Indications were early Saturday morning that the fourth and last performance of the Junior Chamber of Commerce World Championship Rodeo Saturday night at 8 o'clock would be another sell-out. Plans were being made to handle such a crowd.

The Friday night performance was marked by the first mishap of the rodeo when Lloyd Burt of Cedar Valley sustained a broken arm in the bareback bronc riding event.
According to friends of the rider he was already crippled as a result of an automobile accident several weeks ago.

But the Friday night crowd came to its feet as one w Buck Jones of Ranger made the fastest time yet scored in the rodeo when he threw his steer in the steer wrestling contest in eight seconds flat. He bested Whit Kenney o Stephenville by nine-tenths of a second. Keeney had overcome his steer in 8.9 seconds. 

Snelling Faces Year To Eighteen Months In Prison

SANTA FE, N. M., July 23, (UP)—Tracy Snelling, ousted public relations director at the nearby Los Alamos atomic project faced a term of one year to 18 months in prison today for embezzling Red Cross funds.

The 37-year-old former Navy officer pleaded guilty to embezzlement of \$1,008 in Red Cross funds which he collected as chairman of a fund-raising drive at Los

Snelling stood rigidly at attention as District Judge Louis Armijo sentenced him.

The official, whose disappearance touched off a four-state search which did not end until he suddenly turned up at FBI headquarters in Dallas last Wednesday related morosely that he took the Red Cross money because of many family troubles.

He was paid \$8,500 a year in the Los Alamos post, but he had only \$1.25 when arrested, He could not raise the \$5,000 bond. He told officers that five members of his family were in the hospital during the past year. His wife's mother also died during that time, he said. Mrs. Snelling






