J. L. Dick, 73, father of O. H. Dick, co-publisher of the Ranger Daily Times and the Eastland Telegram, passed away at his home in Olden at 4 a. m. today, following an illness of many months duration.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church in Olden, with Rev. Alfred Nelson, pastor, officiating. Interment will be in Eastland cemetery.

Mr. Dick was born in Mississippi on January 23, 1880. He came to Texas in 1889, and has been a resident of Eastland County for 64 years. He was a retired farmer and rancher, and a member of the Baptist Church.

He was married to Eva Allmon on May 12, 1905.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Eva Dick of Olden; two daughters, Mrs. Louise Robinson, Tipton, Ark., and Mrs. J. T. Sims, Odessa; four sons, O. H. Dick of Olden, L. V. Dick, Odessa; Charles Dick, Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring; and D. J. Dick, Stanton; two brothers, Rev. C. E. Dick, Lubbock, and Hal Dick, of Phoenix, Ariz.; three grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Funeral services for Luke T. Lane, 65-year-old retired farmer, were held at the Mt. Zion Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Mr. Lane, a bachelor who had resided north of Ranger in Stephens County since 1903, died in a Ranger hospital early Saturday morning. He had been in ill health for some time.

Officiating at the final rites Sunday afternoon was the Rev. Grace, pastor of the Caddo Methodist Church. Interment was in Mt. Zion Cemetery with Killingsworth Funeral Home, Ranger, in charge of arrangements.

Ten Drunks Are Bagged By Cops Over Weekend

Ranger police were much busier than usual over the weekend.

Saturday and Sunday, according to Police Chief W. G. Pounds, ten persons—seven of them Ranger citizens—were arrested and jailed for drunkenness.

An Abilene couple—the husband age 57, and the wife 54—were picked up while driving intoxicated Saturday and were turned over to Frank Tucker, Eastland County sheriff. They'll face DWI charges.

A Ciscoan, 28 years of age, was picked up on U. S. Highway 80 and charged with drunkenness. He had been also arrested and jailed here a week ago, according to police records.

Final arrest of the busy weekend for Ranger policemen came Sunday night when they picked up a 60-year-old Ranger man and jailed him for drunkenness.

Six other Ranger citizens, all men, were also jailed for the same charge over the weekend.

A total of eight fines were assessed at \$15.70 each, Chief Pounds said. The Abilene couple face a stiffer fine if found guilty of their DWI charge in the county court at Eastland.

R. N. Cluck Is Named President Of College

R. N. Cluck, veteran educator who headed the Cisco Public Schools for 16 years and former president of Cisco Junior College, has been named president of Ranger Junior College, it was announced Tuesday morning by A. F. Crawley, chairman of the board of regents of the college.

Cluck succeeded Dr. Grover C. Boswell, head of the local college for 12 years, who resigned the first of the year to accept a public relations position with the Texas Land Office in Austin.

Cluck was named to the presidency of the 27-year-old college during a closed session of the board of regents Saturday afternoon, Crawley said. Other members of the board include A. W. Warford, vice chairman, Joe Nuesle, secretary, Lloyd Bruce, Morris Newham, F. P. Brasher Jr., H. C. Henderson and Carl Page.

A native of McGregor, Cluck holds a bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University, Waco, a master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and has done graduate work at the University of Boulder, Boulder, Colo., and the University of Texas, Austin.

Cluck had been in temporary retirement from his profession since 1947 recuperating from serious injuries received in an automobile accident.

He began his career as an educator as superintendent of the Hubbard City schools in Hill County, served for three years as head of Spur Public Schools, was a member of the faculty of the State Reformatory, Gatesville, for one year. He became superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools in 1952 and held that post until 1947 when he was named superintendent of the Del Rio Public Schools. In 1942 he was named president of Cisco Junior College which he helped establish.

The new president of Ranger Junior College is a former president of the Texas Adult Education Assn., past vice president of the Texas State Teachers Assn., past vice president Texas Assn. of Junior Colleges, one of the founders and first president of the Oil Belt Teachers Assn., former director of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and past president of the Cisco Rotary Club.

