Soil Conservation Service Plant To Hold Field Day

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on August 27, 1980.

Jim Boykin, district conservationist for SCS at Baird, said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Billy Carr, manager of University Lands (surface interests), Midland, will be the principal speaker. Carr will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2½ miles west of Knox City.

A barbeque lunch will be available

on a prepaid basis at \$4 per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crownover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by August 23.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell to the public.

Several hundred strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, and woody plants are being tested at the Knox City Center.

Commissioners Approved 1981 County Budget August 11

Monday, Aug. 11th the Callahan County Commissioners approved the 1981 county budget of \$1,199,689.25, which was an increase of \$60,373.

The commissioners stated the increase is due to the county having to pay \$40,000 as its share in the legislature-mandated county-wide tax appraisal board.

Commissioners had earlier set the new tax rate at 40 cents per \$100 of value based on 100 per cent assessed value. The old tax rate had been \$1.10 per \$100 of value based on 15 per cent of assessed value.

County Judge Mack Kniffen said the new rate will have the effect of raising county taxes from 2 to 2½ times what they have been. In other words, county taxpayers will pay a total of about \$200,000 a year more.

Kniffen said the county for the past few years had been operating in the red and had been having to dip into savings CDs to finance operation.

He said it is hoped with the tax increase, the county will be able to operate on an even basis next year and possibly accrue a surplus the next year.

The new budget does not include a

raise for county employees, but Kniffen said commissioners will probably discuss raises next year after seeing what kind of a turn inflation is taking.

In other action, commissioners:

Agreed to do the roadwork to bring 2½ mile road to Coleman Lake southeast of Oplin up to county standards with a group of lake homeowners paying the cost. After the road is brought up to standards, it will be maintained by the county.

Renewed a lease with the Dept. of Fish and Wildlife under which the county pays \$500 a month toward the salary of Government Trapper Ron Bibeau.

Renewed liability insurance coverage on public officials and employees with the Yound and Manion Agency of Baird at a premium of \$11,938 for a three-year policy.

Met with representatives of the Taylor County Adult Probation Office in reference of an overcharge of \$10,000 assessed to Callahan County in probation office service fees. Kniffen will meet with the Taylor County judge in the near future requesting a rebate.

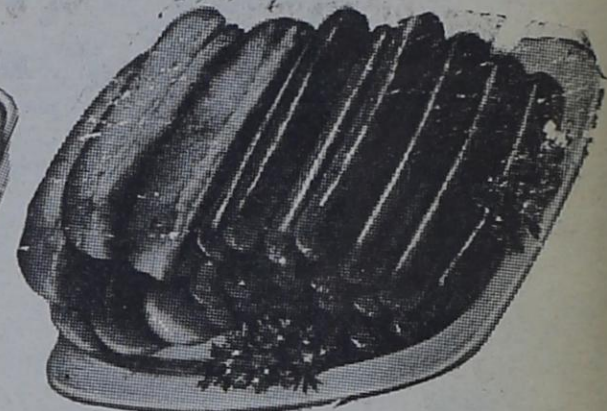



Tatom's Death Ruling Pending Autopsy

A 24-year-old Graham pharmacist and son of the superintendent of the Brady school district died Sunday morning.

Choate said "evidence exists" that Tatom ingested drugs, but he will wait on autopsy results before officially ruling on the cause of death.

Services will be Wednesday in Winters, directed by Winters Funeral Home. The place has not been yet determined. Burial will be in Lakeview Cemetery.

Born Nov. 21, 1955, in Kermit, he was selected as an Outstanding West Texas Scholar by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce during his senior year at Winters High School. He was valedictorian of Winters' class of 1974. He attended the University of Texas Pharmacy School at Austin, graduating in 1978. He practiced pharmacy in Austin, Winters and since September 1979 in Graham. He married Sheila Williams Jan. 8, 1977, in Winters.

Survivors include his wife; two brothers, Steve of Baytown and Kyle of Dallas; his father, Carrol Tatom of Brady; his mother, Elwanda Tatom of Brownwood; paternal grandmother, Viola Tatom of Baird; and maternal grandmother, Mrs. Frankie Williams of Brownwood.

Driver's To Use Caution As 1980 School Year Begins

As the 1980 school year opens, area drivers should give special attention to the rules of the road.

In its annual "School's Open, Drive Carefully", campaign the Texas Division of the American Automobile Association reminds motorists to be extra alert when driving down neighborhood streets and in school zones. Be on the lookout for children darting out from between parked cars. Many youngsters become excited about the new school year and seeing old friends again. They may tend to forget their safety rules. It is a good idea to review safe walking rules with your children and map out the

safest route to school.

