

BULLDOGS IN SEMI-FINALS AREA TOURNEY

Couch Sam Aills high-riding Ranger High Bulldogs, currently the top quintet in the red-hot District 10-AA loop, will vie for the championship of the Indian Trail basketball tournament at Gorman Saturday afternoon when they enter semi-final rounds.

The four semi-final quintets include Ranger, Brownwood "B", Eastland and Mineral Wells.

The Bulldogs are defending champs, having won the Indian Trail tourney in 1952.

Lingleville and Santa Anna joined Rising Star and Comanche in the girls semi-finals.

Brownwood B, paced by Larry Johnston and Marcus Smith, with 19 points each, trimmed the Breckinridge A team, 52-35, with Jerry Tubbs scoring 15 for the Bulldogs.

Eastland gained its semi-final berth at the expense of Carbon, 38-31, with Harrison scoring eight for the winners and Wilson getting nine for the losers.

The Lingleville girls were led by Sanders with 14 as they defeated Eastland, 36-26. Robinson was high for Eastland with 16.

Santa Anna nipped Dublin, 33-32, in the other girls game, with Jo Ann Dunn dunking 16 for the winners and Martha Taylor sinking 15 for the losers.

In boys consolation matches, Dublin eliminated Desdemona, 50-38, only to bow to Gorman, 40-34, in the semi-finals.

Koonce scored 13 for Desdemona, Marvin Salyer led Dublin against Desdemona with 17 points and the Lions were paced by Weldon Whitehead with 21 against Gorman. High for Gorman was Odell Gilmore with 12.

In consolation girls games, Desdemona gained a final berth by beating Gorman, 33-32. Ruth Rainey scored 24 for Desdemona and Melba Brown 12 for Gorman.

Nice Weekend Is Forecast For Eastland Area

More pleasant and balmy weather is in the offing for Eastland County over the weekend, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau.

The Saturday morning forecast of weather men announced that it'll be slightly cooler, however, Saturday night and Sunday. But not enough to make an appreciable difference in the recent weather trend of "June in January" comfort.

The mercury is due to drop down to between 35 and 40 degrees Saturday night. But no freeze was predicted.

Saturday afternoon's high temperature was forecast for around 70 degrees with Sunday afternoon's top mercury reading slated for the mid-60s.

In other words, there'll be no important temperature changes in the area although considerable cloudiness is expected. Moderate northerly winds also were due, according to the Weather Bureau.

The West Texas forecast: Cloudy to partly cloudy. Cooler Saturday and east of the Pecos Valley Sunday. Few showers in the Panhandle Saturday.

Out-of-State Cars Must Have New Licenses

Owners of out-of-state vehicles whose licenses have expired must secure renewal of Texas state licenses as soon as possible to avoid arrest and fine, Capt. F. L. Moran, Abilene district of the State Department of Public Safety, warned today.

Expiration dates of cars registered which expired Dec. 31 have been extended until Jan. 31. California cars whose licenses expired Dec. 31, have until Feb. 4. Louisiana cars expiring Dec. 31 have until Feb. 7. New Mexico, expiring Dec. 31, have until March 2. Oklahoma, expiring Dec. 31, have until March 1.

License year for trucks in Arkansas is from July 1, 1952, to June 30, 1953. All classifications except passenger cars registered in Louisiana are extended until May 1, 1953.

For registration in Texas of cars previously licensed in other states, owners must not be tardy in securing papers from their states for presentation to Texas tax assessor-collectors, he said.

Witness Terrific Storm—RANGERITES ENJOY VACATION VISIT OUT ON WEST COAST

Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Jones recently returned from a much-enjoyed vacation jaunt out on the West Coast where they visited their son-in-law and daughter, Lt. Com. and Mrs. H. B. Boyd, who reside at Palm City near San Diego.

Lt. Com. Boyd is in charge of radar operations aboard the U. S. aircraft carrier Sielley.

The Joneses, who own and operate the popular Regal Cafe on U. S. Highway 80 west in Ranger, were in California during a very violent sea storm which sent giant, mountainous Pacific waves crashing onto the California beaches. The Lobos, paced by Jim Webb with 19 points, took an early lead and were never headed. They were ahead 7-4, at the end of the first quarter, 21-20 at the half and 34-22 at the end of the third quarter. It was Cisco's only District win against four losses.

High for Stephenville was Eric Looney with 12 points.

The Cisco girls nipped Stephenville 28-26. Marie Borst had 14 points for Cisco and Sparky T for Stephenville.

In the 8 game Stephenville won, 14-10.

The 1953 schoolboy cage title derby will be plenty hot next week Tuesday night, the Yellow Jacket five will be out to blast favored Ranger during a conference clash to be waged on Stephenville hardwoods. In the other loop feature, Comanche and Cisco tangle with the Lobos gunning for another upset to climb out of the cellar.

The elder Brashier came to Ranger in 1908, completed his education here and during World War I spent a year and a half in the U. S. Marine Corps. After his discharge from the service he returned and he and his father, Colonel

Brashier formed a partnership in 1925 and founded the present firm. Colonel Brashier, now retired, sold his interest in the company in 1948 to F. P. Brashier, Jr., his grandson.

Workmen this week started on a big remodeling project on the quarter block of business property. The Brashiers have announced that the buildings will be completely redecorated and remodeled and

will be faced with new, modern fronts. New, ultra-modern interior lighting units also will be installed.

Tom Williams, Ranger painting contractor, is redecorating the Brashiers' newly-acquired business properties.

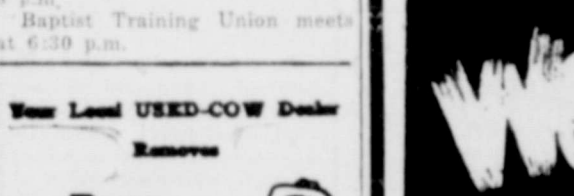
