Polly-pops served with ice cream squares (with animal centers) will give any party a gala touch, and in addition are simple to prepare. Ice cream all made up with animal centers are available on short notice from the ice cream dealer and Polly-pops take no time at all.

POLLY-POPS

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup light corn syrup
 - 1 cup top milk
 - 4 cups SUGAR CORN POPS
 - 1 cup salted peanuts
- Combine sugar, corn syrup and top milk in saucepan. Cook over low heat to 240°F. (soft ball in cold water). Mix SUGAR CORN POPS and peanuts in buttered large bowl. Pour on syrup, mixing thoroughly. Press into buttered muffin pans to about 1/2 inch in thickness. When cool, remove from pans and insert a wooden skewer sideways in each one to resemble a lolly-pop. Yield: 2 1/2 dozen Polly-Pops, 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

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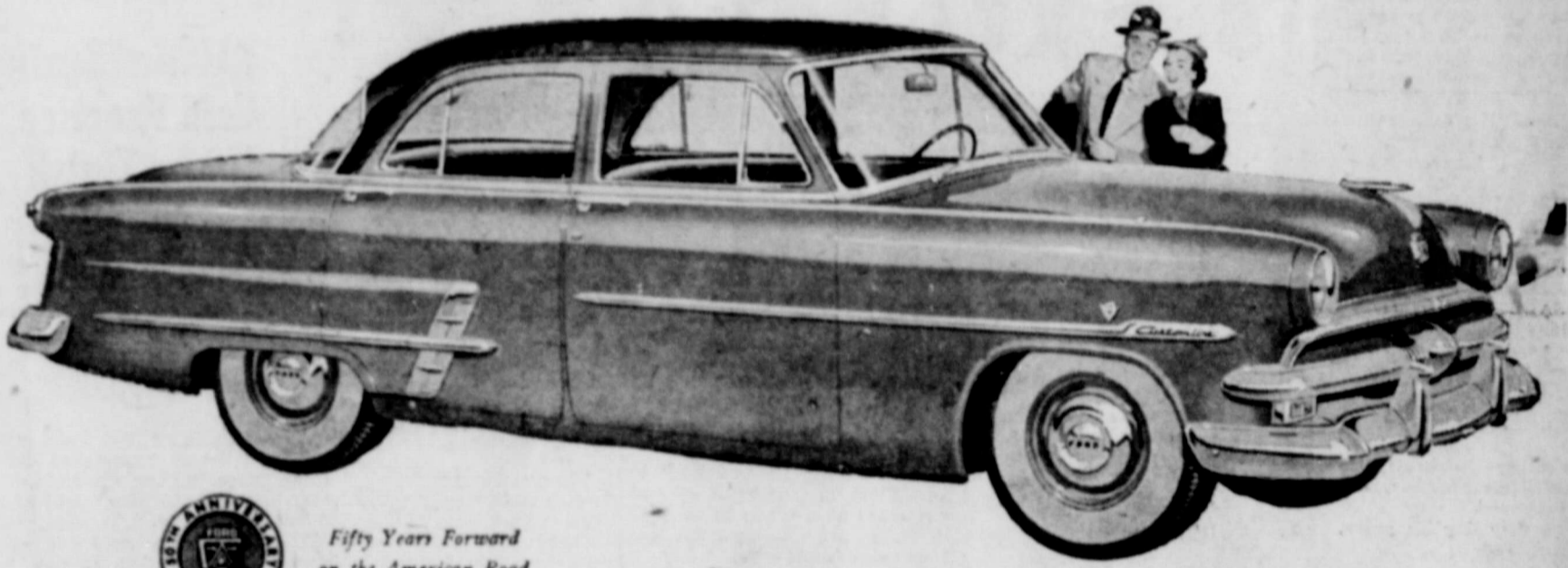

You must go by the way of the cross; you must obey God's command, and this command is found in John 3:16.

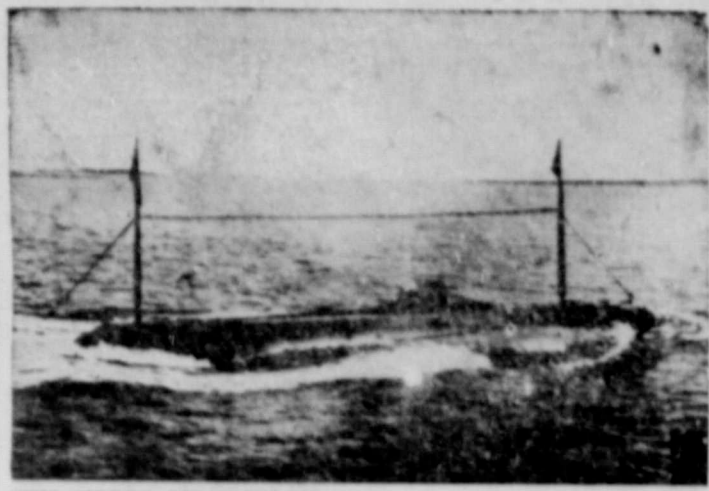
When He sent His son into this world to die for the sin of man, God has requested that we pin our faith on this son.

