GLADEWATER, Sept. 14 (UP)—A successful oil strike near Stephens, Ark., led today to plans for a \$500,000 hotel and a \$37,000 restaurant here.

Gladewater Oilman Claude Lee had promised city officials that he would build the hotel if he and his partner, Dick Burnett of Gladewater and Dallas, struck a good well in their venture.

Yesterday, Burnett announced that Lee was ready to make good. In addition, Burnett said he planned to build a swank restaurant at the Gladewater Municipal Airport.

Gladewater lost its major hotel when the St. Clair burned a year ago.

Hospital Escapee In Ft. Worth Jail

FORT WORTH, Sept. 14 (UP)—Elisha Timothy Morton, 28, who escaped from the Veterans' Hospital in Waco by "just walking away" Saturday afternoon, was in city jail here today.

He was arrested yesterday on a routine drunk charge, and was identified shortly afterwards.

He was charged with murder in the fatal stomping of his father, John Morton, in Fort Worth on Oct. 3, 1948. He was committed to the Abilene State Hospital on Dec. 10, 1948, and transferred to the Waco hospital last April 19.

Jim Wells Jury Taking Recess

ALICE, Tex., Sept. 13—The Jim Wells County grand jury, which has revived a bitter 1948 Democratic primary election dispute, was in recess today.

It will resume its inquiry tomorrow. Seven witnesses have been subpoenaed for the next session, including Luis Salas, election judge in now-famous Precinct 13, and B. F. Donald, secretary of the county Democratic executive committee.

Precinct 13 was the box that ex-Gov. Coke R. Stevenson claimed beat him in the runoff primary for the U. S. Senatorial nomination. He lost the statewide race by 87 votes. And in Box 13, Stevenson charged, fraudulent returns were made, benefitting his successful opponent, Lyndon B. Johnson, by 203 votes.

When the grand jury disclosed that Salas and Donald had been subpoenaed, speculation began immediately that the grand jury had decided to delve anew into the mystery of the missing tally sheets for Precinct 13.

At a 1948 inquiry, Salas testified that he borrowed Donald's tally sheets to check against his own, and that both copies were stolen from his car.

Others subpoenaed included: E. M. Brownlee, an election official in Alice Precinct 1 and a member of the county Democratic executive committee; Olin Love, Alice automobile dealer; Clarence Martens, chairman of the county executive committee, and two clerks in precinct 13, Eufanio Soliz and Enriquez Acero.

Chief witness before the grand jury yesterday was Kellis Dibruff of San Antonio, an investigator for Stevenson after the 1948 election. Before he entered the jury room, he told reporters he had "new evidence, never before given to any official investigating agency" dealing with precinct 13.

Treasury Report Show Up Red

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (UP)—The treasury has struck a balance for the first ten weeks of the new fiscal year and reports itself in the red for \$3,304,000,000 (B).

There were years during the Coolidge and Hoover administrations when that sum would have paid all government expenses for 12 months.

On a weekly basis since fiscal 1950 began on July 1, the treasury has been spending beyond its income at an average rate of \$330,478,000 (M). Weekly income in the same period averaged \$507,137,000 (M) and the weekly average of spending was \$837,161,000 (M) every seven days.

The most significant figure in the daily treasury report which covered the first ten days of the fiscal year was on spending. It cost the taxpayers nearly \$2,000,000,000 (B) more to run the federal government during the first ten weeks of this fiscal year than it cost during the same period a year ago. That is a big increase.

TITO CHARGED WITH PLOT TO INVADE ROMANIA

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Sept. 14 (UP)—Marshal Tito was accused today of planning to invade Romania and help overthrow the Moscow-dominated Hungarian government.

The Romanian newspaper Scanteia, which made the charges, said the plot was supported by the United States in an effort to set the Soviet satellites at war with Russia under Tito's command.

