He also stated that final work on the traffic directing sign for the highway has been completed and that the sign is now in operation east of Weatherford.

The sign advertises the "Fastest Route to El Paso and West Coast' with a map at the bottom shows towns from Weatherford to El

The sign, which will be floodlighted, was underwritten by Ranger and the contract covers three years. With tourist traffic for the season approaching the peak, it was felt that no time should be lost in putting up the sign. J. E. Berlin Bound **Plane Crashes**

BERLIN, July 12 (UP) Berlin-bound American C-54 air lift plane crashed in the Soviet zone of Germany early today.

as to the fate of the crew, believed to total three. A ground search party left Potsdam for the scene of the crash, two miles east of Klaitz and 53 miles west of Berin, just outside the Hamburg-Berlin airlift corridor.

The plane radioed it having engine trouble just before the crash. There have been 15 fatal crashes in the little more than a year that the airlift has been operating, killing 52 persons. Nine of the crushes involved American planes, and 29 Amer-

can fliers have been killed. The latest crash came as the three western occupation powers were awaiting an official explanation from the Russians of their restrictions on western truck traffic to Berlin.

AUSTIN, Tex, July 1 (UP)—Somber, saddened Texans in an ever lengthening line filed quietly pass the bier of Gov. Beauford Jester, paying their final respects today to the man whose unexpected death plunged the state into

In the first hour, an estimated 1,000 persons moved slowly into the capitol's senate chamber, and walked softly across the buff green carpeting to the flag-draped metallic

silver casket. Hundreds of floral tributes banked the chamber.

There was no conversation as friends, acquaintances, high state officials and the plain folk of Texas paused to honor their fallen Chief Executive.

In the line were shirt-sleeved, bare headed men, pig-tailed little girls, farm women and military personnel. Whole families came together. A few carried cameras.

At the entrance, many of the persons paused long en-ough to sign their names. Five books were being used to handle the flow. As the slowly moving line filed from the senate cham-ber, a few of the men and many of the women hastily wip-






