## WEATHER REVERSES FORECAST CLOUDY WITH SHOWERS DUE

Heavy rains, ranging up to around five inches at San Antonio, fell in many sections of Texas last night and early today and weathermen forecast a cool, wet afternoon and night for football fans.

Earlier forecasts had called for fair skies today, but the prankish weather picture did an about-face during the night and generally cloudy skies greeted most of the state at daylight today.

A violent electrical storm accompanied the heavy downpour at San Antonio, striking two power substations, the Municipal Airport Control Tower and at least one residence in sporadic displays during the storm which started around 8:30 P. M.

Four inches of rain were recorded in downtown San Antonio, while 5-1-2 inches was reported on the north side of the city, but aside from flooded underpasses

## U. S. PLANS BITTER DENIAL OF CZECH ACCUSATIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22—(UP)—The United States today planned a blistering denial of Czechoslovakia charges that five Americans ran a spy ring from the United States Embassy in Prague.

The United States also was expected to demand the immediate release of one of the accused men, Samuel Meryn of New York, who was arrested by Czech police.

A long Czech note to the United States said Meryn, three other American men and Louise Schaffner of Lancaster, Pa., described as "unusually attractive"—organized a spy network that reached far across Czechoslovakia.

The note said Czech members of the ring were equipped with

## Social Security Head To Visit Here Wednesday

E. Glenn McNatt, Field Representative of the Ablene Office of the Social Security Administration will be at the Retail Merchants Association Office, in Ranger on Wednesday, October 26, 1949, at 3:30 p. m.

This is a regular service for local residents to give them an opportunity to file claims for social security benefits, obtain original or duplicate social security cards, or discuss any questions they might have in connection with the Federal old-age and survivors insurance plan.

This federal insurance, which covers employees in commerce and industry, provides for the payment of monthly retirement and survivor's benefits to qualified workers and their families. Retirement benefits are payable to the worker and certain members of his family when he reaches 65 and is no longer working under Social Security. Survivor's benefits are payable to eligible members of the insured worker's family in case he dies at any age. No benefits can be paid unless a claim is filed with the social security office.

## Car Found Here Stolen Last Week In Oklahoma

Chief W. G. Pounds reported this morning that it had been determined that the 1941 Ford car found here Thursday morning early had been stolen at Clinton, Oklahoma, a week ago Saturday night.

It was further established through checking with the Auto Theft Bureau in Dallas that the license on the car at the time it was found had been stolen at Vernon, Texas. It had been issued to a 1941 Chevrolet car.

Police searching about in the stolen car came across a map on which a route from Arkansas through Oklahoma, north Texas as far as Jacksboro had been marked. Circles had been drawn around Clinton and Vernon.

No further clues had been uncovered today in the robbery of the Vaughn Home and Auto Store which happened Thursday morning, also. Local police theorize that the stolen car had been used by the burglars who entered the store, and who apparently attempted to break into the Dr. Pepper Bottling Company Plant. The car was found parked by the plant and it was discovered that an attempt had been made to unlock a window in the plant.

American officials, scoffing at the charges, linked the latest cry of "spy" with a growing purge of Czech and Polish government officials. Reliable information reaching here indicated that between 12 and 15 employees of the Polish foreign office and economic ministry in Warsaw have suffered sharp demotions or have disappeared.

These purges—comparatively mild to far—and the spy charges against the Americans were interpreted here as part of a drive to widen the breach between the West and the peoples behind the iron curtain.

Other invited guests will be the presidents and secretaries of the Eastland and Breckenridge Chambers of Commerce and their highway committees, and the people of the rural area along the Caddo-Ranger highway.

The celebration is to mark the completion of the new Caddo-Ranger highway.

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All proceeds from the occasion will be used in band work.

### Funeral Plans For E. A. Miller Are Pending

Funeral services for Albert F. (Mike) Miller will be held Sunday afternoon at 4:30 at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. David C. Ham officiating. Interment will be in Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Miller died of a heart attack about 10 o'clock Friday night at his home. He had attended the Ranger-Camanche football game and while still at the game complained of feeling ill. He died a few minutes after reaching his home.

He was born in Goliad, May 15, 1884 and had resided in Ranger for about 30 years. He was a member of the First Baptist Church and had been an employee of the Lone Star Producing Company prior to his retirement on last May 15. After he retired from service with that company he went into the filling station business with Frank Penn and still held that connection at the time of his death. He was married to Mrs. Ruth Musick, December 26, 1943, in Ranger.