A top Yugoslav official countered with charges that recent Russian troop movements on Yugoslavia's northern frontier were a "plot with arms" to frighten American aid away from Yugoslavia and prevent other satellite states from following Tito's course.

In another Yugoslav blast at Russia, Yugoslav Deputy Foreign Minister Ales Bebler said that Russia was demanding "unity at any cost" among the Soviet satellites because of the Kremlin's fear of atomic war.

AIR FORCE TO GRANT INTERVIEWS SEPT. 19-20

Interviews will be given September 19 and 20 to young men and women from the Ranger area interested in a career in aviation as an officer in the U. S. Air Force.

Headquarters will be established at Abilene by a cadet interview team. They will explain career opportunities, assist applicants in filling out application forms, and give qualifying examinations to those seeking Aviation Cadet training.

Three types of training are open to young men - the Aviation Cadet Pilot Program, the Aviation Cadet Navigator Program, and the Officer Candidate Program. The latter program, which prepares officers for non flying junior duties in administrative and technical fields, is open to both men and women who are qualified.

The two Aviation Cadet Programs, either for pilot or for navigator training, are similar in requirements and methods of instruction. Graduates receive commissions as second lieutenants in the Air Force. After completing the 1-year course, which includes approximately 265 hours of flying, graduates of pilot training receive flying assignments as rated pilots on active duty with the Air Force. Graduates of the 1-year navigator course, who spend 184 hours in the air in "flying classrooms" are assigned as rated navigators on long-range bombers of the Strategic Air Command or big transports of the world-wide Military Air Transport Service. To be eligible for either pilot

or navigator training, male citizens must be between the ages of 20 and 26 1/2; with at least 2 years of college or the ability to pass an equivalent examination; and with high physical and moral qualifications.

Men and women applying for Air Force Officer Candidate School must be between the ages of 20 1/2 and 26 1/2; with at least 2 years of college or the ability to pass an equivalent examination; in good physical condition; and with high moral and personal qualifications.

Training Course Moved Up Week

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 13—The Economic Mobilization Course for Armed Forces Reservists and leading industrialists which was scheduled for Dallas to begin October 24th has been advanced one week, resulting in the course opening on the 17th of October and lasting through October 28th.

The Dallas Chamber of Commerce also announced that the school would be held in the Scottish Rite Temple at Harwood and Canton Streets in Dallas.

The course is conducted by the Industrial College of the Armed Forces which is located in Washington and is given for 150 selected Reserve Officers of the various Armed Forces and 150 "top flight" civilians of important economic and industrial firms.

The purpose of the course is to prepare selected officers of the Armed Forces for important command, staff and planning assignments in the National Military Establishment and to prepare chosen civilians for important industrial mobilization planning assignments in any Government agency.

The course will conduct a study of all phases of our national economy and interrelating the economic factors with political, military and psychological factors. It will also study all aspects of joint logistic planning and the interrelation of this planning to joint strategic planning and other national policy planning. Finally, it will study the peace-time and potential war-time governmental organizations for the most effective war-time control.

This compared with \$5.82 in the previous week and was 15.8 per cent below the \$6.95 of the comparable week a year ago. Since July 5, the index has had a net rise of 19 cents.

The index is the sum total of the price per pound of 31 foods at wholesale. In the week ended yesterday, prices of 15 foods advanced, 7 declined and 9 remained unchanged.

By EDWARD V. ROBERTS United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (UP)

Secretary of State Dean Acheson and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin today mapped cold war strategy for politically divided Continental Europe.

It appeared likely that a maneuver designed to widen the breach between Marshal Tito and the Kremlin may come of their continuing review of world issues.

Acheson said at a news conference that the top aim of today's talks is analysis of developments in Germany, Austria and other continental points of friction between the east and west.

He indicated this would be preliminary to discussion of similar problems tomorrow when French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman joins the talks. Acheson said the Far East also will be discussed at tomorrow's big three meeting in view of France's interest in that part of the world.