Cluck's wife is a member of the faculty of the Putnam Public Schools. They have three children. Their oldest daughter, Miss Mona Lee Cluck, is a junior at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, another daughter, Nancy, is a senior student at Cisco High School, and their son, Bobby, 14, attends Cisco Junior High School.

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Mr. Cluck is a member of the First Baptist Church of Cisco, and his wife and two daughters and son are members of the First Methodist Church in that city.

Mr. Cluck is a Shriner and is a member of the Cisco Masonic Lodge, A. F. & A. M. 446, also the chapter and council.

He was born at Osage in Coryell County and is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. N. Cluck, prominent farming couple of that county.

Talbot Elected New Head RJC Lettermen's Club

Burkett's Plan To Kill 91st Court Would Prove Expensive

Which has been said and written by Representative Omar Burkett in an effort to justify his attempts to abolish the 91st District Court as embodied in House Bill No. 269, which passed the Lower House last week.

Mr. Burkett, in some of his articles to the newspapers of this county has represented that there would be a great saving to Eastland County by having the 91st District Court abolished and the county joined to the 90th Court, now composed of Stephens and Young Counties, without being expensed.

In an article appearing in the Cisco Daily Press, of date Sunday, January 22, Mr. Burkett is more specific and he is quoted as having estimated that consolidation of the Eastland District with the Young—Stephens District, would

save about \$40,000.00 a year—still, no items are given as a basis of such an estimate.

No Saving Made

In view of Mr. Burkett's statements, it is felt that the public of Eastland County should be advised of the real facts concerning the abolishment of the 91st Court. Should Mr. Burkett's bill become the law, and the Court abolished, it would still be necessary for Eastland County to maintain its District Clerk's office, presumably with the same number of employees and at the same maintenance cost; likewise, under the law, Eastland County would still be forced to elect a County Attorney to represent misdemeanors in the County. In this regard, it is important to note that because our County Attorney performs the duties of District Attorney, the State pays

approximately 72 per cent of his salary and the County only 28 per cent at the present time. If this county is put in the 90th Judicial District as proposed by Mr. Burkett, the District Attorney of that District will handle felony cases arising in this county, and the State, which already pays his salary, will no longer contribute to the salary of our County Attorney and Eastland County will have to pay the latter in full, which would result in a large increase in this item of expense to the taxpayers of Eastland County.

Expenses Continue

The sheriff's office would likewise be continued, presumably with the same overhead as now exists. This leaves only one item of expense where the abolishment of the Court could show a saving to Eastland County. This would be in

connection with the salary of a court reporter. At the present, the 91st Court employs a reporter whose salary is paid by Eastland County. Should this court be abolished and Eastland County added to the 90th District, under the law, Eastland County would be required to pay its proportion of the reporter's salary based on population. (Articles 2326h and 2327a R.C.S.) In addition to the reporter's salary (Article 2326a) provides for the payment of expenses of the court reporter, including mileage traveling between courts, and hotel expenses when away from their home county. Under the present set-up, the court reporter of Eastland County is not entitled to an expense account of any nature.

The population of Eastland

County, according to the 1950 Federal Census was 23,942; the population of Stephens County 10,597, and that of Young County was 16,810, making a total population for the three counties of 51,349.

From this, it is shown that under Mr. Burkett's bill, should it become the law, Eastland County would be required to pay approximately 50 per cent of the reporter's salary and any traveling expense incurred under the provisions of the Statute; hence, it can be seen that any saving on the reporter's salary would be negligible.

Mr. Burkett, in undertaking to justify his bill on the theory of a great saving to Eastland County loses sight of the fact—that the Judge's salary must be paid by the State of Texas and not by Eastland County.

In the same article in the Cisco

paper, Mr. Burkett is quoted as saying:

"I don't want to wait until the special committee's bill comes up to make this change because the folks of my district won't get as good treatment from that bill as they will from mine."

It is indeed hard to conceive of Eastland County receiving worse treatment than is provided for in the Burkett Bill, which is no uncertain terms abolishes the 91st District Court, and certainly, no bill passed by the Legislature could do more to injure this district.

