Oil Tank Is Mysteriously Exploded

A 100 barrel oil tank exploded Monday evening on the Matthews lease, three miles south of Eastland on the former Jake Lyeria Place, with no known explanation for the explosion, according to Wiley Harbin, pumper on the lease for the past seven years. Harbin stated that the tank, which contained 14 inches of oil, swelled up to the shape of a football before blowing up from the inside. A 100 barrel tank of oil next to the explosion was unharmed. The storage tanks are connected to the Premier Pipe Line Company and are situated on the lease owned by Marvin Bridges of Hail Center and Charlie Saigling of Plainview. An estimated \$500 damage was suffered on the tank, which was a total loss. All connections were severed in the unusual and unprecedented explosion, according to Harbin.

Wheat Allotment Application Must Be Made In June

The 15 acre wheat provision is not in effect for 1963, it was announced by Emmet Powell, manager of the Eastland County ASCS office. In fact there is a possibility that an entire new wheat program will be in operation next year.

If there has been no wheat on the farm in the past three years, the farm will not be permitted to plant wheat with out an allotment.

Any producer who is interested in growing wheat for the first time in 1963 should make an application for a new grower allotment, Powell stated.

All applications must be made in the County ASCS Office not later than June 29, 1962.

New Directors Named By Rotary Club

Three new directors were elected by Rotarians at their regular meeting held Wednesday noon at the Ranger Junior College cafeteria.

Named to the new posts were: Herman Cupp, International Service; Bill Collins, Club Service and Rev. Avery Sullivan, Community Service.

Bill Collins was in charge of the program for the day and gave a talk on the electrical industry and presented a sound movie "Behind the Switch," dealing with the area served by Texas Electric Service Company. Collins is local manager for the company.

Collings said that about four-fifths of America's electrical power customers are served by investor-owned companies. The remainder are served by government-financed power suppliers.

Electrical power capacity has been built in America to serve the needs of the people where they want to use it, Collings said. Today an abundant supply of electric energy is available for all of the needs of industry, business establishments, farm and home.

Continuing, Collings said that the longtime growth rate in the use of electricity in America has been at an average rate of 7.15 hundred percent per year compounded. This means, he said, that the use of electric energy in America has been doubling about every 10 years. In conclusion, Collings said that the electrical industry is playing a vital role in the American economy. He said that America now has an ample, efficient power supply system with adequate reserves—three times the capacity of Russia. Eighty percent of this power is supplied by 400 investor-owned plants and power companies.

In speaking in behalf of the Texas Electric Service Company in Ranger, Collings said that he believes that Ranger does have a future and that it will grow. To back up this statement, he said that Texas Electric has completely remodeled the Ranger office and he invited everyone to stop by and see the new office.

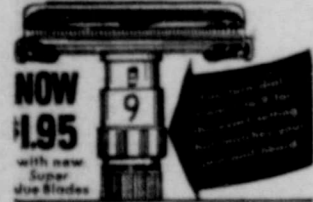

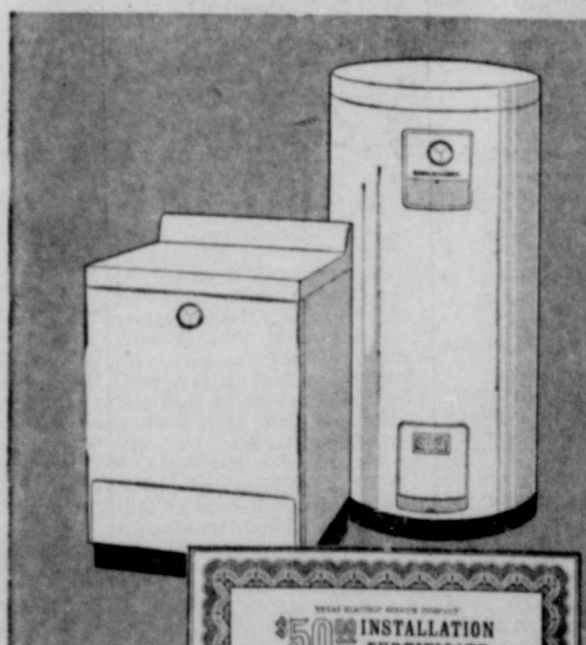

Talks Underway For Seasons On Plentiful Doves

With the outlook favorable for a good dove crop this fall, new season regulations are now being discussed, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Dodgen is meeting in Corpus Christi Friday with representatives of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, to discuss a proposal for a change in the season dates in that area. Valley residents believe that the mourning dove season there should open earlier than the traditional October 1 date. They are also seeking to have the whitewinged dove season on alternate days rather than consecutive days, as in the past two years.

On June 26 there will be a national dove conference in Washington, to discuss dove population, length of seasons, and open date brackets on which the Game and Fish Commission can set up this year's hunting season in Texas. Representatives from all the states where dove hunting is permitted will be present at the conference in Washington.

Reports from the field now indicate, according to Dodgen, that a heavy brood stock of doves remains in Texas for nesting this year. Thousands of these mourners can be seen along the highways in practically every section of the state. Reports from the Rio Grande Valley also indicate a heavy whitewinged nesting population this year. There have been no reports as yet from the Middle West as to the mourning dove situation, but generally there is a heavy migration through the Middle West to Texas during the fall and winter months. These are known as the "fat northern doves."

The lengthy delays of writing up different types of installment contracts are eliminated and customers now can be assured that they have one type of account and one set of payments and terms. Furthermore, under the new system, Ward will mail monthly statements to each customer reporting the beginning and end-of-month balances, amount of charges for the month, deductions for payments on the account, amount of service charge, amount of payment due on account and the balance to be carried forward to the next month.

"We believe such full disclosure of information will completely satisfy the desires and needs of our customers," Kushell stated.

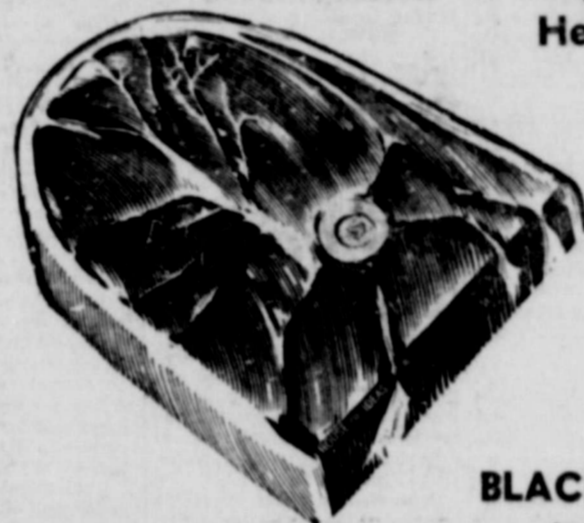

The Evans group has sales of approximately \$12,310,000 for the past year. The transaction will be closed about June 29, the announcement said.

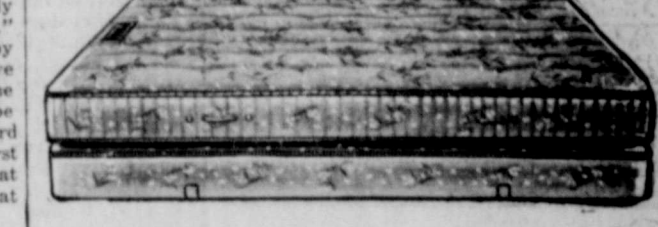
