Search Goes On For Thornton Suspects

AMARILLO, Tex., July 5 (UP)—A young man and a woman, suspects in the murder of W. A. (Tex) Thornton, famed oil field explosive expert, were sought today at Sioux Falls, S. D. Thornton was killed at a motor court here June 22. A young couple, drove away in his car which was found abandoned two days later at Dodge City, Kan. Sheriff Paul Gaither said he was "very interested" in a telephone report from Sioux Falls concerning a couple that hitchhiked there yesterday.

A motorist told Sioux Falls police that he picked up the couple in Kansas and they left him in Sioux Falls. He thought nothing about the matter until he heard a radio broadcast describing the suspects in the Thornton case.

A young couple in custody at Pecos, Tex., apparently was cleared. Their fingerprints and other clues failed to check out.

Boy Burned In Accident Monday

Johnnie Harrison is in the Ranger General Hospital where he was rushed for treatment of burns Monday afternoon. He remained in a critical condition this morning and an attending physician reported that about two-thirds of the boy's body was burned.

According to reports of the accident, Johnnie was shooting fireworks which ignited gasoline. The accident occurred at the Lone Star Gas Plant 108-2.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Harrison.

So far as could be determined this morning, this was the only holiday accident in Ranger.

TEXAS HOLIDAY DEATH TOLL IS AT LEAST 56

Violent deaths claimed at least 56 lives in Texas over the long Independence Day weekend with traffic accidents contributing by far the largest number of fatalities.

A United Press survey, starting at 6 P. M. Friday and ending at midnight last night, showed this breakdown:

Traffic 32
Drowning 13
Miscellaneous 11

Among the latest additions to the death toll were:

Elizabeth Schiwetz, 15, and Sara Sanchez, both of Los Fresnos, and Alejandra Harrara, Jr., 25, of San Benito, all victims of drowning at Boca Chica Beach, East of Brownsville.

Enrique Ortega Hinojosa, 16, who fell into a canal near his Mercedes home.

Sam Audrey Duke, 28, of Dallas, who died in a two-car collision on U. S. Highway 77 south of Dallas.

William Cecil McClellan, 49, of Waco, killed in Dallas County last night when his car and a truck loaded with cantaloupes were in collision.

Harry Sawyer, 57, of Llano, killed when a car turned over-endwise in Travis County after lurching out of control at a bumpy grade-crossing.

Mrs. Ida Simpson of Ingram, fatally injured in a car-truck collision on Bolivar Peninsula in Galveston County.

Rachael Olmos, 19, of Houston, drowned while swimming in the Gulf of Mexico off Galveston Beach.

A car-truck crash near Leveland yesterday proved fatal to Mrs. T. L. Ray, 65, a son, J. R. Ray, 40, and a daughter, Mary Jo Ray, 25. Mrs. Ray and her son lived at Leveland, Miss Ray at Dallas.

Injuries suffered when his motorcycle struck pedestrian near Big Spring killed S. W. T. Plummer, 27, of Big Spring, but the pedestrian was not seriously hurt.

Marine Pvt. John Lee Burk of Waco was stung while hunting Sunday morning. He was home to leave after overseas duty. He died before his companions could get him to a hospital.

The multiple-death traffic accident near Littlefield was not the worst of the disastrous weekend.

Four men were killed early Saturday near Jasper in a head-on collision, while another two-car crash near San Angelo last Friday killed three persons—a little girl and her grandparents.

Funeral services for Chester Lee McCleskey, 37, of Breckenridge brother of Mrs. Cyrus Miller of Eastland, were held in the First Christian Church in Eastland Sunday afternoon with Elder W. E. Moore officiating. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery under direction of J. Hammer Funeral Home.

McCleskey, employed by the J. E. Cox Construction Co., was crushed to death Saturday morning when the truck he was driving struck the rear of a Cox Construction Co. truck, driven by T. W. Cokrell.

The Breckenridge American stated the accident occurred about 8 o'clock Saturday morning on a bridge about fifteen miles north of Breckenridge.

