Ranger Has 58 Degree Temperature At Noon Today

'CUBE' OF ICE FROM SKIES MYSTERY STILL

FORT WORTH, Sept. 13 (UP)—A story by three Fort Worth dove-hunting dentists of an estimated 40-pound hunk of ice falling from the heavens drew mainly one explanation today—it came from a passing plane.

Aviation people doubted that explanation. Carswell Air Force Base officials said the B-36 Superfortress doesn't carry ice. And air line officials said it most certainly didn't come from a passenger plane, since most of them carry only clipped ice.

The dental trio was bird hunting on the Eugene Tipton Ranch, northwest of Breckenridge. Dr. Robert Botts said he heard a "whistling sound" and looked up to see "a whistling, whirling object falling."

It landed about 15 feet from Botts, who was waiting for birds at an earthen tank. Botts said it shattered into hundreds of pieces and made a hole in the ground several inches deep.

The ice was "milky white," according to Botts and his companions—Dr. John Tipton, whose uncle operates the ranch, and T. J. Treadwell. When they tasted it, they said, it had a "soapy flavor."

Plans To Build Park Announced

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 13 (UP)—Plans for the joint federal and state development of Bentsen-Rio Grande Park, near Mission, were announced today by the State Parks Board.

The proposal would leave ownership of the park with the state. However, proposals now awaiting final approval would call for the federal government to install recreational facilities as well as park roadways.

Development of the area would be in connection with the proposed Gravity Irrigation Canal in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. A dam at the north end of the park is a part of the proposed gravity irrigation system.

It was recommended that in exchange for a 68 acre strip off the 587 acre park at this site, the federal government undertake the improvements.

The semi-tropical park is bounded on the south by the Rio Grande and on the north by the Military Telegraph road that was built by Gen. Zachary Taylor during his campaign on the Mexican border.

Kelly Heads State Board

AUSTIN, Sept. 13 (UP)—Mayne Kelly, superintendent of the Corsicana Orphans Home, has been chosen as full-time executive director of the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools.

The nine-member board chose Kelly yesterday for the \$10,000-a-year job from a field of 13 applicants.

Under the board's supervision, Kelly will have charge of the state's 22 institutions assigned to the board.

The agency was created by the 51st Legislature to assume control of institutions previously managed by the State Board of Control. It will present a survey of present facilities at a legislative session next January to aid lawmakers in mapping a long-range building program.

Osage Indians Elect New Chief

PAWHUSKA, Okla., Sept. 13 (UP)—John Oberly, a huge 70-year-old fullblood Osage who wears white man's clothes plus the long-braided hair and shoulder blanket of his ancestors, will become chief of the richest Indian tribe in the world.

The Osage tribal council elected Oberly yesterday to the post left vacant by the death last month of Chief Fred Lookout. Oberly will be made chief at a special ceremony here Oct. 3.

POLICE CHIDED FOR FAILURE TO HANDLE BIG SHOT HOODLUMS

DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 13 (UP)—The failure of police forces to cooperate in dealing with "big shot interstate hoodlums" is an "American law enforcement scandal," a federal official said today.

In a speech prepared for delivery to almost 1,000 peace officers, Col. Charles H. Schoeffel, New Jersey state police superintendent, quoted Commissioner H. J. Anslinger of the U. S. Bureau of Narcotics:

"There was more juvenile delinquency created in a day by the spectacle of a Bugsy Siegel . . . cavorting about un molested, than all our boys clubs could correct in a month."

Schoeffel said Anslinger suggested a "blacklist procedure" which might help deal with a situation extremely damaging to the prestige of all law enforcement officers.

Anslinger's statement to Schoeffel on Siegel, the Los Angeles gangster who was slain in his home, was prefaced by an observation that "there should not be, and need not be, any further centralization of police authority in this country. We should make up in cooperation what we lack in consolidation."

