### Baird Bears Defeat Tough Cross Plains Buffaloes 36-24

BAIRD- The Baird Bears stomped the Cross Plains Buffaloes for the eighth year in a lenght of 10 years time. Baird has defeated Cross Plains the last 7 years. The two schools have played 45 times in the last 54 years. Baird was victorious 23 times, now 24, and Cross Plains won 19 games. There were three tie games.

In the Friday night game, Baird's offense and defense played an outstanding game to defeat Cross Plains 36-24.

Coach Edmiston stated that there are still some mental mistakes happening and they will be working to eliminate them this week. He said the passing game looked really good.

The Bears came back strong after a loss last week to Santa Anna.

Greg Austin broke for a 23 yard touchdown and QB Darryl Harris followed with a 10 yard run as the Bears built up a 13-0 first quarter lead.

Harris then threw to Davy Vestal for a

60 yard touchdown in the second quarter. Cross Plains scored twice in the second quarter on a five yard run by Hutchins and

a five yard screen pass to Jackson. The Bears soared ahead in the third quarter when Harris threw 2 touchdown passes to end Larry Segura, covering 50 and 6 yards.

Alan Bohannon kicked four extra points and the Bears got a safety by Brian Fears.

Cross Plains scored twice more late in the game.

Baird had 17 first downs, had a total of 168 yard rushing and passing, and QB Darryl Harris hit 9 of 16 passes.

Cross Plains had 8 first downs, rushed for 100 yards and hit 6 of 23 passes for 110

Baird's season record is now 2-1.

The Bears will play Eastland, here, Friday night at 8 p.m. Everyone come and support the Bears!

### Baird J.V. Rally Past Cross Plains 26-16 Thursday

BAIRD- The Bears Junior Varsity upped their record to 2-0 for the 1979 season. They beat Cross Plains by a score of 26 to 16.

The first score came in the first quarter when Toby Glosson went in from the 3 yard line. He also scored the extra points to make the score 8-0. The second score was made by Kelly McLaughlin. He went in from 65 yards out. The points failed. The next score came when Alan Tatum

threw to Greg Jones from the 20 yard line. The conversion failed.

The half time score was 20-0. In the third quarter, Toby Glosson scored from 40 yards out. The points after failed. also during the third quarter, Cross Plains scored to make the score 26-8. In the last quarter, Cross Plains scored to make the final score, Baird, 26 and Cross Plains, 16.

## One Petition Pending, **Another Being Circulated**

BAIRD- A group of Baird citizens recently circulated a petition asking the City to sell the Power Plant and Distribution System to the highest bidder. The petition was signed by 261 people. The City clerk has certified those signatures and 26 were removed from the petition. Those 26 names were not registered voters in Callahan County. That left a total of 235 signatures on the petition.

After being certified, the petition was turned over to the City attorney, Rupert Jackson, for legal purposes. This petition is expected to go back to the City Council Tuesday night September 25.

Now, just following one petition, another has been put in circulation. This second petition is asking the Council to negotiate with WTU on the sale of the

Electrical and Distribution System and submit that offer to the voters at the earliest possible date.

The second petition reads as follows:

#### PETITION FOR THE SALE OF THE CITY OF BAIRD ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

We, the undersigned registered voters of the City of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, herewith petition the Baird City Council to negotiate with West Texas Utilities Company for an offer for the Electrical Generating and Distribution System of the City of Baird and Submit that offer to the voters of Baird in a referendum to be held at the earliest possible date.

### Construction Soon To Begin on Baird Electric Inc.

BAIRD- Jerry Allen, of Allen Heating and Electric is now tearing down an old house to build an electric shop. The house being torn down was built in 1889 by Julius Horton, a Baird merchant and first postmaster of Callahan County. He entered the grocery business in Baird and later moved to Stamford.

Later the home was sold to Dr. John Collier, pioneer Texas educator and President of Baird College. He lived in the house until his death in 1928.

The next owner was Mrs. Alexander, of Baird, who preserved the original design and construction.

Allen's shop will be called Baird Electric, Inc. He will build a star steel metal building, 72' x 30'.

ACI of Abilene will construct the building.

Construction is hoped to begin by the end of September.

The work should take approximately two months to be completed.

### Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

Reference has been made to the state of unrest in the City of Baird. It is my opinion that the unrest will persist until the citizens of Baird are given another opportunity to express themselves at the polls in another referendum concerning the sale of the Electrical Generating and Distribution System to West Texas Utilities Co.

Since I have been writing these letters to the Editor, many, many people have expressed their dissatisfaction because they were mislead and not given truthful information before the referendum of August 12, 1978. And I think the present plans are a mistake. I just can't see how it will work to buy from WTU at .03 per kw and the City do

the distribution and keep the charge for electricity down to what it should be, which, in an average household with a consumption of about 1000 kw per month works out to about 41/2 cents per kw. It looks to me like it will have to stay up around seven or eight cents and that gets pretty rough.

I checked this morning at Clyde WTU and there a residence with an electric range but no electric water heater and with the fuel charge added, would cost \$42.67. That same amount of consumption in Baird at present rates would be \$75.75. That is a difference of \$33.08 per month. If the light plant were sold some increase in taxes would have to be made but nothing coming close to what Baird consumers are

paying now, and will continue to pay it present plans are carried out.

I have been told that in the near future a ten year contract will be signed with WTU and, unless that is prevented, as I see it, you, the Baird consumer, will be locked in with an exorbitant cost for electri-

Speculating from conversations I have had with Bairdites, I believe 70 to 80% of them agree with me but are denied the opportunity to say so.

A petition was presented to the City Council on August 28 but so far nothing has been done, but due to some changes in wording, on advise of Counsel, another petition was started last week. So, citizens of Baird, if you do not like what is going on get out and sign that petition to let the City Council know you do not like being ripped off, as is now the case.







#### Esther Sullivan **Expires Sunday**



Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.




