REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

Most people have a secret desire to be "somebody," and when you ignore them you have put in your bid for their enmity. We have a college down at Brownwood, Howard Payne, that uses for a slogan "Where Everybody is Somebody," and this slogan has made many friends for that school.

The same can be said with reference to the souls of men. People have no desire to be lost, yet they do neglect salvation.

We find that many lost individuals have a feeling that they are out-casts—that nobody cares for them, yet they are making the mistake of their lives when they admit such a feeling.

The Saviour of lost man DOES care. He gave His life that men might be saved, and stands ready all the time to go to the rescue of the lost. Yes, Jesus of Nazareth does care, even for you. When He was on the earth walking, talking and working with men, He cared for each individual. He was criticized for doing this, as we are told in Luke XIV, 1, when His enemies stated "This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them."

But what His critics did not know was that "receiving" sinful men was His great mission in life. He came to seek and to save that which was lost. He was the great Receiver of sinful men, and was very capable. Also He was quite sympathetic toward men.

No need for any individual to be lost, for Christ invited all to "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matt. 11:28. The gift of eternal life comes to you free and upon personal invitation. You merely receive.

Most any individual has a longing for something better, and might say with the Psalmist David, "My soul thirsteth for God, the Living God." Ps. 42:2.

David went to God with his troubles. He asked for assistance and received it. Any sinner may do the same. God will not save you against your will, but will hear you when you call upon His name.

Sin is sin, and all sin is bad, yet the vilest sinner on earth may be saved as quickly as an innocent babe once he turns his face to God. Didn't God send His own Son into this world to seek and save the lost? Didn't this Son pay with His own life for your sin and mine? Hasn't He invited us to come and partake of the water of life freely? Then why are we holding back?

Instead of holding off, we should accept the gift of eternal life. It is ready and waiting for you. You are not too bad to be saved, for Christ's blood is sufficient to cleanse you from all sin. Then if you are lost it is all because of you, when you refused to accept Christ's offer.

Forget self and strength, and completely trust in Him.

Soil Conservation Service Making Progress; Soil Loses From Wind Erosion Below Normal This Year

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The combined acreage either under conservation treatment or planned for such treatment is 39,572,982 acres out of a possible 56,756,800, with half of the planned work already done, it was disclosed by Regional Director Louis P. Merrill in reporting a summary of progress against wind erosion. "We had known that we were making rapid progress the last few years," Merrill said. "But these results are, in my opinion, almost phenomenal. It certainly can be regarded as an achievement of tremendous importance, a tribute to the combined, well organized efforts of the farmers and ranchers cooperating with soil conservation districts and of the supervisors of the districts. It is a tribute also to the work of the agronomists, engineers and other scientists whose patience and skill have resulted in bringing man and nature into closer harmony by better use and treatment of the land, and to the work in conservation

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Perry Is New Candidate For 7-Man Board

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The terms of four of the board members are expiring. They're Grady Pipkin and Dr. James C. Whittington, both of Eastland, and F. P. (Pelton) Brashier Sr. and Wilson Guest, both of Ranger.

Dr. Whittington, recently called back into active duty with the Medical Corps of the U. S. Navy, is not a candidate for re-election.

Milton H. Perry, prominent Eastland civic leader and director of the Eastland County vocational training program, is a candidate for Whittington's place on the seven-man board which administers the affairs of the Eastland County Water Supply District, which is now constructing a \$1,500,000 dam and reservoir to supply water to Eastland and Ranger.

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Eastland voters will cast ballots at the office of the Justice of the Peace No. 1, Court House, E. C. Satterwhite will be election judge.

In Ranger, the election will be held at the office of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce in downtown Ranger with W. W. Paschal presiding as presiding judge.

Listed on the official ballot are Grady Pipkin and M. H. Perry of Eastland and Wilson Guest and F. P. Brashier Sr. of Ranger. The ballot also has blank spaces for write-in candidates, and the four candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be the winners.

RED CROSS IS NEAR QUOTA IN COUNTY DRIVE

Eastland County's 1953 Red Cross fund drive is only about \$57 short of the \$7,194 quota and the campaign will continue until the goal has been reached, Mrs. John Love of Ranger, chairman of the fund-raising effort, said at noon Saturday.

Funds collected at that time, Mrs. Love said, totaled \$6,536.95. Reports are still incomplete with an estimated 35 per cent of the Eastland County rural area yet to be heard from, Mrs. Love reported.

Eastland's donations lead the county—\$1,868.60; Cisco is second with \$1,800 and Ranger is credited with contributions totaling \$1,350.

