Stroke of Apoplexy Last Saturday Morning Resulted in Death of W. M. Hicks.

William Marvin Hicks, age 49, well known contractor of Dimmitt, suffered a stroke of apoplexy at his home shortly before noon last Saturday, and passed away at 3 o'clock Sunday morning. He regained consciousness Saturday afternoon, and was able to recognize members of his family, and friends, tho he suffered great pain during his last hours.

Mr. Hicks came to Dimmitt about a year and a half ago, with his family, and his friends here were numbered by his acquaintances. He was especially liked for his jovial nature and pleasant smile, which was always his greeting to everyone.

The body was sent to Abeline Sunday afternoon, where it was buried Monday in the Clyde cemetery, near that city, and where the family lived before coming to Dimmitt.

Surviving the deceased besides the widow, are three children, Bessie Mae, a senior in the Dimmitt High School, Carlton, age 14, and Marvin, Jr., age 7. Also several brothers and sisters.

EARLY HATCHED CHICKS WILL HELP SOLVE PROBLEM OF WINTER EGGS

A hen in the laying house is worth a dozen in the barnyard in September and October, when egg prices start to soar. Farmers seeking to obtain the utmost profit from their poultry flocks should make an effort to have their pullets ready to lay by the middle of December, thereby getting the full advantage of fall and winter egg prices, market experts point out.

Early-hatched chicks offer the simplest solution of the problem—Chicks hatched before May 1 should be ready to start laying during September, if the stock is good and proper care is given the growing pullets.

Many farmers seeking to effect economics in the first cost of chicks often put off purchasing until late in the season. This is merely a case of false economy, since late hatched chicks are late in coming into production, and are not laying when the eggs are at their highest. The early hatched chicks return many times the net profit of the late hatched chicks, in the normal course of events.

In response to this tendency to obtain chicks early in the year, hatcheries usually are ready to deliver by March 1, and some even earlier. Chicks hatched at this period of the year are husky and strong, and capable of quick growth, provided proper treatment is given them. Leading hatcheries of the country, too, are advising their customers to obtain early chicks to reap the advantages of the high egg market.

Pullets ready for the laying house in early September more than now for their original cost in the first few weeks. Figures compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and experimental stations indicate that the profits from early hatched chicks are from three to four times as great as from late hatched chicks under normal circumstances.



Free European Trip Offered By Uncle Sam

County Clerk Has Application Blanks for Mothers and Widows to Europe.

The Congress of the United States recently passed a law that is probably unknown to many of the beneficiaries thereof—the mothers and widows of world war veterans whose bodies are buried on the battlefields of Europe.

Thru Mrs. R. B. Boren, District-County clerk of Castro County, the News has a copy of this law, and Mrs. Boren has application blanks and full particulars for making reservations for a visit, without charge, to the graves.

Any mother or widow of a deceased member of the United States Military or Naval forces between April 5, 1917, and July 1, 1921, whose body is buried in Europe, is entitled to the pilgrimage.

Only one such trip can be made under this law, and the period for the trip is between May 1, 1930, and October 31, 1933, and the date of each pilgrimage is to be designated by the Secretary of War.

A period of only two weeks is allowed, from the time of landing in Europe, and of reembarkation in Europe.

The term "mother", in the Act means mother, stepmother, mother thru adoption, or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased whose grave is to be visited. The term "widow" means a widow who has not remarried since the death of the deceased.

Funds have been appropriated for these pilgrimages, and the Secretary of War has full charge of them.

Mrs. Boren has blanks at her office, with further detailed information, and will be glad to receive applications.






