Suspects Held In Thornton Case Released

HOUSTON, Tex., Sept. 27 (UP)—A couple arrested here last night for questioning in the tourist cabin murder of Thornton in Amarillo last June 23 has "no connection" with the crime, detectives said today.

Arwine Sanity Hearing Still On

They were picked up last night because they answered the general description of the couple last seen with Thornton, the 57-year-old president of the United States Nitroglycerine Co., and world-famous for his skill and daring with all types of explosives.
The man admitted his home is in Amarillo, and he is at liberty

on bond on a robbery charge in Coleman, Tex. His lady friend said she was from Chicago.
Detective Lt. Sid Roe said they were taken to police headquarters because they had been seen with two other persons, well-known to police.

Thornton was killed in a vicious attack at an Amarillo tourist court. His skull was battered, and he was garrotted with a towel. His killers, believed to be a young couple seen with him the day of the slaying, robbed him of some \$3,000 in cash, his Cadillac automobile and a diamond ring.

Arwine Sanity Hearing Still On

DECATUR, Sept. 27 (UP)—A sanity hearing for W. I. (Ike) Arwine, charged with murdering Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Mash, today went into its second day.
Yesterday, counsel for the 59-year-old former constable intro-

duced an affidavit claiming that Arwine, a former constable, was insane, both at the time of the twin slaying and now.

Eight defense witnesses testified on Arwine's actions during the period around Aug. 23, when the Mashes were shot to death at their lonely farm home near Lake Bridgeport.

Arwine Sanity Hearing Still On

County Attorney Tom McMurray introduced a confession signed by Arwine while he was in jail

at Denton. McMurray also introduced two witnesses.

Arwine surrendered to policemen some 72 hours after the shooting and was indicted on a murder with malice charge in the death of Mrs. Mash, who had accused him of criminal assault.

Arwine Sanity Hearing Still On

If adjudged insane, Arwine can not be tried on the murder charge.

PORT ARTHUR AGAIN HEADS HI FOOTBALL

We don't know, but it looks like the Bulldogs have huddled a rough one for this week's game. Burkbur nett who the Bulldogs play here Friday night not only hasn't lost a game this year but they haven't even been scored on. Furthermore they will be the heaviest team that the Ranger gridsters have faced this year. They also are known to have some real tricky plays that may give the locals a little trouble.

Heaviest man on the team is a 205 pound tackle, Turpin. Lightest man on the team is a 135 pound back and the rest of 'em range from 150 to 177 pounds. From the looks of things it looks like an aerial route and speed will have to be counted on by the Bulldogs.

As for the Rangers, their going may be a little lighter. The Tarleton College boys are reported to weigh about the same as Ranger's college boys and no spectacular victories have been their this year. The defeated Clifton Junior College 34 to 0 but the next week, took a 41 to 0 licking from Tyler.

It was pointed out today that the game will likely be a good one. For one thing the local college has been paying B teams from senior colleges and this is the first game this year with a junior college team.

Ranger has won one game and lost one, too, but the scores weren't so lopsided. Hardin-Simmons B team took their game 13 to 6 while we won from Hardin College by a 7 to 6 score.

The Rangers go to Stephenville Thursday night for the game with Tarleton.

DALLAS, Sept. 27 (UP)—Port Arthur's Yellow Jackets moved back to their old familiar place at the top of the weekly Dallas News football poll which determines the 10 top Texas schoolboy teams.

Port Arthur steamrolled Houston Milby, 50-6, last week and received 228 of a possible 240 points handed out by 24 voting sports writers who contribute each week to the newspaper poll.

Austin, the No. 1 team last week, dropped to third place with 183 as Amarillo wedged into the No. 2 spot with 193 points.

Wichita Falls moved up a notch into a fourth-place tie with Lubbock.

The second five teams included three new aggregations—Texarkana, Dallas Sunset and Corsicana. They replaced Abilene, Breckenridge and Houston Davis.

Abilene slipped to 12th place after bowing to Amarillo. Breckenridge dropped to 14th in losing to Wichita Falls and Davis tumbled out of the top 20 by coming out on the short end of a 27-7 upset fray with Freeport.

Texarkana stormed into sixth behind Marshall and ahead of Baytown which got by Lufkin, 8-0.

