AGREEMENTS WILL BIND EUROPE TO DEFENSE PACT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—Diplomatic quarters disclosed today that the United States and eight western European countries soon will begin negotiating the agreements that will start U. S. military aid moving abroad.

The military assistance act requires that the pacts be signed before the United States distributing arms to Western Europe. The law specifies certain safeguards that must be in the agreements. But President Truman, it was learned, has ordered additional provisions written in.

American authorities, however, said that they expect no difficulty over the negotiations.

They said at the same time that the United States will be in constant touch with Great Britain as the country trims its defense expenditures as part of the new austerity program.

The military assistance act contemplates that each of the European states participating in the plan must make the maximum effort toward its own rearmament—provided it does not upset its civilian economy.

The United States, as the chief arsenal for the North Atlantic Alliance, must satisfy itself that the British are doing all they can to help their own defense, rather than depend unnecessarily on the United States for weapons.

So far, there has been no American criticism of the European states which include a 20,000,000 cut in the Army and an \$84,000,000 (M) reduction in the defense budget.

Great Britain and France will be the key countries starting negotiations for the mutual aid agreements with the United States. Other countries will be Norway, Denmark, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

The eight European countries are the ones that will receive aid under the military assistance program. In the agreements, they must pledge to:

- 1. Use the aid in a manner consistent with policies and purposes of the mutual assistance legislation.
- 2. Refuse to sell or transfer the goods to any other nation unless Mr. Truman approves.
- 3. Furnish reciprocal aid to the United States.

LONDON, Oct. 28 (UP)—The North European defense group of the Atlantic Pact already is in existence, it was disclosed today.

Informed sources said representatives of the group met at the defense ministry here yesterday and Monday to prepare a "schedule of work" for presentation to a defense ministers meeting here next Monday.

Attending the meeting were nine representatives of the Army, Navy and Air Forces of Britain, Denmark and Norway.

Their plans will be given final approval by the ministers who then will "formally inaugurate the North European defense group," informed sources said.

These sources said the schedule prepared at this week's meetings included two main points:

- 1. Allocation of arms and equipment under the military aid program.
- 2. Framing of a defense plan for the North European area, which will include Spitzbergen as well as Britain, Denmark and Norway.

The sources said that all "strings" attached to the military aid program, including U. S. inspection of the uses to which the equipment is put, have already been "generally accepted."

FOUR-STATE MANHUNT ON FOR ESCAPED MEN

WILMINGTON, Del. Oct. 27 (UP)—More than 200 state police were ordered into a four-state manhunt today for eight escaped convicts, heavily armed and led by two life term murderers.

Local police in all Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware communities also were alerted and radio alarms were sent out to all states on the eastern seaboard.

The convicts were armed to kill, police were warned. The desperadoes reportedly have 10 revolvers and two rifles they took from the prison arsenal in a daring break from the New Castle County Jail last night.

The search for two of the fugitives was concentrated in the Kennett square section of Pennsylvania where an automobile they commanded at gunpoint in a Wilmington suburb was found abandoned.

Road blocks were set up on every road leading from Wilmington and all railroads in the area were patrolled in an effort to head off the fugitives' flight.

Their escape from the New Castle County workhouse last night was one of the cleverest planned and executed in the state's history. The hardened convicts overpowered 10 U. S. guards, used their keys to open the prison arsenal and took two of the guards as hostages to get outside the gates.

All telephone lines in the prison had been cut before the escape. State police could not be notified until 40 minutes after the convicts had fled through a field in an hour of bullets.

LEAK IN GAS MAIN FOUND NEAR EXPLOSION SITE

DALLAS, Oct. 27 (UP)—A small crack was discovered last night in a gas main near the explosion-shattered Cedar Springs Housing development, and it was scheduled to be thoroughly investigated today.

R. Skagerberg, an explosion expert for the Public Housing Authority, was reported on route by air from Washington, D. C. He will conduct an investigation while workmen remove the debris. A U. S. Bureau of Mines man also will investigate.

Fourteen persons were injured when the four-unit apartment structure exploded Tuesday night. Five still were hospitalized today but all were expected to recover.