"The truck ahead of McCleskey was loaded with a 'dog house', a metal building for a drilling rig and McCleskey's truck was carrying two-inch pipe.

He served overseas in Hawaii, the Philippines Islands and Japan during World War II. Prior to his assignment at the Command and General Staff College as a student, he was stationed at Fort Benning, Ga., as Special Staff Officer.

Among other awards and decorations, Colonel Cole is authorized to wear the Silver Star, the Air Medal and Combat Infantryman Badge.

J. M. Bub Thurman, 74, of Carbon, pioneer Eastland County resident, died Monday in Ranger General Hospital at 7:30 P. M.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Carbon Methodist Church, with burial in the Carbon Cemetery. Hammer Funeral Home will direct.

Thurman was a retired farmer. Prior to becoming a farmer, he served as roadmaster for the old Ringling Railroad Co., between Mangum and Breckenridge, in the 1920's. He was one of the first children to be born in the Jewell Community.

Survivors include his wife, three daughters, Faye Thurman of New York, N. Y., Bess Thurman of Carbon, and Mrs. Glenn Hamner of Ranger; two sisters, Mrs. Laura Melton and Mrs. Lee Graham, both of Ranger and one brother, J. H. Thurman of Breckenridge.

One-Time TCU Athlete Dies

FORT WORTH, July 5 (UP)—Howard S. (Shorty) Vaughn one-time athletic great for TCU and a sales representative here for National Supply Co., died in a Fort Worth hospital last night.

Vaughn was taken to the hospital in critical condition after being found in his stalled car on Oak Grove Rd., near his farm home last Friday afternoon.

Authorities thought at first his car may have been involved in a minor collision and that he had suffered violence at the hands of an unknown person. However, physicians later determined that his condition was due to a cerebral hemorrhage and that he stopped the car when he became ill.

Vaughn gained his fame on the athletic field with the winning TCU football teams of the World War I period. Since that time, he had been one of the university's most ardent and active supporters.

He starred in football and basketball between 1915-17, and also lettered in basketball. He left TCU in 1917 to join the Army, and two years later became associated with the National Supply Co., as sales representative here.

When the collision occurred the pipe load of McCleskey's slid until it had to be pulled apart to get out the body of McCleskey.

J. E. Cox, owner of the company, said the truck driven by Cokrell was only slightly damaged. The two were carrying oil field supplies to a point west of Throckmorton, part of a fleet of ten or twelve trucks that went out Saturday morning, the others following behind the trucks that collided.

McCleskey was a native Texan, born Jan 28, 1912. He moved to Breckenridge in September, 1948, from work at Odessa and New Mexico.

FORT WORTH, July 5 (UP)—Seven teen-age youths today faced possible charges of peace disturbance and violation of the fireworks ordinance after being rescued by police from a mob of 100 angry negroes.

The youths were captured last night after a high-speed chase by officers, who said numerous complaints had been received from negroes that the group had tossed torpedo-bomb firecrackers at them from a panel truck.

Veteran Texas Newspaperman Dies

TYLER, July 5, (UP)—Arch McDougal, Veteran Texas Newspaperman who retires 11 years ago, died yesterday after a lengthy illness.

The 77-year-old native Texan who started in the printing business as a Printer's Devil at Dublin, once was co-owner of the firm which later became publisher of the Tyler Courier-Times-Telegraph and from 1928 to 1938 operated the Bonham Daily Favorite.

He served as director of the Bonham Retail Merchants Association from 1938 until his retirement because of ill health last year.

ECONOMIC FUED BETWEEN EAST AND WEST LOOMS

LONDON, July 5 (UP)—The next battle in the cold war between the East and the West appeared destined today to be fought on the economic front.

While the West was involved in a financial crisis centering on the rate at which Britain is going broke, Russia is deploying her forces to take full advantage of the economic predicament.

The East and West reached a tentative truce in the cold war at the recent Paris meeting of Foreign Ministers. But the very limited agreements were nothing more than a truce. There was no doubt in the minds of the Western Ministers that the cold war would go on.

