





Science And Your Health

Perhaps beauty is only skin deep but the teen-ager knows that if her face is marred by unsightly blemishes, no amount of adult consolation will soothe her.

Today, however, skin specialists indicate that boys and girls may not have to go through the pimpleand-blackhead-stage. The teen-ager may find a way around it with the help of antibiotics, hormones, and sulfas—which have been used with success against acne, as these blemishes are termed.

The soft texture of the human skin is kept that way by the action of a bodily lubricant, one which flows through the millions of oil glands in the skin. In the process of "growing up," when the physical and emotional impact

of adolescence speeds up the activity of these oil glands, particularly those of the face and upper portion of the body, there is more lubricant than the skin can normally dispose of.

The tiny skin outlet becomes blocked with fatty material, and the lubricant piling up underneath it forces the skin to balloon out into a pimple.