James L. Stephenson, Jr., director of the Dallas Housing Authority which operates the Cedar Springs project, said maintenance men discovered a "hairpin sized"

crack in a four-inch central gas main at the project. The main was nine feet under ground and four feet distant from the side of the crumpled building.

Stephenson emphasized that discovery of the crack did not fix the cause of the blast. This, he said, must be determined by the explosion expert or other authority.

U. S. Protests Expulsion Of Embassy Aids

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 27 (UP)—The United States protested formally to Czechoslovakia today against the arrest and expulsion of members of the U. S. embassy here.

James K. Penfield, U. S. Charge D'Affaires here, delivered what was described as a "stiff protest" to Vavro Hajdu, deputy foreign minister.

The protest was against the ouster of two American embassy attaches from Czechoslovakia and the arrest of another. All were accused of spying.

Last Friday Samuel Meryn was arrested at his home by Czech police. The same day Isaac Patch was ordered out of the country on 24 hours notice. Four days later John G. Heyn likewise was ordered out.

Embassy officials had been unable to see Meryn since he was arrested. The Czech granted permission to the embassy for an envoy to see Meryn yesterday, but at the last minute the meeting was "postponed."

The Czechs attributed the delay to "incorrect" reports of the affair broadcast by the Voice of America. Today the U. S. officially corrected a voice broadcast to which the Czech objected. It was described as saying the Czechs repeated requests by the embassy to see Meryn.

Penfield said the Czechs had not specifically refused embassy requests to see Meryn, but added that efforts had proved unavailing.

The two appointees were nominated by President Truman and have been confirmed by the Senate.

Seek Identity Of Dead Robber

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Brownsville officers today awaited a report on a check of FBI fingerprint files, hoping that it would yield a clue to the identity of a man shot to death by city policemen as he fled from the scene of an attempted safe burglary.

The man, in his early 30s, registered at a hotel yesterday as J. B. Dillon, but he gave no home address. He carried a driver's license bearing the name of Robert Stewart Peters, Louisville, Ky., but officers said they had checked and found the man was not Peters.

Three policemen surprised the man early yesterday when they answered a call to Wall Motor Company to investigate a report that two burglars had broken a window.

He leaped from the window and fled, with two patrolmen on foot and one in a squad car in pursuit.

Patrolman Douglas Ward brought him down with three shots from a sub machine gun two blocks from the scene of the break-in.

Refusing to talk, he died en route to a hospital.

VETS DEBTS TO BE TAKEN OUT OF INSURANCE PAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—The Veterans Administration today told veterans who owe the government money on certain benefits that all or part will be deducted from next year's big insurance dividend.

Veterans affected will be those who were overpaid on subsistence allowances while taking educational courses under the GI Bill. Also those who were overpaid on pensions, other VA benefits, and defaults on loans made good by the VA.

The VA estimates that some 600,000 veterans presently owe the agency about \$70,000,000.

The VA thought it would collect between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000 through deductions from the National Service Life Insurance dividends.

The VA is scheduled to begin paying off \$2,800,000,000 about Jan. 15 to 16 to 16,000,000 veterans. The "kitty" is being cut up because veterans paid too high premiums on their national service life insurance.

The bulk of the \$70,000,000 owed the VA, the agency said, represents overpayments on subsistence allowances to GI's taking educational courses.

The VA said that a considerable number of veterans now are repaying this indebtedness by having deductions made from monthly checks they now receive from the VA.

The VA added that the veterans who owe it money are aware that their indebtedness is deductible from other VA payments to which they are entitled.

Hawkins Admits Killing Clark

JERSEYVILLE, Ill., Oct. 27 (UP) — Leonard (Lucky) Hawkins, who was captured in Dabhart, Tex., last week after one of the greatest manhunts in the Texas Panhandle in recent years, has changed the confession he gave to police, state's attorney Alvin Pettit said today.

Pettit said Hawkins, who will have a preliminary hearing in connection with the fatal shooting of Albert Clark next Tuesday, had signed a statement admitting he fired the fatal shots which killed Clark.

Clark's body was found in a field near here three weeks ago. He had been shot and robbed. Hawkins, a former bush league ball player who was Clark's traveling companion, was captured last week and returned here.