Soviet comment each day points in the direction of the next Russian offensive—the economic front, where the West is hard pressed.

The Soviet campaign at the moment appears to be on a broad scale and along the following lines:

1. Stepping up propaganda that the West is on the verge of an economic crisis. Falling prices, increasing unemployment, decreasing production—all these economic elements in the west are fuel for this line.

2. Repeated repetition that the West economic troubles are caused by the American policy of grabbing a monopolistic position in the world's post-war trade.

3. Repeated reminders to Western Europeans that they are being supported by Marshall aid and that the "depression" in the United States makes uncertain how long that aid will continue at its present rate.

4. Suggestions that America, worried about a depression, will lose interest in the Atlantic Pact, especially the Military Aid Pro-

Miners Go Back To Work Today

PITTSBURGH, July 5 (UP)—Miners answered work whistles for the first time in 10 days today as most of the United Mine Workers 450,000 members broke tradition by returning to their jobs without a contract.

First work crews reported at mines across the nation at midnight. Absenteeism was relatively high in some areas, especially Western Pennsylvania, because many of the men had not yet returned from vacations, which started June 25.

Everything else was normal in the coal fields, except that about 400,000 UMW members will work only three days this week and every week until John L. Lewis wins a new contract from soft coal producers.

Miners in bituminous pits east of the Mississippi River were under orders from UMW President Lewis to work no more than three days a week until new contracts replacing the pacts which expired June 30 are signed.

Garage, Two Cars Ruined In Fire

The fire was well under way when discovered by the family and the garage could not even be approached to remove the cars.

Another alarm was about 9:30 when the department was called to extinguish a grass fire on Lueddema Boulevard.

AUSTIN, Tex., July 5 (UP)—Gov. Beauford Jester today cracked Texas' financial deadlock with a veto of \$17,000,000 in appropriations and opened the way for the legislature to adjourn tomorrow with a balanced budget.

The governor blue-penciled from the state's \$36,126,442 eleemosynary bill, \$17,562,821 in second-year appropriations.

The \$17,000,000 saved, virtually equaled the anticipated deficit if the entire appropriation had been approved.

His veto message went to both House and Senate where a two-thirds vote in each chamber would be necessary to override the governor's action.

The dollar-slashing move by the governor forestalled the immediate necessity of a money-raising special session of the legislature, probably within the next two weeks.

However, the governor has already promised that Texas' lawmakers can expect to be back at work within the next six months.

Voters will ballot Nov. 8 on a constitutional amendment of the legislature. If the vote carries, the legislature will convene in regular session the first week in January.

If the amendment fails, the governor has committed himself to a special session by that date.

The governor listed three reasons for his veto action. They were:

The eleemosynary bill, as passed by both House and Senate, "does not provide adequate appropriations for state hospitals and special schools during the next biennium, as it makes no provision for an urgently necessary building program."

The building program had been a number one project of the governor's.

Weeks ago he warned the legislature that if an adequate program was not provided, they could expect to return later to complete the job.

He pointed out that the "general revenue fund, as estimated by the comptroller is over-spent by approximately the amount which I have cut out (of the eleemosynary bill)."

His third point was that "by leaving all state functions provided for during the first year of the next biennium—the legislature can adjourn and return at the call of the governor, or upon approval of the annual session amendment, work out an adequate building program, re-vote the operational and maintenance appropriation for state hospitals and special schools for the second year biennium, and provide the necessary revenues to balance the budget."

He expressed hope that during the interval, "a sound and fair tax measure will have been worked out."

He reminded the legislature that as Governor of Texas "I have consistently opposed special sessions and new taxes. To assure adequate support of our eleemosynary program, I am prepared to change both policies. The 51st legislature has done a magnificent job in many respects and will go down in history as one of our most progressive legislatures."

"I pledge to you and the people of Texas," he concluded, "that the 51st legislature will have an opportunity to round out its record by providing adequate eleemosynary facilities and a sound financing program."

FHA May Increase Down Payments

WASHINGTON, July 5 (UP)—

Home buyers who are planning to finance their houses through FHA insured mortgages may have to make larger down payments from now on.