RHS Coaches Are Elated Over Spring Training

Coach O. C. (Stubby) Warden and his new assistant, Boone Yarbrough, said early Saturday that they are well pleased with the showing of their squad of 40 young grid hopefuls after completion of the first nine days of spring training for the 1953 Ranger High Bulldogs.

The split-T powered Maroon & White crew boasts nine returning lettermen—seven seasoned juniors and two experienced sophomores.

In addition, nucleus of the '53 machine is also built around seven returning squaddies.

Added to these two experienced groups are 24 prospects with, according to Coach Warden, the "majority of them having played junior high football."

Spring drills are due to continue until the end of the month, according to the RHS mentors, who said they started out with 46 candidates, but the squad has narrowed down to 40, mainly through hard work and "otherwise what the players call separating the boys from the men."

An intra-squad duel is slated for Friday night, April 24, at 8 p. m., the coaches said.

He'll Be Ranger's New Mayor After Tuesday Election

Ranger's next mayor, after the formality of Tuesday's ballot-casting, will be Dr. Calvin W. Harris, prominent Ranger physician and civic leader, who is the lone aspirant for the city's top office.

Mayor Price Crawley, present chief executive of Ranger, is not a candidate for re-election. He recently was appointed to the board of directors of a Texas college by Gov. Allen Shivers and thus is ineligible to hold another office.

A fairly large turnout of voters is expected for the Tuesday municipal balloting with eight candidates vying for the four open commission posts.

In the only race that is literally wide open due to the fact that both candidates are newcomers to city politics is that for police and fire commissioner. Incumbent Herschel Angus is not seeking re-election, and L. T. (Lem) Rushing and Dewey Cox Jr. are in the race for that post. Rushing is owner of the Ranger Steam Laundry and Cox is a young attorney.

In the other three commission races, the three incumbents are challenged by rivals.

Finance Commissioner O. G. Lanier, seeking a third term, and Water Commissioner A. H. (Addie) Williams, also up for re-election for a third two-year stretch, are opposed by A. G. Koenig, member of the faculty of Ranger High School, and O. L. (Lee) Cantrell, popular Ranger service station operator.

In the other race, Street Commissioner R. Owen Bray, seeking a first full elective term in that post, is opposed by E. F. (Frank) Wynn, long-time resident and well known Ranger ranchman.

Dr. Harris, who'll be mayor-elect of Ranger after the polls close Tuesday at 7 p. m., has been a resident of Ranger for more than six years.

A native of San Antonio, Dr. Harris is a graduate of Baylor University Medical School and served his internship in the best B. Green Hospital in Antonio.

Dr. Harris moved to Ranger and began his medical practice here shortly after his separation from the U. S. Army Medical Corps as a Major.

The new mayor-to-be of Ranger, his wife and their three daughters—Marcia, Annette and Vicki—reside at 808 Cherry Street.

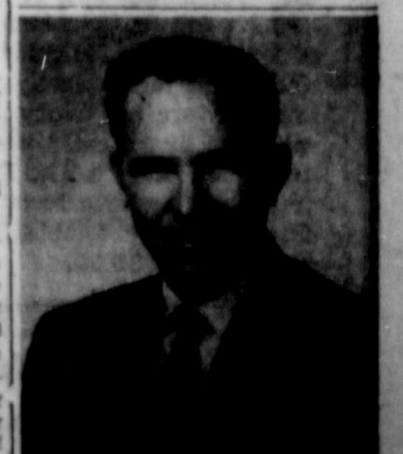

Selection of parade uniforms and placing orders for them will be one of the major items of business, he said.



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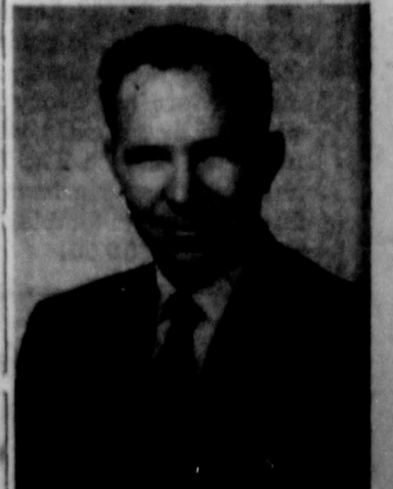
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THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT U. S. DRAFT LAW

The rights of men registered with a draft board are guarded by appeal regulations. Appeals from local board decisions are heard by four state appeal boards.

Both then national and state directors of Selective Service may appeal from the determination of a local board at any time.

A man registered with a board, any person who claims to be his dependent, his employer under certain circumstances, and others may appeal to the appeal board from any classification except a determination of physical or mental condition.

