The Ranger area fared best in Eastland County during the welcome showers which brought much needed moisture to thirsty areas this week. Ranger's rain total for the Thursday and Thursday night period—30 of an inch. The total at noon was .83 and a light shower Thursday night added .07. City Manager Lester Crossley reported early Saturday that the showers raised the city lake three inches, a big boost to the municipal water supply. . . Most Americans think they should be more serious about preparing for the next life than about living comfortably now. But only a few of them are really doing it. . . To find out what Americans think is the proper purpose of life, they were asked "What do you think you should be more serious about: trying to live comfortably or preparing for a life after death?"

When this question was put to adult Americans of all three great religious groups, 51 per cent answered that they believed the hereafter should be their greatest concern. Some 23 per cent thought both equally important, 22 per cent felt the immediate problem of living comfortably most important. Only 4 per cent couldn't decide.

Of the Catholics, 53 per cent thought the next life most important as compared with 54 percent of Protestants. In both groups 19 per cent thought the proper business of life to be living well. Jews were frankly in favor of living comfortably with 68 per cent holding this view. Only 8 per cent were sure that one should be primarily concerned with the next life.

Of the Protestants, Baptists show the highest (68 per cent) percentage of concern with the next life and Episcopalians the least (35 per cent).

When asked how their practice measured up to their belief Americans revealed a considerable discrepancy. Of Americans as a whole, 46 percent admit frankly that most of their energies are devoted to living well in this life. Only 21 percent thought they were chiefly concerned with preparing for the next life. Some 30 percent feel they are giving equal emphasis to both.

Broken down by religion, 39 percent of Catholics, 45 percent of Protestants, and 84 percent of Jews feel they actually are more serious about the here than the hereafter.

These figures were arrived at in the first nationwide survey of religious beliefs and practices. The survey was made by an independent opinion research firm.

New Highway Is Being Planned

Chamber of Commerce officials from Eastland, Gorman and DeLeon met in Gorman last week to consider the Eastland-Gorman Highway 6 plans, which would make possible a good road between the two cities. As a matter of fact considerable work has been done on this project, in the way of surveying and even obtaining land for the right-of-way.

Such a road would reduce mileage for southbound motorists which in the end would mean the saving of money and time.

South from Gorman work is progressing nicely on that highway, but the gap between Eastland and Gorman is in need of attention.






