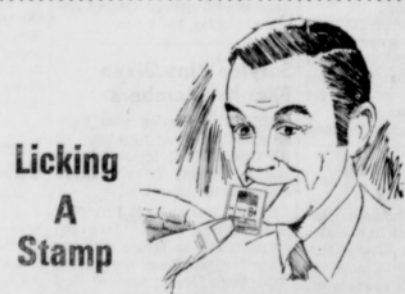
We should never recommend that which God has not authorized. Man cannot devise his own way of salvation. Only God can do that. Only when man has done what God has commanded can he rightfully claim that he is saved.

The Old Testament was God's will for men in other ages, The New Testament is the will of God for men today (Heb. 9:15-17). So, we will not find the way of salvation for men today in the Old Testament. Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven (Matt. 7:21).

I can recommend that men believe on the Lord Jesus Christ before they can be saved, because God authorized it (Heb. 11:6; John 8:24; 3:16). I cannot recommend salvation by faith only, though, because God's word says man is not justified by faith only (Jas. 2:24). I can recommend that men must repent of their sins before they can be saved, because God "commands all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30). I can safely recommend that men must openly confess Christ with the mouth to be saved, because the Apostle Paul said "with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Rom. 10:9,10). I can recommend that men be baptized (immersed) in water for the remission of sins, because God specifically authorizes it (Acts 2:38; 10:47,48). I cannot recommend any plan of salvation which stops short of this because no man can be saved in his sins. If he could be, Christ need not have come and need not have died.

Can you recommend the plan of salvation which you have obeyed? Can you recommend it has having divine authority?

Motorists Must Remain Stopped As Long as School Bus Is Stopped

AUSTIN — A new State law effective August 30 will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.

Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it as a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required.

FACTS CONCERNING RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS IN TEXAS
All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period, August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972 in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right, during this six-month period, to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brand and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

U. S. Savings Bonds In County Totals \$3,958

BAIRD — Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee, reported today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Callahan County totaled \$3,958 during July. Sales for the first seven months were \$61,732 for 47 percent of the 1971 sales goal of \$130,000.

July sales in Texas amounted to \$16,810,210 compared to \$15,454,922 during the same period of 1970 — an increase of 8.7 percent. Year to date sales were \$118,726,731, while 1970 sales totaled \$106,206,174 for an increase of 11.7 percent.

National sales during the month were \$458 million — 16.3 per cent above 1970 July sales. Sales for the seven-month period totaled \$3,243 million — 17.4 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E and Series H Bonds amounting to \$151 million were reported for the first seven months of 1971 compared to \$146 million exchanged in 1970.

The wedding will be October 16 at Clyde Church of Christ.

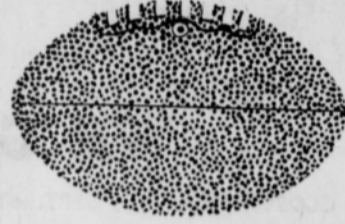
