Watch For Home Accidents Warns Health Officer

Spring is the time for a home hazard hunt, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Accidents in the home are the second leading cause of accidential deaths in Texas. Each year about one thousand persons die as a re-sult of accidents in the home.

Spring house cleaning time is a good time to remove the common hazards that cause so many home accidents. Acties, basements and · closets accumlate piles of junk. cockroaches and other pests thrive in trash hears.

Loose throw rugs are notorious for causing falls. Toys and othe: objects scattered over the floors and airway often cause falls. Check the electrical cords and sec that they are in good shape. Frayad electric cords have caused fires and sometimes fatal shocks.

While rounding up piles of junk to throw away, don't forget to look into the garage, backyard and alleys. In your spring clean-up check your garbage can. Be sure that it is of metal and see that it has a tight fitting lid. Cooperate with your neighbor in seeing that the community disposes of all garbage and trash in a sanitary man-






Traffic Deaths **Show Decline**

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, recently released the State's final traffic fatality figure for 1952.

Complete tabulation of motor vehicle accidents for last year show that 2,498 persons were killed, according to Garrison. This is 48 below the figure for 1951 and sets the death rate at 7.0, the lowest point since the creation of the State Department of Public Safety in 1935. The death rate is based on the number of fatalities per 100 million motor vehicle miles traveled. The national death rate for 1952 was pegged at 7.3 by the National Safety Council.
"This means," said Garrison,

"that for the first time Texas fared a little better than the national average."

Total number of accidents was up some 31,000 over the preceding year and the estimated economic loss from traffic accidents was set at over \$154 million, up \$21 million dollars over 1951.

Bowie Man Sells Gravel, But-Gives Away Gold

sand and gravel, old fossils and gold. He sells the sand and gravel, the country a million years ago. keeps the fossils for souvenirs, and rives away the gold ...

The gold is liberally sprinkled on a 271-acre tract north of Bowie where Watson operates a sand and gravel company. There is 50 cents worth of gold in every ton of gravel and it stays there because the cost of cracking the gravel to

get it out would be prohibitive. Watson, a former banker and grocer, bought the land in 1929, and when workmen excavaling for the building of U. S. Highway 81 ran into gravel deposits. Watson went into the gravel business and discovered the gold and fossils lat-

"Ail material that comes out of here has some gold, traces of ver, and other minerals," Watton explained, "In the 44 miles of paving material we have furnished, about \$22,000 worth of gold has gone with it."
