Classes will begin Monday, Sept. 14, at Texas A&M College for the 1953-54 school year. New student week commences Friday, Sept. 4. The calendar for the first semester, which ends January 18-23, with examinations is as follows: Sept. 4, opening day of new student week; Sept. 11, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., registration of new Basic Division students who have had no college work; Sept. 12, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., registration of all other students.

September 14, 8 a.m., beginning of classes; Sept. 19, last day for enrolling in the college for the fall semester or for adding new courses; Sept. 26, last day for dropping courses with no grade; Oct. 17, Saturday a holiday; Nov. 9, Monday, mid-semester grade reports; Nov. 14, Saturday, a holiday; Nov. 26-29, inclusive, Thanksgiving holidays; Dec. 19, Saturday, 12 noon, beginning of Christmas recess; January 4, 1954, Monday 8 a.m., end of Christmas recess; January 18-23, inclusive, semester examinations.

The second semester begins January 27, opening date of new student week. Semester examinations for the semester will be held May 24-29.

Ray D. Walton Now In Germany

WITH THE 1ST INFANTRY DIVISION IN GERMANY—Army Pvt. Ray D. Walton, Strawn, is now serving in Germany with the 1st Infantry Division.

The first American division to remain in Europe continuously since World War II, the 1st Infantry is constantly undergoing intensive field training as part of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) defense force.

A rifleman in Company H of the 18th Infantry regiment, Walton entered the Army last January and received basic training at Fort Hood, Texas.

He is the son of Mrs. I. Howard, Ranger, and Dan R. Walton, of Strawn.

The Army's 32nd Infantry Division generally is credited with more combat time than any other World War II division. In action in the Pacific theater, the division piled up more than 600 combat days.



There's speeding nuts Hit that train But didn't have guts To do it again! Gather 'round, you golfers - "Rule No. 1 in golfing is Forget the Ball," says country club pro Danny Williams, in an article in August Pageant. "I try to convince my students that what they don't know about golf will improve their games a lot faster than what they think they know," continues Williams. "Grip and stance can be learned by simply watching a good player. Then, when the beginner is ready to swing, all he should have on his mind is to take the club-head back slowly and hit out through the ball on a line with the green. If he concentrates on this one thing, good golf will result." Yet most average golfers are lost in a maze of well-meaning "instruction," says the Pageant article. The one-piece physical action of swinging has been broken down into more complicated parts than you could find in a Swiss watch. As a matter of fact, most of Mr. Williams' time is spent in "teaching" golf, and convincing his students that a good golf swing, and thus good golf is a simple, uncomplicated motion. "All golfers, except the really good ones make

the same mistake," says Williams. "They concentrate too much on hitting the ball. I say Forget The Ball!" Past-master of golfing, Byron Nelson, agrees. "We would get better results very quickly," he points out in an official Professional Golfers' Association instruction manual, "if we could visualize the picture of that clubhead hitting through the ball and not just to it." All great players have one thing in common, says Nelson. When they are standing over the ball ready to make a shot, they are not concentrating on the ball. They are thinking, instead, about a point a couple of feet past the ball, a point low along the ground and on a straight line with the objective. The ball just happens to be sitting in the path of the club-head as it sweeps through on its way toward that point. Snead, Hogan, Oliver, Demaret, Nelson and all the rest developed their golf eccentricities with one motion - to get the clubhead sailing, not at the ball but just up to it, but clear through it. And the objective is the same for a 20 foot pitch shot as it is for a 300 yard drive. "The fundamentals, not the frills, produce good golf," declares Williams, who advises every player to take the club back slowly then hit out through the ball. "It may not work the first time," warns Williams, "but if you stay with it for a few holes, you'll hit through the ball—which is the real secret of golf."
