Work on the new dam of the two-city Eastland County Water Supply District reservoir near Eastland and Ranger on the Leon River is progressing according to schedule and is due to be completed on time, it was reported today. The big dam of the \$1,500,000 project probably will be completed next fall. And, if sufficient rain falls over the area, water may be running over the spillway by Thanksgiving.

The collection effort is being executed under direction of Lester Crossley, city manager and tax collector, and A. G. Koenig, finance commissioner.

U. S. Casualties In Korea War Reach 135,586

The Defense Department reported 224 American casualties in Korea for last week, bringing the total since the start of the war to 135,586. The new total consists of 24,214 dead; 98,497 wounded; 2,496 missing and known to be prisoners; 8,840 missing and unaccounted for, and 1,539 men who were missing for extended periods but who now have returned to duty.

Heart O' Texas Fair Begins In Waco, June 26

The Heart O' Texas Fair, which will fling open its gates for the first time on Sept. 26 for a nine-day run, will primarily serve a 17-county area which last year had an income of \$112,000,000 from agriculture and livestock, declared M. D. Corbin, executive vice president of Texas' newest exposition.

Record Landing Made In Copter

An auto-rotation landing from nearly 10,000 feet, believed to be the record, was accomplished by Bell test pilot Elton J. Smith in Bell's XH-17 high-altitude copter, Aviation Week, McGraw-Hill publication, reports.

PMA WHEAT ALLOTMENTS FOR NEW GROWERS DUE SHORTLY; ASK APPLICATIONS

Eastland County farmers who desire to plant wheat this fall for the first time in the past three years, are asked to make applications as soon as possible for new grower allotments at the county offices of the Production Marketing Administration in the courthouse at Eastland, Supervisor E. E. Powell reported today.

Under the allotment program for the coming year, those who have planted wheat during the past three years will not need to make application for acreage. Others will need to apply for the new grower allotments. The applications must be made during June.

Mr. Powell said that the 1954 quota for the county is expected to be known in the near future. Eastland County farmers already have planted some 8,000 acres of castor beans this spring, Mr. Powell reported. This compares with some 3,500 acres planted last year. This year's total is expected to be about the same as last year.

The PMA office has castor bean seed for sale at 15 cents per pound. Support price for castor beans is nine cents per pound. Most of the county's peanut acreage has been or is being planted, Mr. Powell said. Peanut seed is comparatively scarce at this time, and the seed is selling from 25 to 25 cents per pound. Most farm areas are beginning to need rain. A rain in the next few days would provide adequate moisture to finish the planting of peanuts and grain crops and would materially benefit crops now up to a good stand.

Eastland County orchards have a good crop in prospect, a survey showed. Apples, plums and early peaches are beginning to move to market. Vegetables are fairly plentiful.



TRUCE MAP—Outline on truce map are the steps that will probably be taken once an armistice is signed in Korea: (1) Within 12 hours after truce signing all hostilities will cease; (2) Within 3 days troops on each side will withdraw two kilometers (1.2 miles) from the existing front creating a two-and-one-half mile buffer zone. All fortifications within the demilitarized area will be destroyed. This demilitarized zone will not, however, affect Communist fortifications behind the zone, or the United Nations reserve lines behind the present front line. (3) Within 5 days both sides will withdraw their forces from islands located on opposite sides of the truce line. These islands are mainly in the hands of UN forces and have been invaluable as radar stations and as bases for obtaining information from behind enemy lines. (4) A commission, consisting of representatives of both sides and four neutral nations, will be set up to enforce the truce. (5) The size of forces on each side will be frozen as of the time of the armistice signing, although each side may rotate or replace 35,000 troops a month. (6) Continued holding of "non-military" airfields will be permitted on each side of the demilitarized neutral zone. The Communists have the advantage at this point since they will be able to rehabilitate North Korean airfields and communications. Prior to an armistice UN bombing has forced all Red aircraft to base north of the Yalu River. (7) Within 2 months after signing of the truce agreement, all prisoners who wish to be repatriated will be exchanged. (8) Within 3 months, both sides will get together for a political conference on issues that still remain to be settled.

PAY INCREASE FOR TEACHERS IS IN MIDDLE

Officials of the Texas State Teachers Association said today administration leaders had consistently refused to consider any reasonable solution to the teacher pay problem and had insisted on increasing local property taxes to finance any raise.

TSTA officials advised the organization's 52,000 members that no real compromise was ever offered by those opposing the \$600 teacher pay raise bill.

They noted that the legislature apparently felt the \$600 recommendation made by TSTA a reasonable figure because both the House and Senate passed the \$600 bill, Senate Bill 24, by lopsided majorities.

Proffer said he had called on Gov. Allan Shivers on May 14, in the hope that some solution might be found, but that the "Governor flatly refused to cooperate."

The TSTA leaders pointed out that they opposed the so-called Kilgore bill, which would have given teachers a \$306 raise if and when the natural gas tax is upheld by the U. S. Supreme Court, because it would have increased local property taxes and would have eliminated some of the services under the Gilmer-Alken program.

Polio Hits 56 New Victims During Week

Polio struck 56 more victims in Texas last week, the State Health Department said today.

The disease did not extend to any new areas.

The new cases brought the year's toll to 335, compared to 668 last year.

State health officer George Cox predicted much less polio this year. He said the extent of the disease depends on how closely Texans follow basic sanitation at home.

Twenty-eight counties reported new cases last week. Jefferson and Harris had six each; Dallas five; Cameron and Orange, four each; Victoria three; Brazoria, Harrison, Hidalgo, Jasper, Montgomery and Nacogdoches, two each; and Aransas, Bexar, Brazos, Dawson, Ellis, Grayson, Hill, Hutchinson, Johnson, Lavaca, Mason, Newton, Refugio, Wharton, Winkler and Wood, one each.

Eastland Boy Making Good In Army Air Force

Elton G. Hogan of Eastland, AFROTC student at North Texas State College, Denton, Texas will attend an Air Force ROTC Summer Camp from 22 June 1953, to 19 July, 1953, at Walker Air Force Base, Roswell, New Mexico.

The Summer Camp portion of the four year AFROTC program comes between the cadets' junior and senior years and is designed to introduce the future Air Force officer to life on an Air Force base.

Cadet Hogan, along with cadets from other schools and colleges throughout the country, will undergo a 188 hour training program with primary emphasis on the main weapon of the Air Force, the aircraft, and on flight in the Air Force mission.

Navy Offering New Program To Younger Boys

The Dallas Naval Air Station will open its gates to 65 more recruits for an accelerated training program beginning June 13, according to Lt. H. A. Edsall, Aviation Technical Training Officer.

A total of 130 young men, 17 to 18 1/2 years old, will be enrolled in either a 56 or 90 day active duty training course.

Completion of the course will qualify a man for higher rank in the "Weekend Warriors" where he will meet with his Naval Reserve aviation squadron one weekend each month.

"One significant feature of the program," said Lt. Edsall, "is the fact that every recruit who enrolls can request and receive a two year tour of active duty, to satisfy selective service obligations, should he receive draft induction orders."

The guarantee of active duty is especially appealing since Navy Recruiting stations all over the state have four to six month waiting lists of men trying to get into the Regular Navy for a four year hitch, the training officer said.

Sixty-five men are already enrolled in the courses, which will be given entirely at the Dallas air station. An additional 65 openings in the training program have been authorized and men will be enlisted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Recruit trainers will receive between \$160 and \$270 for their training period. They will usually be given two days a week off.