Survivors are Mrs. Miller of Ranger; two sons, W. M. Miller of Tyler and A. J. Miller of Amarillo; two daughters, Mrs. J. C. Helzel of Headton, Oklahoma and E. L. Friscilla Miller with the Navy Nurses' Corps at San Diego, California; five brothers, A. L. Miller of Sacramento, John Miller, Henry Miller, Sam Miller and Jim Miller, all of San Antonio. Five grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services will be held at 4:30 p. m. at the home of Mrs. Miller, 1115 E. 1st St., in Ranger.

Western power efforts to invoke the arbitration machinery provided in the peace treaties were frustrated when Russia refused to participate. Russia supported the Balkan countries' contention that no dispute existed and that any attempt to investigate the church trials would constitute interference in their internal affairs.

The international court was expected to hand down an advisory opinion—but not adjudicate the actual charges—before the next session of the general assembly, scheduled for next September. The Balkan human rights was continued on the assembly's agenda until that time.

The United States yesterday introduced the Czechoslovak purge arrests into the debate on human rights in the Balkans, but drew no immediate reply from the Eastern European countries.

U. S. delegate Benjamin V. Cohen told the assembly:

"Reports come to us regarding waves of a new despotism sweeping over the once free Czechoslovakia... men lacking in confidence in the genuine vitality of their own ideas, forsake the paths of reason and freedom and resort to the eternally discredited and illusory shortcuts of tyranny and force."

The general assembly debate centered about protests from Britain and the United States concerning the Balkan church trials. The Balkan countries, with Russian support, contended that the trials did not violate human rights provisions of their treaties with the western countries and the Soviet Union.

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 22.—(UP)—Today was the day after Christmas for two-year-old John "Buster" Evans, victim of an incurable illness.

All the weakening child had to do was turn his head to see that Santa Claus had truly paid him a visit last night.

There was glittering Christmas tree near the couch where he rested, and under the tree was a heap of presents sent by friends and neighbors.

Santa Claus, a beard-wearing University of Texas student named Grady Robertson, had paid Buster a merry call. He trudged in laden with a bag full of toys and picture books that delighted the curly-headed blond boy.

Buster, despite his suffering from a malignant tumor, enjoyed old St. Nick's visit.

He was too weak to walk, but he kept up a cheerful appearance as his friends, large and small, bade him "Merry Christmas."

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Echols, hovered in the background. They prayed that doctors' predictions that Buster had little chance of recovering were wrong.

"He's had so little time to enjoy Christmas," Mrs. Echols said.

Physicians told her that if Buster is still alive on the day most folks celebrate Christmas, he will not be strong enough to enjoy the festivities.

So yesterday, little more than a month before Buster's third birthday, the boy had his own special yuletide season.

The tinsel-draped Christmas tree will stand, Mrs. Echols said, until Dec. 25—and longer, if necessary.

"I always hated to take the Christmas tree down," she confided.

## Sullivan Denies He Was Asked To Resign Post

BOSTON, Oct. 22 (UP)—Former secretary of Navy John L. Sullivan says neither defense secretary Louis Johnson "nor anyone else" asked him to resign his cabinet post.

Sullivan, who resigned April 26 after charging Johnson had scuttled the Navy's super-aircraft carrier without consulting him, last night denied a statement made earlier in the day by Johnson before the House Armed Services Committee in Washington, D. C.

Johnson had testified that Sullivan "was not for unification" and would not support unification. I told him there was no room on my team on the civilian side of defense for any person who is not enthusiastically for unification."

Sullivan said he was asked to resign his cabinet post.

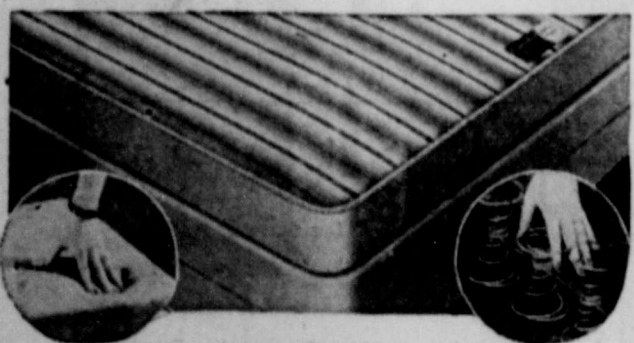

**Says Anti-Trust Suit Threat To A&P Employees**

Current Anti-Trust action against the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company is a threat to the security of employees and to the living standards of consumers, John A. Hartford, company chairman, said this week in a personal letter to the firms 110,000 workers.