The registered man and others named in the above paragraph, in most cases, are allowed only 10 days from date a notice of classification is mailed to file the appeal. Regulations allow a longer period, from 30 to 60 days, when the man is in certain U. S. territories, foreign countries, or on the high seas.

The local board may allow appeals beyond these time limits if it is satisfied that the failure of the person to appeal within the period was due to lack of understanding or to some cause beyond control of the person.

The person who desires to appeal must file written notice with the board. The notice need not be in any particular form but must state the registrant's name, and identity of person appealing. If a registrant is registered with a Texas board and is working or living in California, for example, he may appeal to a California appeal board if he wishes.

If the registrant is placed in a class available for military service (1-A) by the appeal board, and there is a dissenting vote, he may appeal to the President of the United States.

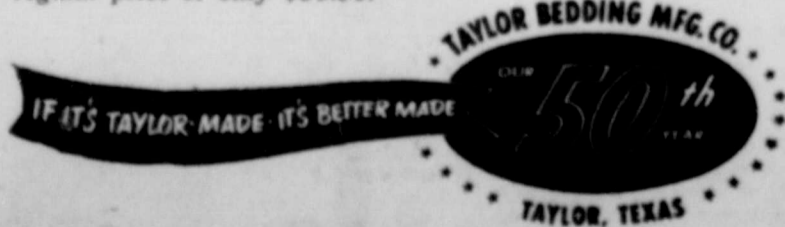

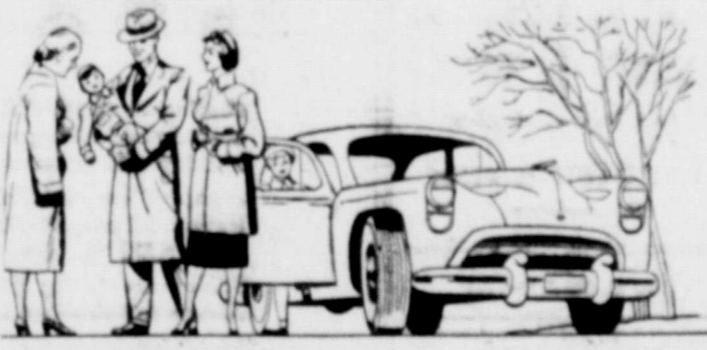

The program for Sunday, April 5, at the Church of Christ in Ranger is as follows:

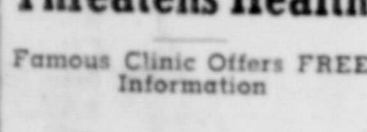

MYF Group To Participate In Sacrificial Meal

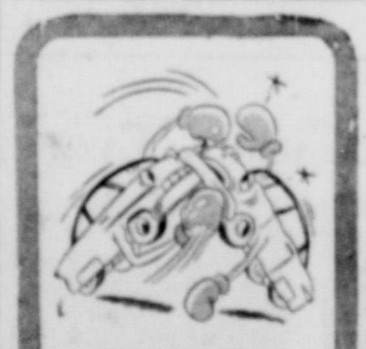

Falls Fatal To Numerous Adults

Falls take a greater toll of adult life than any other type of home accident, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company's statisticians. Falls in the bathtub, however, popularly considered a leading menace to life and limb, actually are responsible for relatively few deaths. This is borne out by a study of the circumstances surrounding fatal accidents in and about the home among the company's adult industrial policyholders.

Nearly half of the fatal falls in the home took place on stairs, but a considerable number occurred when the victims were merely

walking about a room, or going from one room to another. In many instances a rug was reported as the cause of the fall, and in others highly polished or wet floors, or objects left carelessly around, were held responsible.

The next most frequent classes of fatal accidents were fires and burns, often the result of the victim dozing off in bed or in an upholstered chair with a lighted cigarette or pipe, or of such practices as pouring gasoline or kerosene on fires to kindle or hasten them.

Absorption of poisonous gas, firearms accidents, and the swallowing of poisons also resulted in a substantial number of the fatalities among those insured.

"Each year accidents in and about the home kill approximately

28,000 people in our country, about 6,000 of them at the main working ages of life," the statisticians report. "In addition, at least 100,000 persons are permanently crippled or disabled annually in home accidents, and some 4,000,000 more are injured severely enough to be kept from their regular activities for one day or longer."

One of the outstanding facts to emerge from the study, the statisticians note, is that a large proportion of the accidental injuries in the home are preventable.

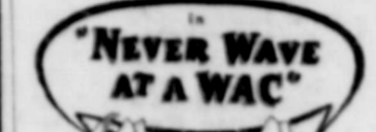
