Defendant Says He Fled Dallas To Dodge Payments; **Victim's Father Testifies**

Donald Hawkins Brown, 24-year-old fiery-thatched ex-Pallas bus driver charged with the brutal New Year's Eve laying of Joe Campbell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Campbell of Ranger, was on the stand for two gruelling ours Tuesday in Judge Henry King's Criminal District ourt in Dallas.