At first Hawkins told police that he and Clark picked up a "bitchker" known only as "Mildred" and began arguing near here over his intentions to her. In that statement he said Clark pulled a gun and was shot accidentally during a scuffle.

Pettit said that after questioning by state criminal investigation and identification officers yesterday Hawkins signed a statement in which he said that no woman was involved. Pettit said that in the new statement Hawkins said that he and Clark got into an argument over whether to drive to New York to the world series.

Pettit said that in the statement Hawkins said he wrestled Clark away from Clark and shot Clark.

TEXAS News Briefs

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)

Some 400 Texans representing business, industry, education and government, open a two-day personnel and management conference today at the University of Texas.

Participants will hear talks by more than 50 speakers, including Gov. Allen Shivers who was scheduled to speak tonight on "running the state's business."

GALVESTON, Oct. 27 (UP)—U. S. engineers today sent out invitations for bids on the construction of a spillway at Lavon Vand Reservoir on the Trinity River 25 miles northeast of Dallas.

Actual site of the spillway would be seven miles north of Rockwall, in Collin County.

Tentative date for receipt of bids is Dec. 22.

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Bandits looted four banks here last night.

All the banks were in the home of A. P. Dewall, and were loaded with pennies.

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Judge J. W. Wheat of Woodville, an ex-student of Sam Houston State College, will be principal speaker tomorrow night at the annual Ex-Student's Banquet.

The event will precede the

school's annual homecoming celebration this week-end.

ATLANTA, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Associate Justice Ralph Hicks Harvey of the Texas Supreme Court resumed comfortably at the home of a niece here today following a major operation.

Judge Harvey was taken to the home of his relative, Mrs. G. A. Young, in a private car yesterday from the Texarkana Hospital where he had received surgical treatment.

The Judge, resident of Linden, Tex., was reported in good condition.

WICHITA FALLS, Oct. 27 (UP)—Funeral services were incomplete today for H. F. Utzman, 30, killed yesterday while working in an oilwell 10 miles south of here.

DARDEN, Oct. 27 (UP)—Cotton Belt Railroad officials today investigated a fire which swept through a boxcar on a Texarkana-bound freight train, destroying 100 bales of cotton valued at \$15,960.

Crewmen discovered the blaze yesterday six miles east of Naples, Tex., and the car was sidetracked at Darden. Firemen battled the blaze for more than six hours but were unable to extinguish it because of an inadequate water supply.

AUSTIN, Oct. 27 (UP)—State Superintendent L. A. Woods brought out the record today, as proof of advances made in Texas' education system during his 16-year term.

He cited a study made by the statistics division which showed increases ranging from 130 per cent upward in salaries of superintendents, teachers and administrators since 1933.

The survey demonstrated, said Woods, "that the per capita cost of Texas education has more

than tripled since 1933, while school transportation costs, for instance, have risen 688 per cent."

EDINBURG, Oct. 27 (UP)—Not only the 40-cent per hour minimum worker wage was bringing yelps from lower Rio Grande Valley farmers today.

The farmers also disagreed with other sections of the U. S. Mexican work treaty—mainly the insurance, hospitalization and bond provisions.

The consensus of the farmers was that for 40-cent hourly wages the worker should provide his own medical care. Nor did they think they should insure Mexican farm hands against accidents when they didn't do the same for their U. S. employes.

As for the \$15 bond, agrued the farmers, they had no control over Aliens who decided to return home before the contract was up. But in such a case the farmer would lose his bond.

Deer, cattle, rabbits, mice and certain other animals are repelled from garden and orchard crops by the taste of a new harmless spray.

Peril In Measles
CHICAGO (UP) — Children born to mothers attacked by German measles during pregnancy are likely to have defects, according to doctors at Northwestern University. Among the defects found among 84 such children were congenital heart disease, deafness, mental deficiency and malformed teeth.

Seek Cause Of Houston Blast

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—Officials today sought a clue to the cause of the explosion of a huge gasoline transport truck which killed two men. Eugene Wisofsky, 35-year-old mechanic for the York Transport Co., was killed yesterday as the force of the blast hurled him 40 feet through the air.

