#### American Experts Still Tracing Information on Nazi Germany

BY DOUGLAS LARSEN NEA Staff Correspondent

ASHINGTON-(NEA)-One of the important and unheralded

ASHINGTON—(NEA)—One of the important and unheralded jobs being done most efficiently by Allied occupation authorities a Europe is a careful writing of the history of the Nazi rule in Germany and of the Axis' side of the war.

Fortunately the Western countries captured most of the official size records and documents. By pooling what each one collected, american, English and French experts have been able to piece together a pretty detailed and intelligent record of everything that went not the growth of Nazism and the prosecution of the war.

There are some important gaps, however. The Russians hold many of the official files and documents. These records have been moved out of Germany and what they contain and how complete they are, nobody but the Russians know. They have flatly refused to discuss the matter with the Allied scholars.

In the last month of the war many important and incriminating papers were destroyed by high Nazi officials. But their system of second keeping was so efficient it ended up outsmarting them. In a great many cases carbons and copies of destroyed originals have been cocated in different places. But it is still impossible for the experts of determine just what gaps exist because of papers being destroyed or which are due to the papers being in Russian hands.

ERMAN foreign office records and technical data on various sciendevelopments, unfortunately, have the biggest gaps. 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