The Federal Housing Administration cautioned its underwriters today to consider declining construction costs when appraising houses for FHA-insured loans.

The result, it said, will be lower mortgages on many new homes. If the builder fails to cut his selling price in line with lower costs, the down payment will be higher. The decline in building costs and materials has been noted since late last year, the underwriters were told.

The day of contingency costs in order to obtain supplies is virtually over, according to a letter to the underwriters from Carl C. Mack, Assistant Commissioner in the Underwriting Division of FHA. In fact, most materials are plentiful and builders are once again receiving discounts under competitive conditions.

Where such discounts are available, the underwriters were told to reduce the value of the house accordingly.

Mack also said that production rates of workmen have improved in many sections of the country, thereby cutting further into the cost of a house.

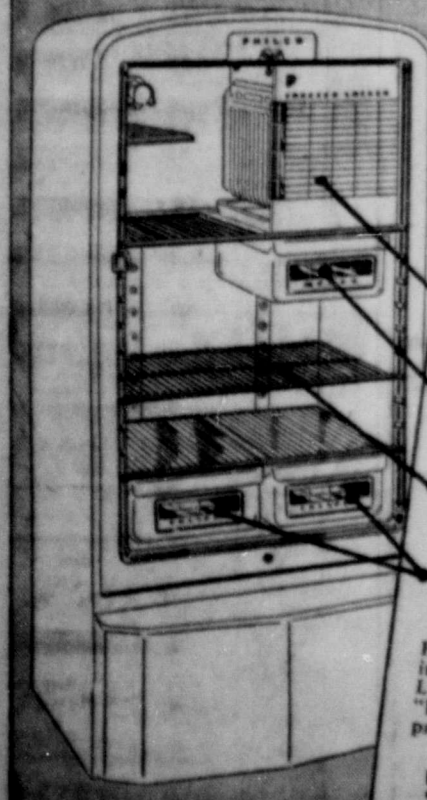

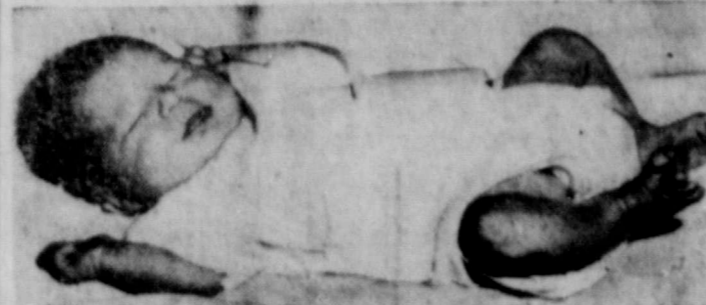

HOLIDAY DEATHS MOST IN NATION'S HISTORY

The nation's observance of the Fourth of July efforts to escape the worst heat wave of the year cost 737 lives in the heaviest holiday carnage in history, a survey showed today.

"This is a national disgrace," a National Safety Council spokesman said. "Something must be done."

In addition, on the basis of safety statistics, an estimated 10,000 persons were injured on the highways, and uncounted thousands of others were injured by fireworks and in other accidents.

The Safety Council said that the previous record was set in 1941 when nearly 700 persons died violently. The council did not have available a breakdown on the receiving discounts under competitive conditions.

deaths. However, it pointed out that Fourth of July holiday tolls always exceed the death counts of other holidays, and added that there was no doubt this one exceeded all others.

By comparison, during a normal three-day summer weekend last August, 383 persons were killed, including 224 on the highways and 48 b drowning.

During the past weekend, New York led all states with a total of 63 deaths, including 16 on the highways and 25 by drowning.

The Safety Council issued a blistering statement that the huge national toll "is a disgrace to a civilized nation and a reflection on America's famed tradition of fairness and sportsmanship."

"It is shameful," council president Ned H. Dear Born said.

"Most of the traffic deaths over the holiday weekend were due directly or indirectly to cheating on traffic rules and to poor sportsmanship that the nation would not tolerate for a moment

in a ball game or other athletic event," he said.