The people of Eastland County feel that Mr. Burkett is unfair to them in insisting that his bill be passed and the Court abolished, but feel that he should be willing for the matter to be taken up and determined at a hearing on the

general redistricting bill, at which time, the interested parties would be furnished an opportunity of appearing before the committee and submitting plans by which the Court could be continued, which has not been afforded them by Mr. Burkett, who has apparently made every effort to secure the passage of his bill without notice to the interested parties.

From the above, one can only conclude that the effects of abolishing the 91st District Court would actually increase rather than decrease the burden on the taxpayers of Eastland County, as well as cause them the added expense and inconvenience of seeking out the judge in Breckenridge or Graham to handle the numerous matters and hearings, exclusive of jury trials, that are now

heard every day in Eastland such as divorces, adoptions, child custody hearings, dependent children hearings, temporary restraining orders, removal of disabilities of minority or coverture, and numerous other matters desired by our citizens at a time when the Judge is holding court in one of the other proposed counties.

The solution is to enlarge our own district by the addition of another county rather than to abolish our court. The latter is equivalent to losing one of our schools, or churches, or hospitals and should not be advocated by our own representative.

He graduated from high school at McGregor.

His eldest daughter, Mona Lee, a music major at SMU, was valedictorian of the 1950 graduating class of Cisco High School. She plays the violin as does her sister, Nancy, a Cisco High senior.

Mr. Cluck was highly recommended to the board of regents of Ranger Junior College as a progressive administrator, a good organizer and a vigorous leader.

During his 16 years service as head of the Cisco system, the Cisco public schools were maintained constantly on the accredited list of the All-Southern Assn. of Secondary Schools and Colleges. Financially, they were operated on a cash basis except for a short period during the depression even though many other schools in this section were unable to do so. This was accomplished by securing contracts with 17 common school districts in the area whose scholars and cash resources were pooled with the Cisco system which operated 14 school buses to transport hundreds of boys and girls into the city from the surrounding rural sections.

Also credited to the energy, skill and foresight of Mr. Cluck as an administrator was the successful organization of Cisco Junior College, which owns its own campus and plant, valued at around \$250,000—debt-free.

His administrative and managerial skill also was demonstrated in solving acute financial problems relative to the staggering bonded debt of the Cisco schools when valuations shrank from \$12,000,000 to \$3,000,000 following the 40 boom years. Within the short span of two years, a \$40,000 debt was wiped out. Securing a refund of the school system's bonded indebtedness and adjusting liquidation through a low annual payment with interest on some bonds deferred until a future date, have made possible funds with which to finance an expansion program. A new junior high school building was recently completed at a cost of \$135,000.

Two Area Oil Tests Plugged

Weekend oil news in the Eastland County area included the announcement of plugging of two projects in the Ranger section. Shirley & Venuto, Dallas, revealed abandonment of two ventures seven miles south of Ranger.

The No. 1 Fox Heirs, Lot 24, McLennan CSL Survey 2, was plugged at 3,692 feet.

Their No. 2 Fox Heirs, also Lot 24, same survey, was drilled to a total depth of 1,200 feet.

G. B. Butterfield, Olney, will drill No. 2 Eddleman as a 2,300-foot project in Stephens County five miles south of Caddow, 2,380 feet from the east and 1,530 feet from the south lines of Section 27, Block 6, T&P Survey.

In the same county 10 miles southeast of Brackenridge, Aljon Oil Co., Albuquerque No. 4 W. I. Hunt is to be a 1,850-foot try 990 feet from the west and 842 feet from the south lines of Section 37, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Also in Stephens County, Gilchrist Drilling Co. No. 1 Virginia Gardenshire, Section 50, Block 6, T&P Survey, wildcat one mile southeast of Frankell, has been abandoned at 3,697 feet.

Very Low Cost Of Education In Texas Shown

Your child's education in the Texas public schools costs less than the hourly rate charged by the youngest baby-sitters, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, said in Austin today.

"A lot of people talk about the high cost of education," Tennyson said. "Actually, during the 1951-52 school year, the actual cost per classroom hour for each child was only 21 cents."

