The latest figure brought the total for thus far this year to 4,034, compared with 3,269 during the same period last year. Dry holes numbered 80, while gas well completions totaled 13.

Oil Man To Be Buried On Ranch

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 20 (UP)—Lev Herrington Prichard, 45, chairman of the board of directors of Anderson-Prichard Oil Co. of California, will be buried on his ranch near Brownsville, Tex., after services here tomorrow.

Prichard, who had suffered from cancer for several years, died in Mercy Hospital here last night. Services will be at 2 P.M. tomorrow in the First Baptist Church here.

Prichard, a native of Meadville, Miss., came to Oklahoma City in 1909 to enter law practice with White Griffith, now of Tulsa. In 1915, Prichard entered the oil business as a broker and in 1921, he was an independent operator.

Late in 1921, he formed a partnership with J. Steve Anderson and they founded the Anderson-Prichard Oil Co. In 1922, Anderson sold his stock in the firm to Prichard in 1946. In July of that year, Prichard retired as

president of the company and became chairman of the board of directors.

He also was president of Col-Tex Refining Co., a corporation owned jointly by the Anderson-Prichard Company and Standard Oil Co. of California.

Although Prichard maintained a home in Oklahoma City, he had lived at his ranch near Brownsville for the past 12 years.

He was an ardent yachtsman and in 1956 was caught off the Texas coast in a hurricane. The yacht, The Tawmie, was damaged

but he replaced it with another ship he purchased in England.

Survivors include the wife, Mrs. Louise M. Prichard, a son, Lev H. Prichard, Jr., San Antonio, Tex.; a daughter, Mrs. Louise Warner, Dallas, four grand-

children and two brothers, Charles of Oklahoma City, and Paul of Pratt, Kan.

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS AGAINST WAGE BOOSTS

WASHINGTON, June 20 (UP)—Government economists expressed the belief today that economic conditions have shifted the odds heavily against labor's drive for a fourth-round of wage boosts.

They saw little chance of another general wage increase, and agreed that unions may have to settle for some minor fringe benefits.

These economists pointed out that in the past two weeks, unions in the automobile, steel, electrical manufacturing, rubber, glass and coal industries have been turned down cold on new proposals for wage hikes. Some have even been asked to give up a few benefits of their present contracts.

Mounting unemployment, now at a seven-year peak, has dealt the fourth-round wage drive perhaps its most damaging blow, according to the government experts. Many union members, they said, are worrying more about keeping a job at present rates than pushing for an increase which industry claims may lead to still more layoffs.

Despite initial rebuffs, however, the big unions showed no inclination to yield on their demands. Negotiators for the steel, auto and coal unions reportedly will "talk tough" when they resume bargaining conferences this week. The steel talks are scheduled in Pittsburgh today. Coal negotiations are set for Bluefield, W. Va., tomorrow, and White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., on Wednesday.

In its monthly survey of business conditions, the AFL insisted that the national economy is healthy and there is no reason to expect a depression. While admitting that unemployment may jump from the May level of 3,289,000 to 5,000,000 by mid-July, the labor organization said that "even so, employment is still very high—12,500,000 above prewar years."

Discovery of New Moon Confirmed

OTTAWA, Ont., June 20 (UP)—Discovery of a new moon in the solar system, a satellite of the planet Neptune, was announced today by Gerard P. Kuiper, University of Chicago astronomer.

Kuiper predicted last May 1 at McDonald observatory that the newly-discovered moon probably existed.

Its existence was confirmed through studies of photographs taken May 29 on the 82-inch reflecting telescope at the observatory. McDonald observatory is operated jointly by the U. of C. and the University of Texas.

The satellite is 250,000 times fainter than the faintest star visible to the naked eye, and 250 times fainter than Neptune's first satellite, Triton, discovered in 1846.

With only a diameter of 200 miles, the new moon is 5,000,000 (M) miles from Neptune and 3,000,000,000 (B) miles from earth. Its magnitude of 19-1-2 degrees makes it the faintest moon observed to date, so faint that it probably cannot even be seen through the 200-inch reflecting telescope at Mt. Palomar, Cal. Kuiper, who discovered a fifth

moon to the planet Uranus in March, 1948, estimated that the new moon, moving in nearly the same plane as Neptune, requires two years to complete its cycle. Earth's moon completes its orbit in one month.

"The direction of motion of the new satellite is particularly important," Kuiper said, "for it is in reverse to that of Triton."

PRESS BARRED AT RITES FOR ROBESON, WHITE GIRL

NEW YORK, June 20 (UP)—Paul Robeson, Jr., 21, son of the pro-Russian Negro baritone, married Marilyn Paula Greenberg, a 21-year-old white girl he met at college, yesterday in an atmosphere of tension created by his parents' opposition to press coverage of the event.

The 16-minute ceremony was conducted in the fifth floor walk-up apartment of the Rev. John W. Darr, Jr., a Congregational minister. Darr said the vows were a combination of Jewish, Catholic and Protestant ritual and did not contain the word "obey."

The elder Robeson arrived at Darr's apartment first with the groom. The singer informed reporters and photographers that they would not be admitted to the ceremony nor allowed to take pictures.

They were hurried into taxis by a contingent of police. One of the policemen had to restrain Robeson from punching a photographer who snapped a picture.

"This marriage would have caused no particular excitement in the Soviet Union," he said. Robeson sent his son to be educated in Russia in 1936 "to escape race prejudice in a country where all races are equal."

The wedding reception was combined with a rally given by the Council of African Affairs to welcome the senior Robeson home from a recent concert tour of Russia. Robeson told an audience of 4,000 he loved the Soviet people "more than any other nation."