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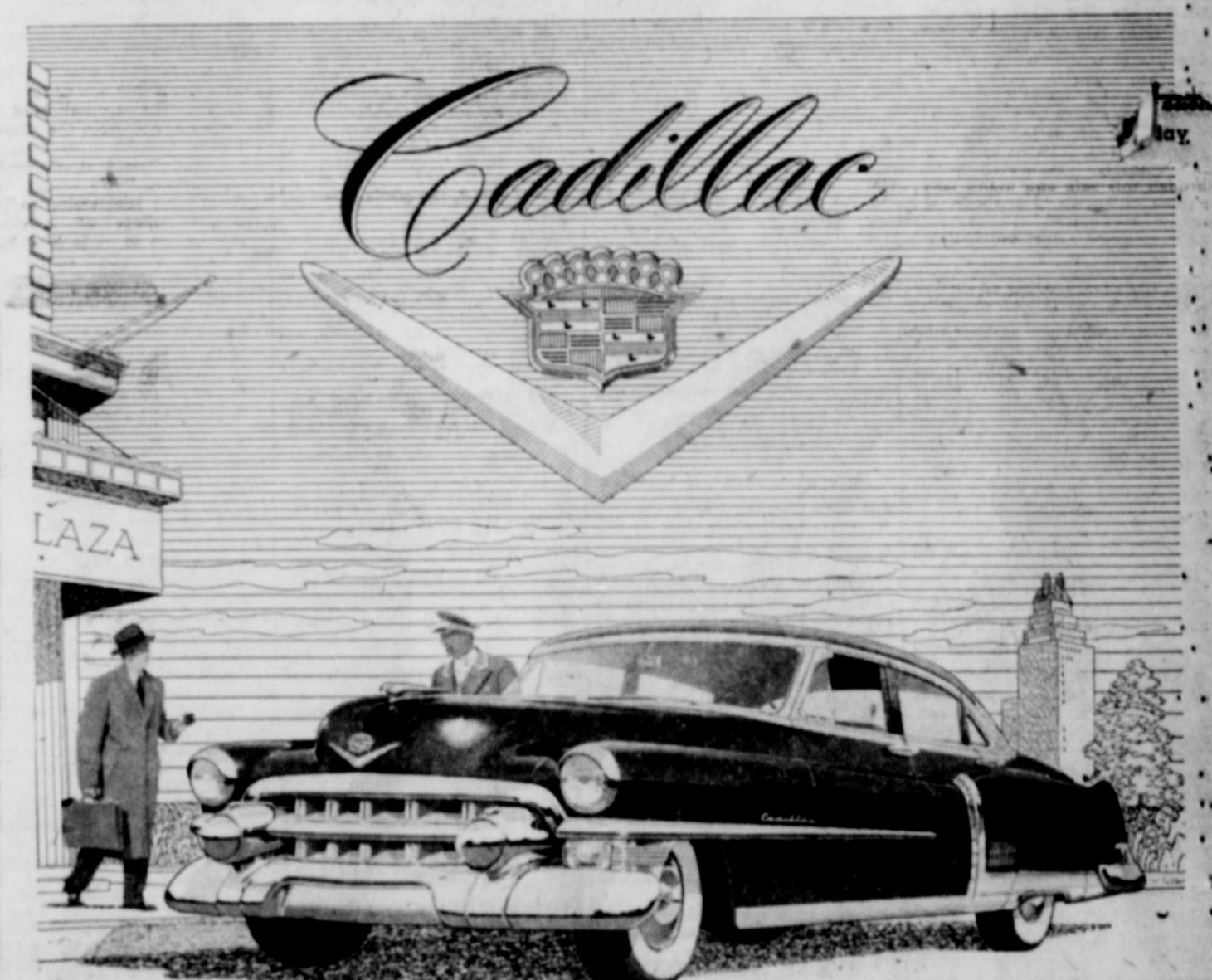