He said the council "is not proud" that it again was able to predict the traffic toll. The council had estimated there would be 290 highway deaths and had warned motorists to use extreme care.

"Instead," Dearborn said, "so many drivers and pedestrians ignored all pleas to common sense, caution and courtesy that our estimate was almost right."

The leading states in the weekend toll in addition to New York included:

Texas, 56 deaths including 32 traffic and 13 drownings; Michigan, 51 deaths, including 11 traffic and 26 drownings; Pennsylvania, 41 deaths including 13 traffic and seven drownings; California, 36 deaths including 23 traffic and four drownings; Indiana, 35 deaths including 18 traffic and nine drownings.

The searing, 100-degree temperatures in many areas were a big factor in the death toll.

Strangely, there were more heat in northern states than in the south.

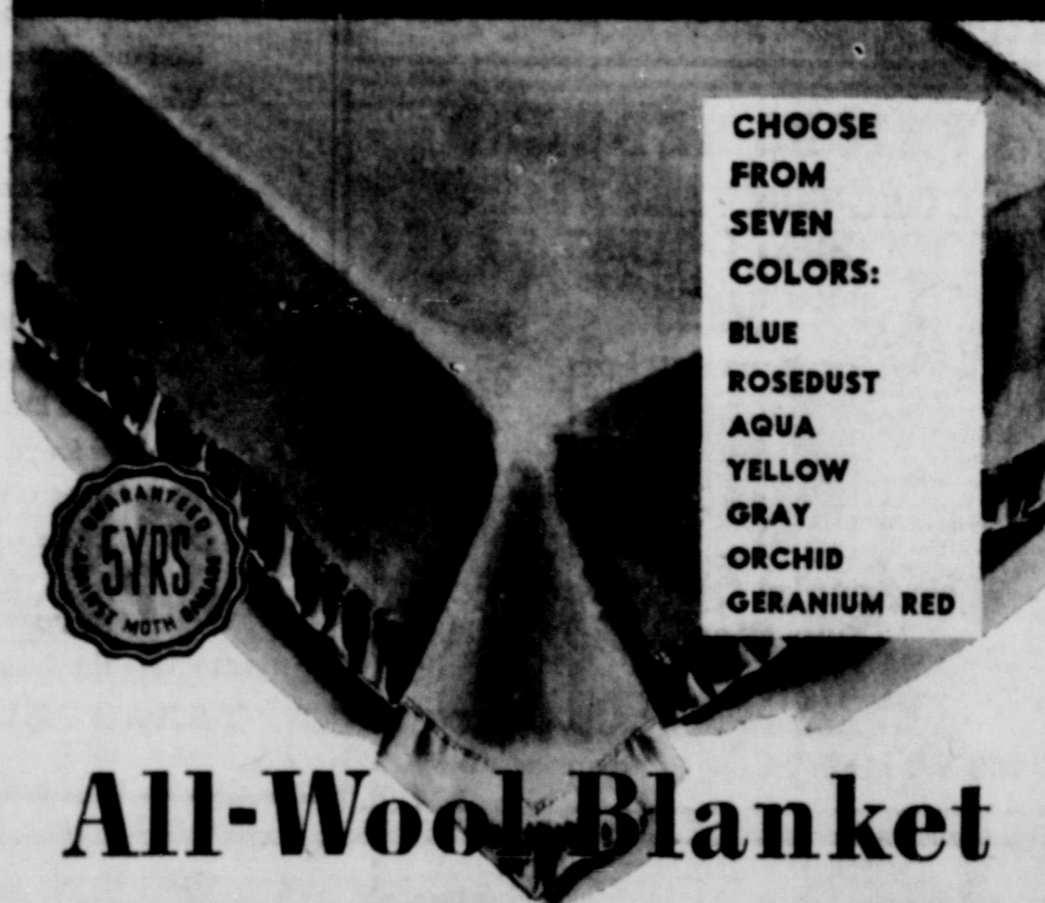
