Babies Get New Safety Jacket

BUFFALO, N. Y.—A local pediatrician has developed a "dinner jacket" which he believes will reduce incidence of accidental injury and death among small children.

The doctor, who prefers to remain unidentified for professional reasons, designed the simple jacket to prevent his own children from falling. It is now being sold nationally.

The safety jacket is modeled after hospital restraining jackets, but it is more comfortable. It is sleeveless and buttons down the front. Attached at both sides of the waist of the jacket are two strings long enough for tying to crib sides, the back legs of a high chair, or the metal frame of a baby carriage.

The jacket can be made at home of three-fourths of a yard of almost any heavy material and five large buttons.

Hybrid Corn Is Sure Producer

Corn producers who enrolled last spring in the Texas Hybrid Corn Production program are reminded by Extension Agronomist W. B. Cole that the time has arrived for reporting results.

He points out that early reports from over the state indicate that yields probably will not equal the records set in previous years due to the dry weather which hit at a critical time in the growing period of the corn plant. On the other hand, he says, the reports no doubt will reflect the value of good seed, soil preparation, fertilizer, cultural methods and crop rotation as aids for keeping production high during drought periods. He encourages producers to complete their report forms and pass them on to the local county agent for transmittal to the state office.

Final date for submitting county records for area and state final is Oct. 15. The state committee will soon after this date name the 1953 winners.

Reds Change Buying Methods

HONGKONG—Communist China's purchasing agents are more choosy in the buying of supplies from abroad following the Korean truce.

Red authorities issued orders suspending rush purchases of materials, trade sources said here. They still want imports of strategic items but can now afford to be more leisurely in the prices paid.

At the same time they were lowering the boom on private importers at mainland ports, "suggesting" that they re-invest in industry. If there is going to be continued "intermediate exploitation," the state trade organization is going to do it, according to reports that say the squeeze is being tightened on individual importers. They are finding it harder to get import licenses from the government.

Doves' Diet Tips Hunter

Texas hunters having trouble locating mourning dove targets were advised to watch for food and water areas used by the game birds.

The suggestion came from the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. He noted that north zone hunters who know their dove diet have been having much better luck than those blindly trusting to luck to locate the birds.

He said doves are fond of weed seeds such as sunflower and croton. They also like grain such as maize.

One handicap to the hunter since the rains came is that water is

more accessible and thus the doves do not concentrate at tanks like they do in extremely dry weather. Some hunters, who dress their own game, study contents of the birds' crop and then plan their hunting trips accordingly.

