## Texas Cancer Crusade Shows Great Growth

Vigorous local Cancer Crusades over the state have helped Texas score a new record this year for passing the half-way point of the Crusade financial goal.

For the first time in the seven-year history of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, more than one-half of the state goal was achieved by April 15.

As of that date, a total of \$325,750.72 was either pledged or

in the bank. This figure is 54.29 per cent of the 1953 state goal of \$600,000.

The total represents funds reported by Crusade Chairmen, memorial contributions and other gifts received at state headquarters during the year (to be credited to county Crusades) and funds either pledged or received from federated "one-fund" drives.

**Outlook Encouraging**  
All in all, the outlook is encouraging for the Texas Division to reach its goal this year, according to Division President Travis T. Wallace of Dallas.

However, he cautioned against over-optimism.

"At this point in the Crusade, much of our total is due to funds pledged by county units which participated in united fund drives last fall. That money was pledged before we began our April Crusade," he said.

**Second Half Harder**  
"This simply means that the second half of the Texas goal will come harder than the first half did."

Mr. Wallace emphasized "that getting the 'cancer story' to the public, 'in order that lives may be saved by early diagnosis and prompt medical treatment,' was

the primary aim of the American Cancer Society."

He added, "every possible dollar is needed if we are to continue fighting cancer through our expanding programs of research, public education and service."

"There can be no let-up if Texas is to reach its goal!"

### KTBC Television Station, Austin, To Be Enlarged

RCA's first shipment of a new 10-KW high-band VHF television transmitter was announced today by the RCA Victor Division, Radio Corporation of America. The 5000-pound transmitter was shipped to Station KTBC-TV in Austin, from the RCA Engineering Products Department plant in Camden, N. J. Station KTBC-TV, which went on the air last November on channel 7, is now operating with an RCA 2-kilowatt transmitter and 12-section super-turbine antenna. From its antenna, 740 feet above average terrain, the station is providing a signal of approximately 20-KW effective radiated power over a wide area in the Lone Star State.

When the new transmitter is installed, the Austin station will become one of the most powerful television outlets in Texas. The new VHF transmitter, coupled with the present antenna system, is expected to provide 100-KW effective radiated power, maximum power granted the station by the FCC.

Station KTBC-TV is owned by the Texas Broadcasting Co., operators of Austin's radio station KTBC, which has been on the air since 1939. The television station has network affiliation with ABC, CBS, NBC, and DuMont.

### Manila Radio Station Beams Gospel In East

A radio station built by the faith of three young Americans on the outskirts of Manila daily spreads the voice of Christianity around the world and through the Iron Curtain of Soviet Russia and Red China. For 19 hours a day in 34 languages and dialects, radio station OZAS broadcasts to 25 countries programs of public interest and welfare—music, education, first aid, hygiene, agriculture, news—and Bible studies. Its eight powerful transmitters, using specially beamed antennas, carry into the farthest corners of Russia and China, from Japan to Indonesia and all countries in between, and even to the United States and Europe. Its main aim, however, is to spread Christianity in Asia. The non-commercial, non-profit station is inter-denominational. No time is sold. Its airwaves are freely open to all missionary and evangelical groups, to churches and local pastors and individuals, so long as their objective is to preach salvation through Christ. There is no fixed income. The station and its operators are supported only by the donations of listeners and persons. Literally, the station was built on faith. After the end of the world war II, John C. Broger, a navy veteran from Fullerton, Calif., Robert Mowman, Alameda, Calif., and William J. Roberts, Englewood, Calif., got together to use their radio talents by starting a station to spread the gospel in Asia. They tried first to establish the station in China but red tape prevented it. "We thank God now for that," Mowman said. Filipino officials were quick to give them approval and sanction to the plan. With only \$1,000 in the bank in December, 1945, the three took an option on 12 1/2 acres of land just north of Manila worth \$20,000. Then they went to the United States to raise money. One week before the option date was up they were still several thousand dollars short of the \$20,000 needed. "We decided not to worry," Mowman, who is presently running the station, said. "If God wanted us to succeed, he would provide a way. We decided on a week of prayer." On the day the option was due to lapse they were \$4,000 short. Coming into their office in Whittier, Calif., that morning, the three men found a letter from a Chicago businessman who, while on a vacation in California, had

card them fell of their plish. "My heart has been moved," he businessman said. "Please accept my check." It was for \$5,000. The contributions continued and soon they had enough money for a bare beginning. Broger put the first program on the air in June, 1948. The contributions continued and the station grew. Today the material value of the station is estimated at close to a quarter of a million dollars. Its spiritual value to its staff and its listeners is much greater than that.

### Hogs Are Put To Sleep Prior To Their Slaughter

A revolutionary method of putting hogs to sleep prior to slaughter, devised by Geo. A. Hormel & Co., Austin, Minn., meat packer, won for Hormel the honor of making the most outstanding current achievement in food technology. This painless killing process has been awarded the biennial 1953 Food Engineering Award by a committee of 26 outstanding food technologists headed by Dr. Samuel Cate Prescott, MIT food scientist.

The award, which is sponsored by Food Engineering, a McGraw-Hill publication, will be presented to Hormel at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists in Boston, June 22, by Frank Lawler, editor of the magazine.

Hormel's award-winning process involves the use of carbon dioxide gas to immobilize the animals as they are conveyed through a tunnel before slaughter. Previously, the animals were killed without the use of an anesthetic. In addition to enabling a more uniform and efficient movement of the animals,