Arnold M. Smith, 40, who was working on the truck's motor along with Wisofsky, was pronounced dead on arrival at a hospital after he had been removed from the wreckage of the building which had housed the truck. A negro employe of the company, Square Battles, 45, was critically injured in the blast. Deputy Sheriff Randall High said one side of the Masonry building, where the two men were working on the truck, was torn away. There was no fire.

School's Cleared By TIL Board

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 27 (UP)—New London and Gladewater were clear today of alleged violations of Texas Interscholastic League rules. The TIL's state executive committee quashed the charges because of "confusion" in the minds of school officials over application of the rules in question. The TIL said B teams of the two schools had played football games with ARP, a school suspended for the 1949 season. Normally, league officials said, such action would constitute a violation and carry a suspension of the offending schools for the remainder of the current year and for the year following.

The "confusion" in the matter was over the question of whether a game involving B teams constituted a violation. The largest strictly rural hospital in the United States is Grace Hospital at Banner Elk, N. C.

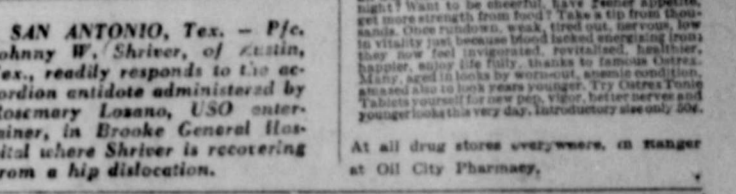

FIND REMAINS OF RUSSIAN SLAVE LABOR SETTLEMENT

BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 27 (UP)—University of California archaeologists today announced they have discovered a "slave labor" settlement left by the Russians near San Francisco.

The site was located on the Farallone Islands, 25 miles off the Pacific Coast, where the Russians conducted seal hunting operations

in the last century with gangs of aleuts imported from Alaska.

Evidence of the Russian occupation included a valuable collection of Alaskan weapons and tools beads and ornaments made by California Indians, animal and bird bones, English China, Glassware and metal implements from fur trading ships.

The Russians occupied the Farallones from 1812 until 1833. From fragmentary accounts of the occupation and the excavators' findings, archaeologists have deduced the camp was an unpleasant as the present day ships are reputed to be.

According to Franklin Fenega, University Archaeologist, "successive groups of Alaskan natives, together with some California Indian wives supplied by the Russians, were held on the bleak islands to gather seal pelts and provisions for the Russian fur traders."

"The aleuts and indians lived in earth huts. One account describes the death of two of them from scurvy and the 'great misery' of their existence caused by inadequate provisions, scurvy and lack of fresh water and firewood."

The excavators also found remnants of a later period in the island's history. Still standing are the buildings used by an American company which supplied San Francisco with sea gull eggs during the gold rush period. They sold for \$1 a dozen.