Acheson said that he and Bevin agree on the urgent necessity of concluding a Japanese peace treaty. He said the United States thought it urgent two years ago, when it proposed a preliminary conference which Russia blocked by demanding a veto. The secretary said we still think it urgent and are going over the whole matter in an effort to evolve a new approach.

Acheson did not reply directly when asked concerning the possibilities of a Japanese treaty without Russian participation. He said the great objective is to bring everybody concerned into the treaty.

The two foreign ministers discussed the Far East and Middle East in yesterday's talks, leaving the Balkans and the rest of Europe for today.

A communique, which set the tone for the continuing talks, said they were of the "greatest help" in development of policy along parallel lines.

The U. S. has loaned Tito's Yugoslav government \$20,000,000 (M). Britain is giving favorable consideration to a sterling loan of the equivalent of \$32,000,000 (M). Washington diplomats describe both moves as "financing trouble for Stalin."

It was assumed that Bevin and Acheson would discuss a "parallel" Anglo-American stand, in the event the Stalin-Tito feud comes up at the United Nations Assembly in New York next week, or at any attendant conversations. It now appears certain that the big four foreign ministers will meet, at least informally, during the assembly.

Some well-informed officials here believe Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei V. Vishinsky may try to end western support of Tito, possibly by offering cold war concessions elsewhere.

A basis for such a "deal," as seen in some quarters, would be Soviet acquiescence to western demands for a veto-less Japanese peace conference.

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 14 (UP)—The state continued its testimony today in the murder trial of Louis G. Andrews, charged in the shooting last June 10 of Policeman J. L. Shaw.

Six witnesses took the stand yesterday to tell of seeing Andrews prior to the shooting, as he went to get his gun.

Shaw was shot to death when he and Constable Fritz Rudder attempted to arrest Andrews near the local railway roundhouse.

TYLER, Sept. 14 (UP)—The East Texas Fair and Texas Jersey Cattle Club Show had an international air today. Fifteen Mexican agricultural leaders were in attendance.

In addition to being honor guests at the fair through tomorrow, the Mexicans were touring stock farms, oil fields and rose acreages in the Tyler area.

AUSTIN, Sept. 14 (UP)—The State of Texas faced a court order today requiring it to make a \$265,000 refund in taxes to the Phillips Chemical Co.

The sum represents taxes and interest paid under protest since September, 1948, by the Phillips Chemical Company plant at Berger. Phillips later purchased the plant.

New Whitney Gym Gutted By Fire

WHITNEY, Tex., Sept. 14 (UP)—An early morning fire destroyed the Whitney school gymnasium today, causing damages estimated at \$60,000.

Construction of the gymnasium had been completed this summer, and the only building had

been in use only two days. The fire destroyed rooms used for classes by 200 students, gym facilities, and much classroom and football equipment.

Volunteer fire fighters of Hillsboro joined Whitney firemen in battling the flames.

School officials said \$30,000 insurance was carried on the building.

Cause of the fire was not determined immediately.

Dr. Ross Fails To Regain Sanity

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 14 (UP)—Dr. Lloyd I. Ross, adjudged insane after being convicted of murder in connection with the slaying of four persons, has failed to respond to almost three months of treatment, Dr. A. T. Hanretta, superintendent of the Austin State Hospital, reported today.

"I think you could say he has improved physically. Mentally, he has not," Dr. Hanretta said.

Ross was convicted of slaying Mrs. Willard York. Three other members of the family were shot to death from ambush on a lonely Comal County road on May 25, 1947.

The Harvard-trained doctor was adjudged insane by a 22nd District Court at La Grange and admitted to the state hospital on June 17.

Under law, Dr. Hanretta is required to report to the court on Ross' condition within 90 days of his admittance.

The former San Antonio surgeon is retained in a maximum security ward where he is under observation "21 hours a day," Dr. Hanretta said.

Patsy Doing All Right