The AAA offers some additional tips for a safe school year: Observe reduced speed limits posted in many school zones. Watch for children riding bicycles. Drive your children to school only when it's absolutely necessary. Increased traffic contributes to congestion in school zones. If you must drive your children, find the least congested area to drop them off.

An important reminder: Drivers are required to stop for school buses that have stopped to load and unload children and

to remain stopped until the children are safely across the street and the bus is moving again. This applies whether you are in front of or behind the bus, unless you're separated from the vehicle by a divided highway with a median strip.

The first few weeks of school are the most hazardous, since many youngsters are either attending school for the first time or they are in a different school where they may be unfamiliar with area traffic patterns. AAA urges all motorists to take special precautions at that time.

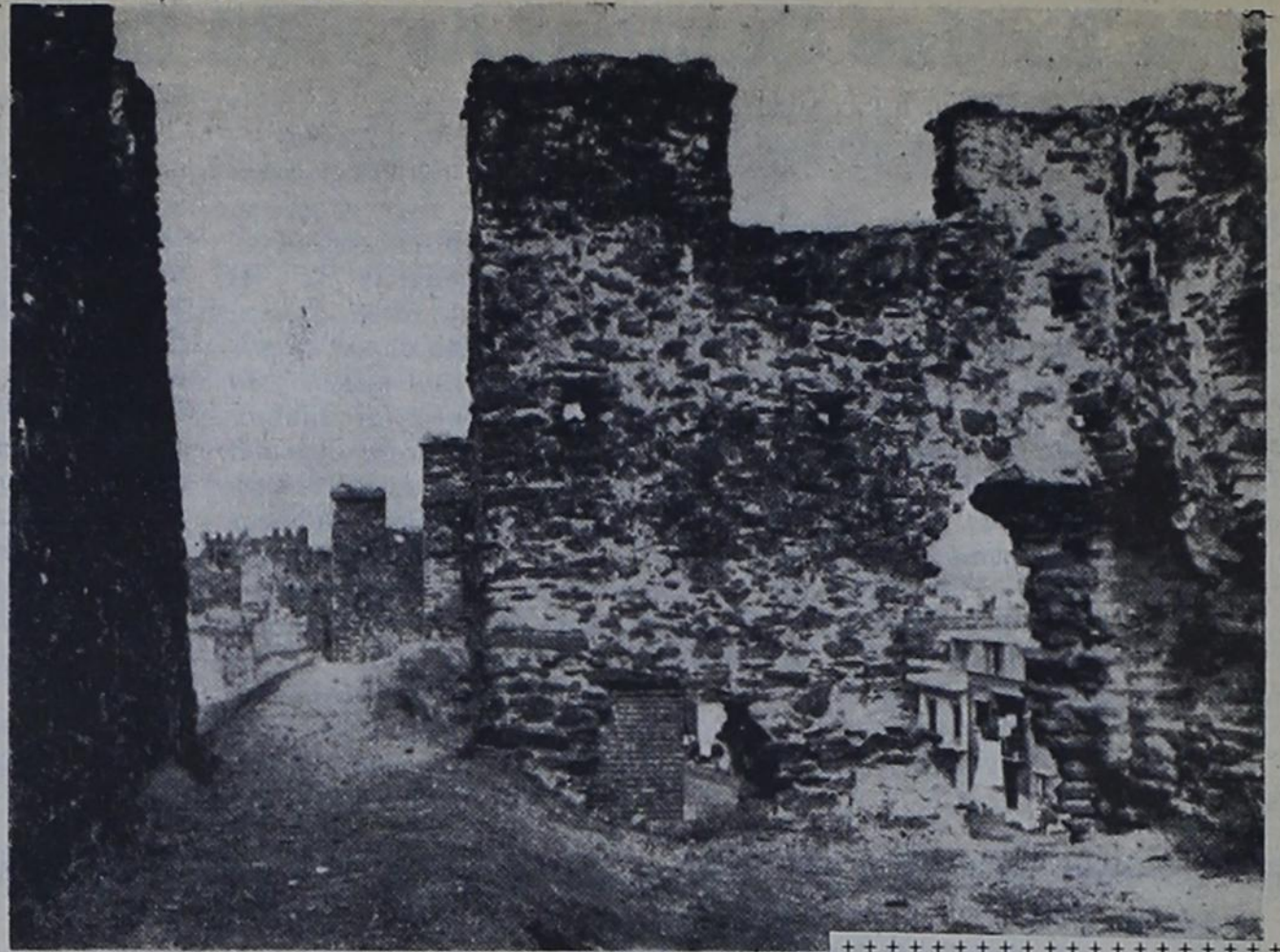
