WHITE HOUSE PRESSES STEEL AND UNION FOR SETTLEMENT

By Alan Adams WASHINGTON, July 23 (UP)—The 52-day steel strike hit at the heart of the defense program Wednesday as worried White House officials exerted new pressure on industry and union leaders to negotiate an agreement.

Acting Defense Mobilizer John R. Steelman was in almost constant communication by telephone with both sides in further attempts to find some break in the completely deadlocked dispute.

As Steelman struggled for resumption of collective bargaining, the prolonged nationwide walkout of 600,000 CIO steelworkers had its first drastic effects on defense production.

The Army announced the shutdown of the nation's largest artillery shell plant—the Chevrolet shell plant at St. Louis. Defense officials predicted the list of defense facilities forced to close down for lack of steel would grow rapidly.

Until now they said, the strike has primarily hurt the civilian economy, forcing a halt in production of automobiles and other

Kefauver-Harriman Plan Block To Stop Stevenson Nomination

CONVENTION HALL, July 23 (UP)—The Democratic national convention Wednesday seated anti-administration delegations from Texas and Mississippi, and all other delegates on the temporary roll—including those who refused to sign a "loyalty" pledge.

CHICAGO, July 23 (UP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson piled up new support for the Democratic presidential nomination Wednesday as party platform writers hammered out a civil rights compromise to head off a convention floor fight.

Rival candidates were trying desperately to organize a "stop Stevenson" coalition, but so far with no success. Averell Harriman was expected to decide soon whether he will drop out of the race and throw his support to Sen. Estes Kefauver in an effort to stem the Stevenson tide.

Party moderators who favor Stevenson seemed to be gaining the upper hand at the convention after two days of bitter North-South dispute. The civil rights compromise came on the heels of conciliatory gestures toward the South in the "loyalty pledge" row.

CHICAGO, July 23 (UP)—The final showdown on both the platform and the "loyalty pledge" issues will come at Wednesday's convention sessions and while peace appeared to be breaking out, party leaders kept their fingers crossed.

A 19-member platform drafting subcommittee which locked itself in a smoke-filled room at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday night emerged shortly before 6 a.m. with a civil rights plank which had been accepted by

Allied Bombers Smash Red Troop And Supply Depot

By Robert Udick SEOUL, Korea, July 23 (UP)—Waves of Allied fighter-bombers, braving intense anti-aircraft fire, smashed a Communist troop and supply center south of Wonsan Wednesday in another devastating aerial blow at "ripe" enemy targets.

The UN warplanes fired bombs, rockets and machine gun bullets on the sprawling troop billeting and supply storage complex at the village of Osan, 10 miles south of Wonsan.

The Fifth Air Force said it had waited for several weeks to let the target ripen for the assault, the latest in the Allied campaign of putting pressure on the Communists from the air.

The first 100-plane wave of Mustangs, Shooting Stars and Thunderjets hit the target about 9 a.m. (6 p.m. CST Tuesday). A second wave of fighter bombers flew over the target at 5 p.m. (3 a.m. CST) but results of the second attack were not immediately available.

Claims already reported on the main target included 59 storage and barrack buildings, eight vehicle revetments, four supply bunkers, one automatic weapon and seven box cars destroyed or damaged.

Three large secondary explosions blossomed in the clear North Korean sky from hits on fuel or ammunition stores. The Allied planes dropped 75 tons of bombs, 300 rockets and 37,000 rounds of ammunition on the target.

Meanwhile, other fighter-bombers and light bombers continued to hammer at Red positions around "Old Baldy," the bitterly-contested hill west of Choswon in the west-central front.

P-86 Sabrejets over MIG Alley reported meeting no enemy MIG-15's.

On the ground, sweltering Allied troops burrowed deeper into the eastern crest of Old Baldy during a lull in the six-day battle for the bloody height.

Eva Peron's Condition Is Still Serious

BUENOS AIRES, July 23 (UP)—government communique said Tuesday night that the condition of Mrs. Eva Peron, Argentina's first lady, remains serious.

It was the first official announcement since Sunday, when her health was reported improved.

A Frankfurt dispatch said two German medical specialists left there by plane for Buenos Aires at the invitation of the Argentine government to examine an "unidentified patient." The patient was believed to be Mrs. Peron. The doctors are Heinrich Kalk, specialist in basal metabolism and liver ailments, and heart specialist Paul Uhlenbruck.

Grand Jury Has Voted 8 Bills Of Indictment

The Eastland County Grand Jury made its first report to Judge Davenport Tuesday afternoon, after being in session since Monday morning. Eight bills were reported. The body will reconvene on July 31st, which is Thursday of next week.