Pointing out that A&P "has never tried to get a monopoly, destroy competition or restrain trade," Mr. Hartford said that the company's only objective was "to make our operations as efficient as possible so that we can give the people the most good food for their money."

"This attack," the letter said, "is a serious threat to our company which you have all worked so hard and loyally to build. As such we must admit that it is also a threat to your job and your future."

Since 1917, A&P has been managed by Mr. Hartford and his brother George L. Hartford. The company was started in 1859 by their father, who opened the first store in downtown Manhattan. The firm rose to leadership in the Nations retail food business by selling quality food at low prices.

The Anti-Trust action filed in New York last month asks the court to order A&P to get rid of most of its stores and its manufacturing facilities.

Mr. Hartford referred to the suit as "Practically distressing to my brother George and me, for we have made every effort to insure the security of all company employees. I mean security, not just in terms of having you feel safe in your job, but by developing the pension program with which you are familiar—and by setting up the training program to help each employee fit himself for a better job. And now comes this attack which, if successful, will wipe out all these gains."

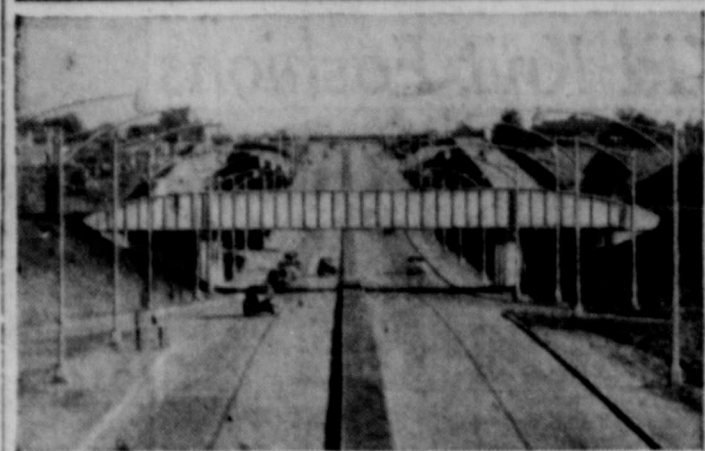
"Fortunately, over the years our policy of fair, honest dealing has won us the friendship of millions of consumers and thousands of suppliers. We do not believe that the American people will stand by and see this company, which has done perhaps more than others to lower living costs and raise living standards, destroyed."

**FORT WORTH'S NEW SUPER THOROUGHFARE**



Opening of this super thoroughfare in September marked the first step in the completion of Fort Worth's \$30,000,000 double expressway program which will criss-cross the city with two of the finest arterial thoroughfares in America. Aimed at relieving one of its severest growing pains, traffic congestion, the superhighways will extend east and west and north and south across the city, intersecting near the downtown business district. The opening unit, two miles in length, is at the south end of the north-south expressway. It underpasses the railway bridge above and three street crossings, one of which is visible in the background. Structural steel for the four bridges was supplied by U. S. Steel's Virginia Bridge Co. General contractors for the initial section were Austin Road Co., Dallas, and Worth Construction Co., Fort Worth. Sub-contractor for the steel structures was F. M. Reeves & Sons, Austin. A second 3.4-mile unit under construction on the western leg of the east-west expressway is scheduled for opening early in 1951. Five major overpasses in this strip will be of steel, furnished by American Bridge Co., another U. S. Steel subsidiary. General contractors are Markham & Brown, Kearney-Crumme & Co., Dallas; Austin Bridge Co., Dallas; Austin Road Co.; and F. M. Reeves & Sons. Reeves is handling construction of the five steel bridges.

**New Turkey Variety Will Be Displayed**

The first national show of a new breed of turkeys, Bettaville Whites, will be held as a feature of the 1950 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth.

At the same time, a meeting of the Texas Turkey Federation, of which Joe Fechtel of Dallas is president, will take place.

The new breed—a small white bird—derives its name from the United States Experiment Station at Beltsville, Md., where it was originated.