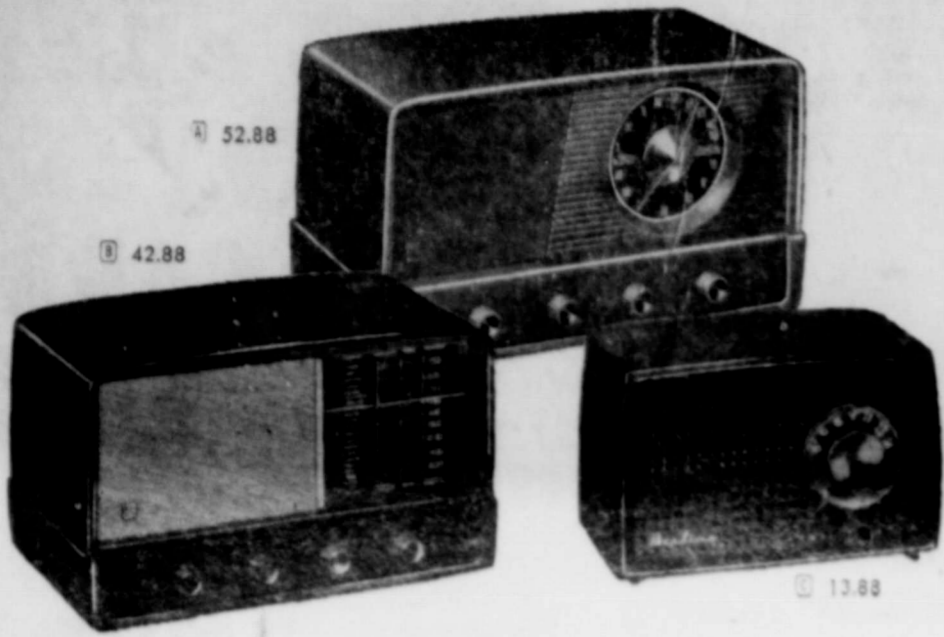

Snakes Roam In Fall Air

Snake lover or not, Texans may count on seeing a good reptile display for the next few weeks. In fact, according to the Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission who doubles in herpetology, the big fall parade is already underway. This is reflected in phone calls and letters to the Commission about identifying various species. The Chief Aquatic Biologist said snakes do most of their daytime traveling during spring and fall because of moderate temperatures. He pointed out that snakes are very sensitive to weather extremes and are usually inactive during the heat of the summer days and during cold weather. He cautioned Texans to be on the lookout for the four poisonous snakes in the Lone Star State—rattlesnake, copperhead, coral snake and cotton mouth moccasin.

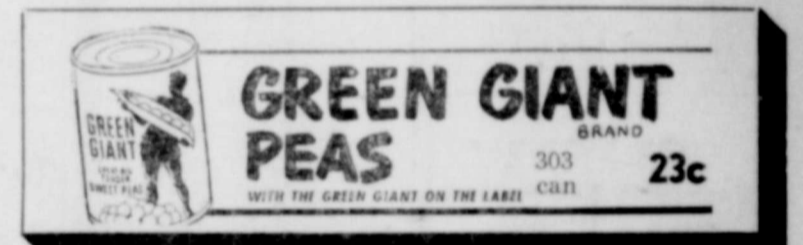

DOVE BANDS TELL STORY

Hunter cooperation through forwarding bands from game they harvest is being manifested in specimens reaching Game and Fish Commission Headquarters.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission said bands already have been received from mourning doves taken in the north zone where the season opened September 1, and from the white-winged dove season opening in the Rio Grande valley, September 11.

The first band received at headquarters was forwarded by a policeman. He was Patrolman H. H. Frye of the Johnson City force. The bird was banded by Game Travis Gilbreath as a nestling on July 23 this year about four miles northeast of Johnson City. It was harvested on the opening day of the north zone season about five miles southwest of Johnson City.

The first white-winged dove band was sent in by Wayne Frost of Edinburg. The bird was banded September 12 in Hidalgo County in which it was tagged May 23, 1949, thus being more than four years old.

One strange incident in connection with the first batch of mourning doves bands was reported by A. S. Jackson, Wildlife Biologist stationed at Canadian. Three banded doves were found dead under a fence on the Penton Farm in Gray County, apparently having been killed by reckless flying. The dead birds were found near the place where they were banded.

Jackson's letter of transmittal explained: "In the late summer, doves are prone to fly recklessly from the tree grove and collide with fences, limbs, etc. I have found two with crops cut open from locust thorns."

Bands from wildlife are needed by Game and Fish Commission biologists to help piece together the habits of game, such as determining migration, lifespan, feeding and nesting routes.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said the band receipts later will include those from doves in the South Zone, beginning October 1, waterfowl, deer, antelope, wild turkey and the like. Persons forwarding the bands receive a formal acknowledgment from the Commission, including a "case history" of the specimen involved.

One of the consequences of the electronic revolution in warfare is that the initial blows are likely to be decisive, he says. 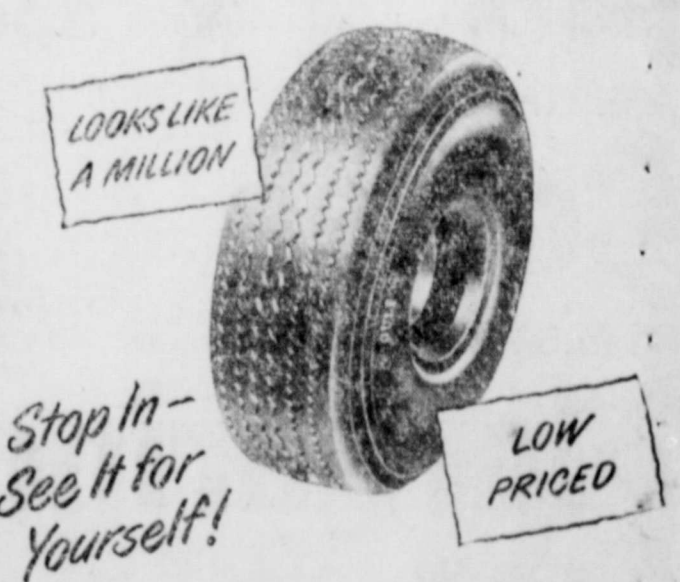