Dares Russia To Take Case To UN

BEGRAD, Yugoslavia, Sept. 13 (UP)—A Yugoslav Politburo member today dared Russia to take to the United Nations alleged Yugoslav resigns on Albania after Premier Marshall Tito urged Russia to "clear things up" with his country without use of bayonets.

Moshe Pijade said a UN investigation would show who actually threatened Albania, and it wouldn't be Yugoslavia. The Yugoslav Communist party has defended the independence of Albania for 30 years, he said, and believes the country should remain free and independent.

Writing in the Communist party organ Borba, Pijade said: "We really have nothing against the desire of Novakje Vrenja (a Moscow weekly) that this matter be brought before the UN. Let them bring it before the UN. Yugoslavia will lose nothing by it."

Tito's remarks were made to a group of five miners Sunday and released by the government press office.

"Every working class is capable of fighting and winning a new social order," Tito said. "Progressive ideas were never correctly disseminated, nor was a social transformation ever brought about by bayonets, which can only enslave."

Andrews Murder Trial Underway

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 13 (RNS)—Selection of a jury for the trial of Louis G. (Step) Andrews, 34, facing a charge of murder in 90th district court, was underway here Monday.

Special venire of 124 men was called. By noon the figure was reduced to 76 and two jurors had been selected. District Attorney Ben Lea, who is qualifying the jury, expected to complete selection of 12 men by Monday night.

Andrews is charged with murder following the June 10 fatal shooting of Policeman J. L. Shaw of Breckenridge. Shaw and Constable Fritz Rudder had attempted to arrest Andrews on a disturbance charge when the alleged shooting near the railroad roundhouse occurred.

Andrews has been held in the ed in the right leg, but was not seriously injured. Shaw lived approximately 20 hours after the shooting.

Andrews had been held in the county jail here without bond since that time.

The prosecution will be conducted by County Attorney Joe Gracey and District Attorney Dean L. H. Welch of Breckenridge, will plead for the defense. Judge Floyd Jones is presiding judge for 90th district court.

Dean has said he will ask the death penalty.

DEVALUATION OF FOREIGN CURRENCIES STUDIED

By Lyle C. Wilson United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (UP)—A proposal for devaluation of many foreign currencies was submitted to the monetary experts of 48 nations today as a major step toward solving the worldwide dollar shortage.

The devaluation scheme was dropped into the laps of the governors of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank who assembled here in search of a way to unscramble world trade and raise living standards.

The fund directors who suggested the idea ducked the red-hot issue of which countries should devalue their currencies. But it appeared to be pointed squarely at the British, who have been trying desperately to squeak through their present economic crisis without further lowering the value of the pound.

The British won at least a temporary respite at the close of the six day Anglo-American-Canadian dollar conference which ended yesterday with a limited agree-

LOWEST MIDDAY READING HERE SINCE APRIL FIRST

Ranger had its first taste of winter today when the noon reading of the thermometer stood at 58 degrees, the lowest noon reading since April 1 when the reading was 53 degrees, and the lowest midday reading in September in the history of the Times weather bureau.

The "norther" moved in on Ranger about 6 o'clock this morning, bringing a fog, drizzle and a fairly strong wind. At 8 o'clock this morning the temperature was 62 degrees and by noon the thermometer had pulled back to the 58 degrees was recorded but the twas during the night and was rain-borne.

At noon Monday the temperature was 96 which means that in the 24 hour period from noon Monday to noon today there was a 38 degree drop in temperature.

The first cold moved across Texas today bringing rain, fog and strong winds.

The front at mid-morning extended as far south as Dallas and across to the Big Bend country in to New Mexico and should reach the Gulf of Mexico by tomorrow morning, said Forecaster A. M. Hamrick of the Dallas Weather Bureau.

Temperatures dropped rapidly as the front moved southward. The mercury fell from 75 at 7:30 to 68 at Fort Worth within two hours.