Barges Idled By Mo-Pac Strike

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 27 (UP)—Another industry today reported feeling the impact of the Missouri Pacific strike.

The Federal Fringe Lines announced that 22 barges loaded with steel are virtually out of

service because of the idle railroad.

The barges, seven tied up at Kansas City, Mo., with four more on their way there and 11 docked at St. Louis, cannot unload at the terminals served by the Missouri Pacific.

Meanwhile, Roy E. Davidson, spokesman for the four striking brotherhoods, has declined to comment on trustee Guy A. Thompson's charge of "feather-bedding" which Thompson claims would cost the carrier \$12,000,000.

Thompson stated that the 282 claims over which the unions struck are based upon an interpretation of operating rules. As the strike continues, 5,000 firemen, engineers, trainmen and conductors and 20,000 additional workers remained idle. The strike was called September 9.

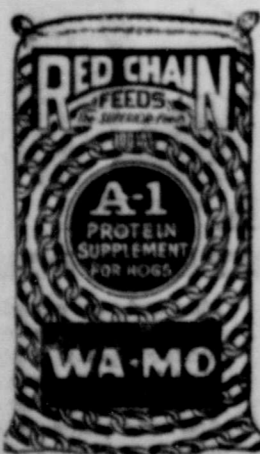

Wilson, married and the father of three children, was found dead in the bathroom of his home yesterday. A 16-gauge shotgun from which one shell had been fired was by his body.

HOUSTON, Tex., Sept. 27 (UP)—A verdict of death by natural causes was returned today in the death of L. C. Carter, 82, found dead in his room yesterday afternoon by detectives.

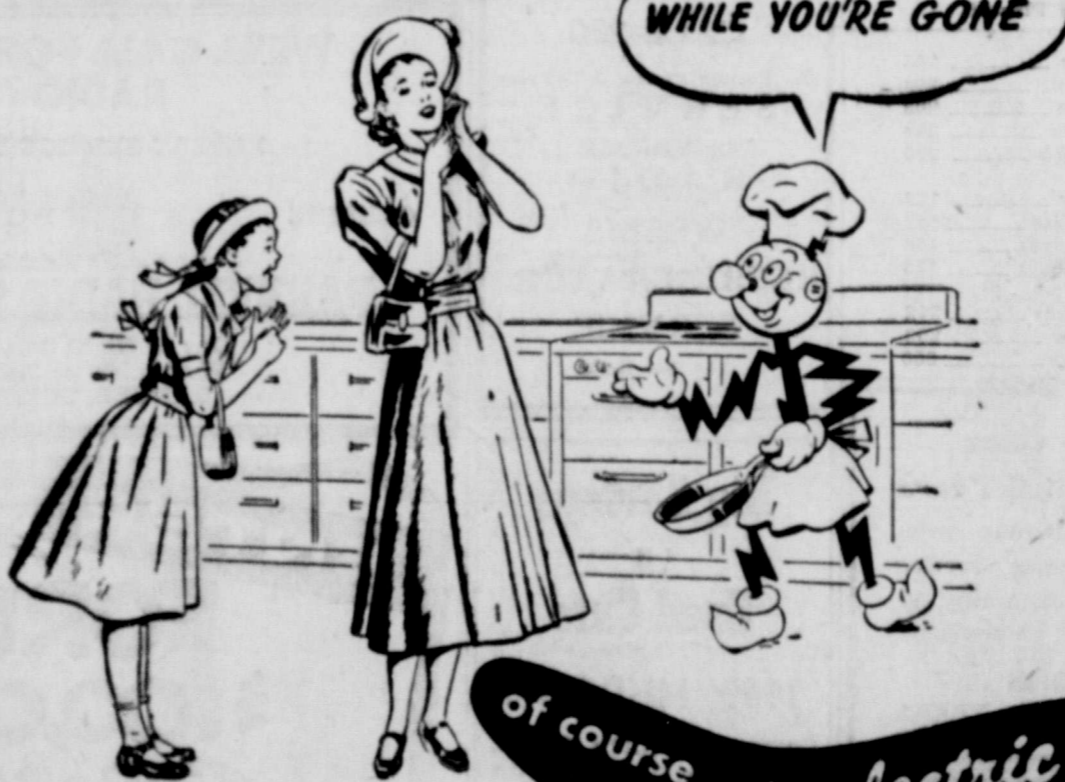
