#### **Dock Strike Ends**

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Oct. 24 (P)U-a

(UP) - More than 2,000 CIO Longshoremen are expected to return to work on the Hawaiian docks tomorow, 178 days after they walked out in a wage dispute that cost \$100,000,000.

Leaders of the union and of seven stevedoring firms signed a back to work agreement yesterday. They sent a letter to Gov. Ingram Stainback asking him to return the waterfront facilities to private ownership.

The back to work agreement provided for a progressive wage increase reaching to 21 cents an hour by March 1 and for rehiring of strikers without discrimination. The union agreed to the wage plan Oct. 7.

More important to Hawaiians, whose pineapple and sugar crops have been held up, the agreement included guarantees by the union against strikes, sitdowns, slowdowns or other wok stoppages for the next 20 months.