The Panhandle felt the cool weather last night and temperatures there this morning were in the low 50's. Dalhart had a low of 48 degrees at 6:30 A. M.

Some mid-morning temperature readings included Amarillo, 53 degrees and 13-mile winds; Lubbock, 52 and 22-mile winds; Cleburne, 54 and 18-mile winds; Childress, 55 and 14-mile winds; Wichita Falls, 57 and 25-mile winds; Salt Flat, 64 and rain; Guadalupe Pass, 58 and rain; El Paso, 69 and rain; Midland, Thunder showers and 60 degrees; Abilene, 59 and drizzle; Mineral Wells, 64 and drizzle.

South of the front, southerly winds still prevailed and temperatures were in the 80's. Waco reported 85 at mid-morning and broken clouds; Austin, Bryan and Lufkin 83 and broken clouds; Houston, 86 and low clouds; San Antonio, 88 and cloudy.

Generally, rain accompanied movement of the front and overcast conditions were expected for the entire state by late today.

The outlook was for scattered thundershowers in the south and central portions of East Texas and in the extreme southern portion tonight. A low of 45 was forecast for the upper Red River Valley tonight.

In West Texas, considerable cloudiness with scattered showers appeared in prospect with a low tonight of 40 to 45 degrees in the Panhandle and upper portion of the South Plains.

The cool front came on the heels of one of the hottest days of the fall. The mercury touched 101 degrees at Laredo and Alice yesterday, 100 at Wichita Falls and Presidio, 99 at Mineral Wells and 98 at Dallas. The 98-degree reading in Dallas tied the all-time high for Sept. 12 set in 1930.

Pancho Gonzales Displays Both Power and Artistry at the Net

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Pancho Gonzales put the breath of life back in professional tennis successfully defending the national singles championship in that magnificent comeback against Ted Schroeder.

Young Gonzales is practically certain to pair with Jack Kramer in a money tour opening at Madison Square Garden in late October.

The hot Tamale from the wrong side of the Los Angeles tracks has no job, therefore no alternative. There is the little woman and the kid. Gonzales probably would have joined the money ranks even had Schroeder belted him out of his title, which the truck refrigeration magnate threatened to do in the second set.

But it goes without saying that the gaudy Mexican lad is much better bucks office as a two-time champion.

Schroeder had already announced his intention of remaining the 100 per cent amateur.

So without Gonzales the play-for-pay boys would have been out of business.

While he already has definitely established himself among the stickouts, Gonzales has even greater potentialities. At 21, the scar-faced Latin has not yet exploited all his tremendous possibilities. He does naturally what it takes others years to acquire. Every other top tennis player reached his peak at 24 or 25. William T. Tilden II broke through for the first time at 27.

If he takes care of himself, and watches his diet, there is no telling how good he will become.

Not a few observers will be surprised if Gonzales catches up with Kramer on their trip.

"I can't see anybody pushing Pancho around," says Kramer.

He had the steadiness of a real tennis player in the last two sets. He acquired considerable in a year, including tactics.

"Service and volley is the combination that gets points, and he has it. All he needs is a break here and there along the line."

By every rule in the book, Gonzales should have folded after dropping the record first set, 16-18. It looked that way when the next went quickly and quietly, 2-6.

But Gonzales also proved his gameness by bouncing back to beat Schroeder, an extraordinary competitor and five-set player, in his pet fifth set. Schroeder won four five-set matches at Wimbledon, two more reaching the final at Forest Hills.

Rarely has there been a power player with Pancho Gonzales' delicate artistic touch at the net.

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 13 (UP)—P. E. Womack, Austin negro clergyman today filed with Secretary of State Ben Ramsey as a candidate for election to the State Board of Education.

Election of the new 21-member board, authorized under the Gilmer-Aikin education reform acts, will be held Nov. 8.

Womack, together with his attorney, filed a petition that he said carried the signatures of more than 200 negro, Latin-American and white residents of Austin.

The clergyman, 58 is a minister of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.
