#### Egg Prices To Level Off, **USDA** Reports

The Agriculture Department asually high egg prices for the remainder of the year.

Officials said egg prices won't be able to keep pace with the big gains registered earlier in 1953 because production figures will probably set a seasonal record in the coming months.

Instead, a farmer's egg prices will keep more or less constant with returns for the late part of 1952. Raises later in the summer are not expected to be above aver-

age.
