The blast was announced by President Truman after a cabined meeting in which he told his administration partners that the A-bomb is no longer exclusively ours.

MOSCOW, Sept. 24 (UP) resident Truman's statement concerning a Soviet atomic explosion did not appear today in morning editions of the Russian press.

Main newspapers devoted almost three columns to Thursday's United Nations proceedings.

The sole reference to atomie energy in the press today appear-ed in a dispatch in the government newspaper Izvestia. The dispatch concerned Anglo-American differences in the matter of sharing echnical information and distribution of uranium are from the Belgain Congo.

The dispatch said the British were highly displeased because the United States was not treating them as working partners.