Figures for the 1951-52 school year are the latest available. Total public school costs for that year were \$818,963,078, according to figures compiled by the Texas Education Agency. Average daily attendance was 1,213,000. Dividing that figure into the total cost shows that \$262 was spent that year for each child.

Dividing \$262 by 180, the number of school days, gives a cost per day of \$1.45. Dividing \$1.45 by seven, the hours in a school day, gives an individual per hour cost of 21 cents.

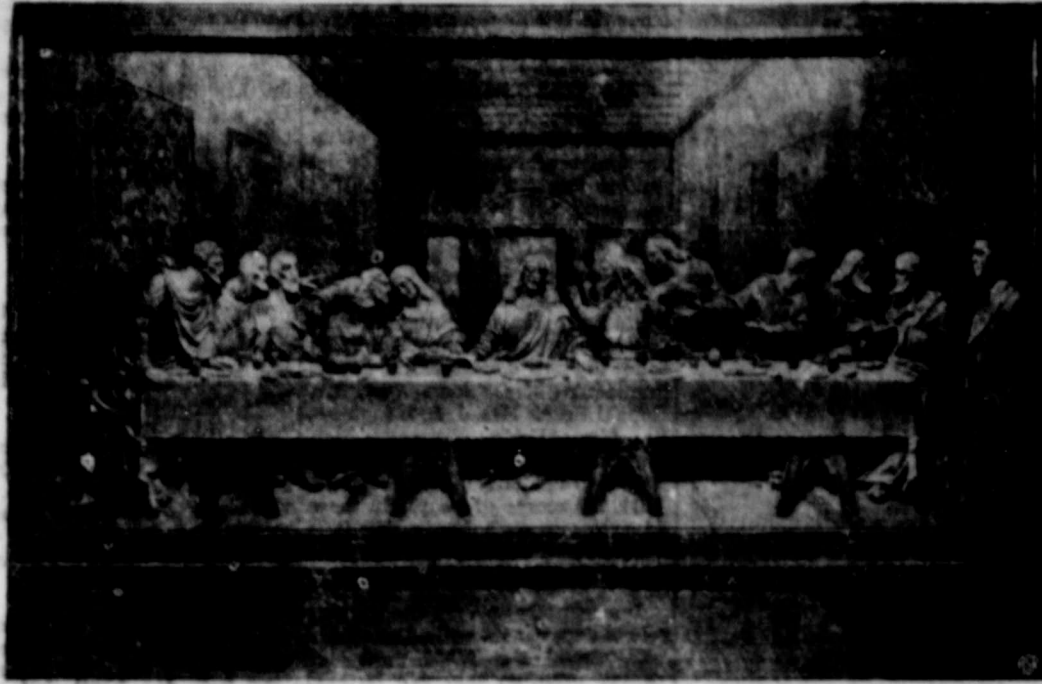

BOSTON, MASS.—All the specialized skills of some of the finest craftsmen of New England have been combined to create this life-size copy in wood of the famous painting "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci.

More than a year was used in preparing the great carving—18½ feet long and 8¼ feet wide. The figures, of limewood, are delicately tinted to give a feeling of lifelike reality, and a giant frame of contrasting walnut gives it depth. The carving will be the point of central interest in The Upper Room chapel, now nearing completion in Nashville. It is expected that visitors who view the carving will be moved to spend a few moments in prayer and meditation in keeping with the purpose of The Upper Room—a devotional guide issued in 17 languages and used round the world. The chapel itself is part of the new headquarters building for The Upper Room, the world's most widely used devotional guide. It is believed that it will become a devotional shrine and point of interest for visitors of the Midsouth.

The picture shows W. D. Irving, of Irving and Casson, New York and Boston, who have produced wood carvings for some of America's greatest churches and cathedrals. The wood carving was done from a model created by Earnest Pelligrini.

the Red Cross, "it was felt that it would be unwise to conduct another drive for funds as the merchants and the general public had been assured by the leaders of the

Community Chest that there would be only one campaign to care for all welfare agencies. However, the Chest leaders were sympathetic to the urgent need for more funds by the Red Cross. It is well known that Red Cross has been asked to increase their national budget to include the cost of processing and packaging gamma globulin which represents an increase of \$7,000,000.