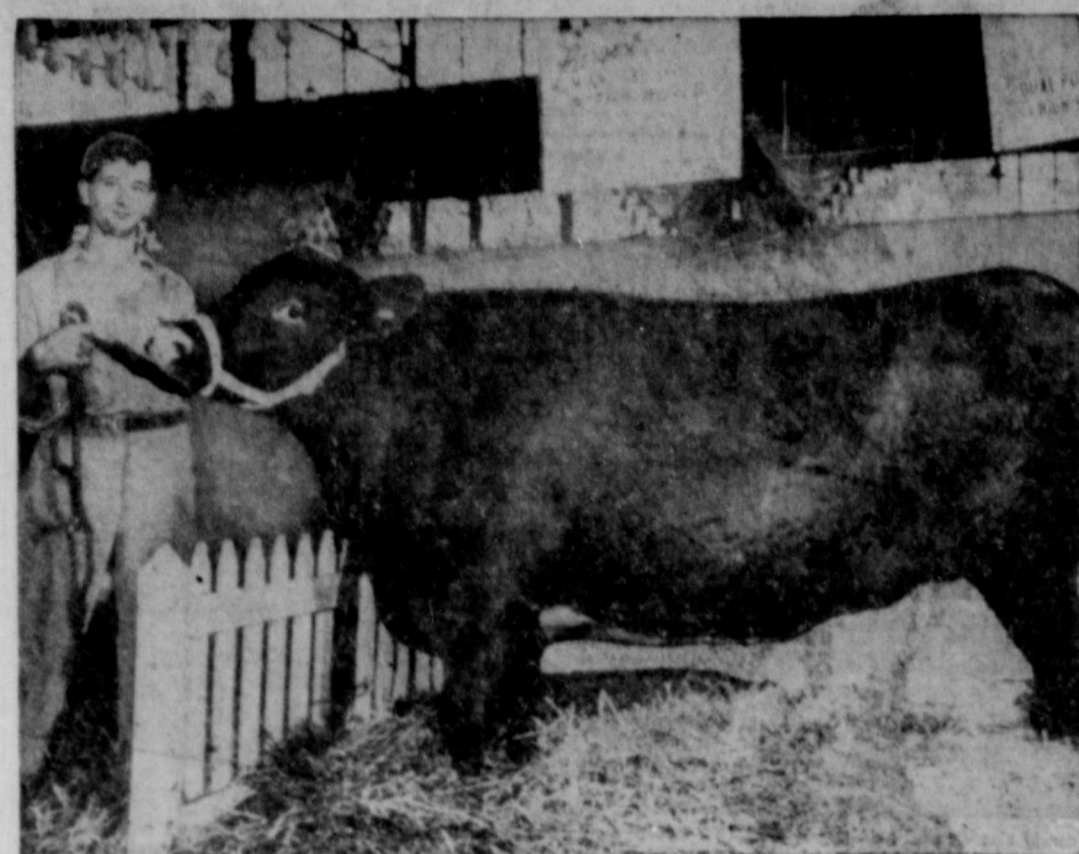

REVOLT AGAINST COMMUNISM HALTS EAST GERMAN TREATY

By JOHN B. MCDERMOTT

Germany apparently has caused the Russians to cancel plans for a separate peace treaty with their East German state.

BERLIN, Oct. 27 (UP)—Observers said today that a growing revolt against communism in East Germany would have to withdraw its occupation troops within one year, leaving the East German state in a precarious security position from the Kremlin viewpoint.

Voters opposed to the Communist regime cast one third of the ballots in an election early this year. Current reports assert the opposition is growing and that Communist police are making numerous arrests to quell it.

East German leaders hinted for two weeks about a proposed separate peace treaty. But they abruptly reversed their attitude yesterday.

East German Premier Otto Grotewohl held a press conference for 100 newsmen and told them the East German regime did not want a separate peace treaty with Russia.

"We are not interested in making a separate peace treaty," Grotewohl told the surprised newsmen. "Our efforts are directed at a peace treaty for all Germany."

"We are fighting for fulfillment of the Potsdam agreement, signed by the four occupation powers. We believe that this agreement would be the most favorable for Germany."

He said also his government would deal with the Berlin dispute "in the spirit of the Paris agreement providing a modus vivendi."

This was immediately viewed in western quarters as a prelude to an eastern offer to resume four-power discussions on Berlin.

These discussions were broken off by the Western Allies last Sept. 28 when the Soviets refused to fulfill commitments they made to end the city's bloody railway strike in June.

Grotewohl said discussions would begin today on granting former Nazi party members full privileges in the Eastern state provided they had not been convicted of major war crimes.

From the Western capital of Bonn, meanwhile, came reports that the West German state soon will ask the Western Allies to end their state of war with Germany.

West German officials quoted West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer as saying he would ask the three-power Allied high commission to consider this question next week.

BERLIN, Oct. 27 (UP)—Wilhelm Pieck, president of Communist East Germany, asked the West German Federal Republic today to negotiate with his government on establishment of a unified Germany.

Pieck suggested in an article in the Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland that a unified Germany could gain a peace treaty with the allies.

Hunter Tells Of Watching Friend Legless Youth Wins Scout Badge Fall To Death

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Oct. 27 (UP)—An Alaskan hunter, forced to spend the night on a narrow ledge, 150-feet above pounding waves after he slipped and fell from the cliff, today described how he watched in frozen horror as a friend hurled past him to his death on rocks below.

Cecil Simpson, Metlakatla, Alaska, was rescued by the coast guard cutter White Holly. The vessel's block and tackle had to be used to lift him from his crazy perch.

Simpson told rescuers he watched horrified as his companion, Lawrence Frish, also of Metlakatla, fell from the top of the 300-foot cliff shortly afterwards.