### Eight Crewmen Ride B-29 To Flaming Grave

TOPEKA, Kans., July 23 (UP)—A Kansas corn field was littered Wednesday with blackened pieces of airplane the size of saucers after a flaming B-29 bomber crashed with shattering force, killing eight crewmen.

The airman never had a chance to bail out of the big four-engine bomber as it fell from 1,500 feet, one engine spurting fire, into the corn field 11 miles southeast of Topeka Tuesday.

It was only minutes out of Forbes Air Force Base here and its pilot was making a second attempt at an emergency landing after the No. 4 right engine caught fire.

Charred bodies of the eight men were removed from the still-smouldering wreckage last night. Burned pieces of metal were scattered over an area 400 yards long and 300 yards wide and only a section of the fuselage and the tail of the bomber was intact.

A Kansas farmer, R. J. Edmondson, 67, was raking prairie hay nearby when the plane crashed.

Capt. Mahar said the B-29 was on a routine training flight out of Forbes and had just taken off. The bomber normally carries a crew of 12, but four men departed before the plane took off again. It was assigned to the 321st squadron, part of the 90th strategic reconnaissance wing, at Forbes.

### GOP Candidate Confers With 3 Top Advisers

FRASER, Colo., July 23 (UP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower interrupted his brief vacation Wednesday to talk with three Republicans who are expected to play important roles in his presidential campaign.

The three—Sen. James H. Duff of Pennsylvania, Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado and Ralph H. Calkins, Republican national committeeman for Oregon—came by automobile from Denver to confer with the GOP presidential nominee at his Rocky mountain retreat near here.

Eisenhower has been fishing, painting and relaxing since Thursday on a 1900-acre ranch owned by an old Denver friend, Aksel Neilsen. His callers today were the first political visitors he has had since he began his vacation.

**Campaign Talk Likely**  
While there was no advance indication of precisely what the general and his supporters would discuss, it seemed safe to assume that the talks would center around Eisenhower's campaign plans.

Duff, Calkins and Thornton were among Eisenhower's national backers at the Republican national convention two weeks ago. Duff told reporters he already had traveled some 60,000 miles around the country in support of the Eisenhower candidacy, and said he was prepared to do a lot more traveling if called upon.

Eisenhower will take time out from his vacation again Sunday to confer with Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California, the GOP vice presidential candidate. Nixon is scheduled to address the Ohio state Republican convention July 31, and apparently he desired to have a talk with Eisenhower before making his speech.

**His Denver Staff Busy**  
While Eisenhower attempted to catch up on his rest and his fishing by keeping political appointments to a minimum for a few days, his staff in Denver was busy engaged in formulating campaign plans.

It was announced there that Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire had been added to the group of key Eisenhower advisers. Adams will serve as a sort of chief of staff for Eisenhower, and will be liaison man between the general's personal staff and the Republican national committee.


Adams will take a three-month leave of absence from his

senatorial duties, effective Aug. 1, to become a member of the Eisenhower "brain trust."

The question of whether Eisenhower will have a full-fledged campaign director or campaign

manager, as is customary for a presidential nominee, is still under discussion. A decision is expected to be reached in the next few days.

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**Short, Secret Truce Meetings To No Avail**

PANMUNJOM, Korea, July 23 (UP)—Truce delegates held a seven-minute "do nothing" meeting Wednesday, the 16th of a series of secret sessions which apparently have done nothing to increase the chances of peace in Korea.

Since every remark at the meeting had to be interpreted in three languages, it was obvious the two sides had only time to agree to another meeting.

Observers here believed both teams were marking time, waiting for the other to break the deadlock on prisoner exchange, the last obstacle to an armistice.

In the last four sessions, the Allied and Communist negotiators have met for a total of 44 minutes.

Lt. Col. Joseph J. Borchert, official UN spokesman, had no comment to make on Wednesday's session except to report the delegates agreed to meet again Thursday.

The brevity of the recent meetings indicated the negotiations were putting forth no new proposals to unsmear the prisoner exchange deadlock.

With neither side submitting anything new, it was likely the news blackout imposed July 4 would be ended soon.

The prisoner deadlock arose when the UN refused to return 100,000 prisoners of war who have renounced communism. The Reds want back all 170,000 prisoners held by the Allies.

**Truman Will Be Convention To Speak Friday**

CHICAGO, July 23 (UP)—President Truman will speak to the Democratic convention Friday night, party officials said Wednesday.

Because the convention is now running behind schedule, the chief executive, who had planned to fly from Washington Thursday, will postpone his trip for 24 hours.

According to the latest timetable worked out by Chairman Frank E. McKinney, the President was expected here sometime Friday.

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