A southeast gale with winds of 45 miles an hour buffeted Simpson, and several times rescuers at the top thought Simpson had lost his grip and plummeted to the foot.

The men, members of a hunting party, were first missed when they failed to return to their camp.

But first, he said, it would be necessary for the Bonn government "to abandon its present policy and join the common fighting front."

"Only in this way can German unity be achieved and a peace treaty obtained," Pieck said.

The Communist bid for a four-power peace treaty was made one day after the Russians apparently cancelled plans for a separate peace treaty with the East German state because of a growing revolt against Communism there.

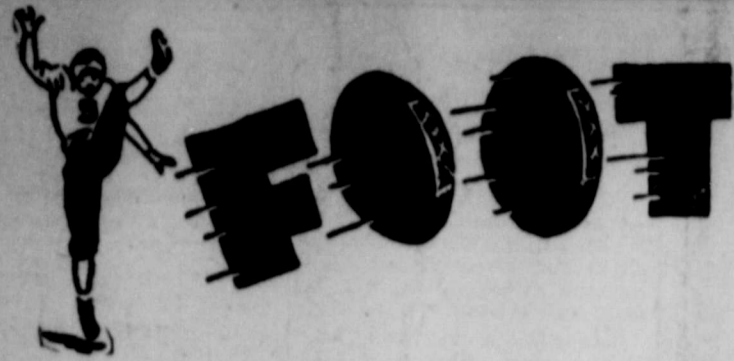

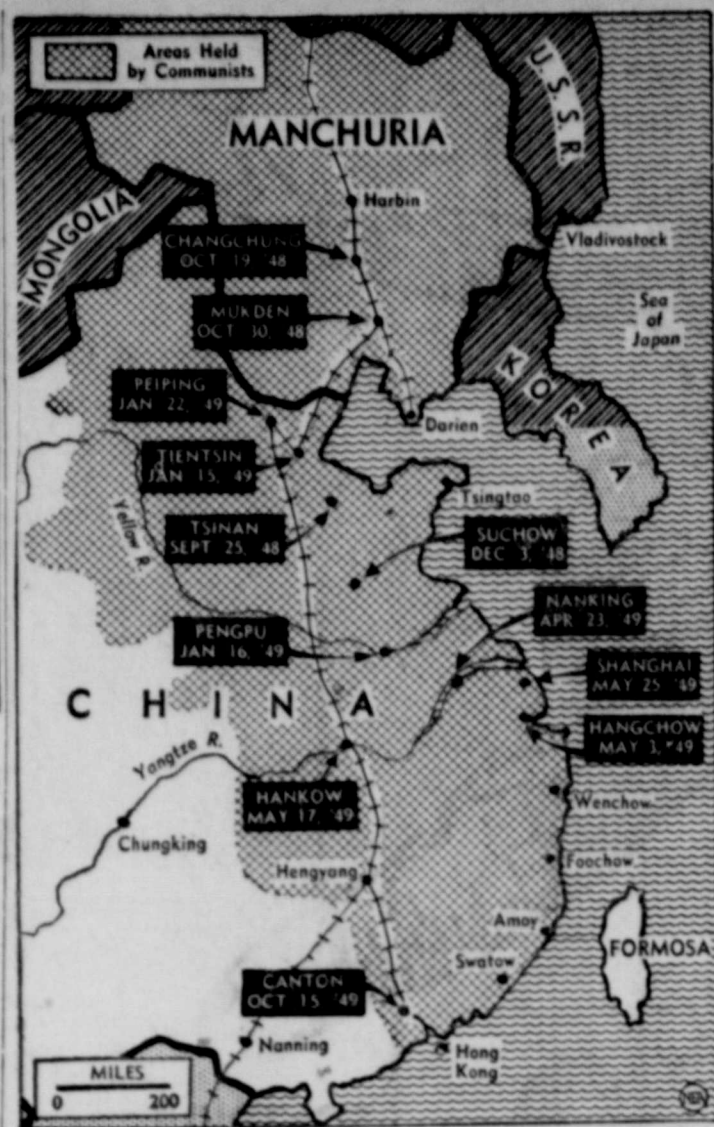
