

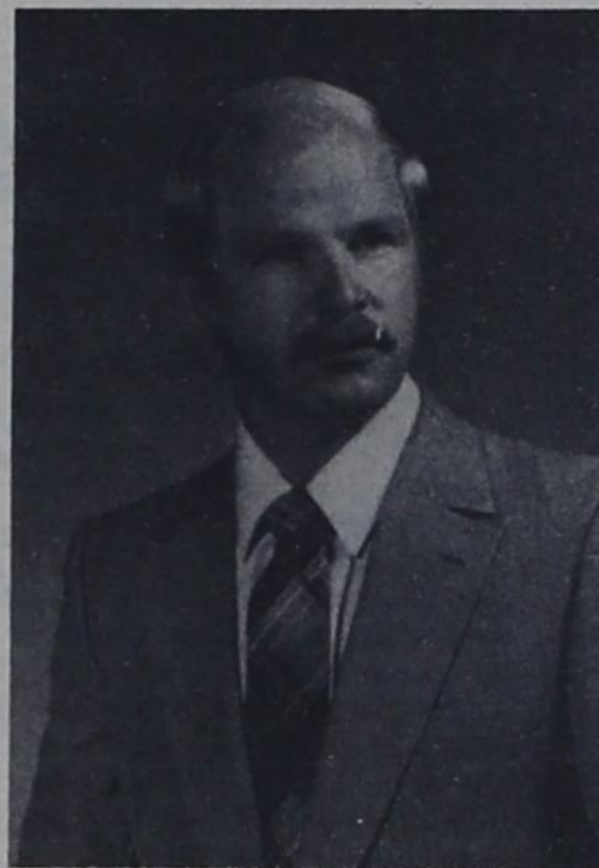
Cheshier Named Head Of WTU Baird Office

Baird City Council Meets In Special Session

The Baird City Council met in a special meeting on October 6th at 7:00 P.M. in the City Hall.

All council men were present with exception of Scotty Mitchell. Six visitors from the public were also present at the meeting.

The 1st item open for discussion on the agenda was the city's budget. Mayor Brame made the comment that he had been surprised there was no more adverse comments over the budget than there had been. He also said that several people had been by the city hall to inspect the detailed budget. After a few minutes of discussion the budget was approved as presented with the stipulation that the city secretary pay the bills according to the new budget. The motion to approve was made by councilman Martin, if was seconded by councilman Brooker and all members were in favor.

The 2nd item on the agenda was the

motion to advertise for bids for the intent to lease mineral rights at the Baird Lake. If this should come to pass the city would ask approximately \$20 an acre bonus plus a delayed rental fee of \$2.00 per acre. The council was in favor of advertising for bids. The bids will be opened at the 1st regular meeting of the council in November.

The last item on the agenda was to raise the charges for sanitation to the 33 1/3 percent increase the new budget calls for to allow the sanitation dept. to break even at the end of the year. The residential rates will be increased from \$3.00-\$4.00 with the 33 1/3 increase. The council voted on the matter and all were in favor.

Mayor Brame closed the meeting by making the motion that there be no meeting the 13th of this month due to the holiday, and all council persons were in favor.

Baird Winds Up An Impressive Win Against Albany

The state ranked Baird Bears were rude hosts to the visiting Albany Lions handing Albany its second loss in as many weeks, 35-20. Again the Bears rolled up impressive figures on offense. Total offensive numbers were: 395 yards and 21 first downs.

Greg Augtin had another big night from his running back position, leading all rushers for the evening. Mike Duncan picked up the power yardage and was credited with 12 tackles on defense. Darryl Harris directed the offense and did a great job until sidelined with a slight injury in the 3rd quarter. After Harris went out, Junior Sid Grant moved in from his flanker position to take over the quarter backing chore and played well. Grant also intercepted 3 Albany passes to bring his interception total to 11 through 5 games.

The game saw the return of previously injured, Brian Fears, who blocked great as did Lucky Walker, Dana Gillit, Ricky Defosses, Alan Bohannon, and David Collins. Bohannon was also the leading tackler with 15 on the night. Mike McCormick again played well, and this time also got good blocks as a fill-in at the offensive tackle.

Brent Shaw's play was highlighted with a spectacular tackle that put Albany in a hole, after it appeared they were on their way for another score. Eddie Graham and Larry Segura continued their hard-nosed play from their secondary positions. Davy "Slick" Vestal absolutely destroyed Albany with 3 vicious tackles. Larry Hallmark came in when it counted and played air-tight pass defense. Alan Tatum was the leading tackler on the

specialty teams.

Baird's next opponent will be the undefeated Jim Ned Indians at Jim Ned. The winner of this game will be undisputed leader of District 8AA, so it is important that all fans turn out to support their Bears. Game time is 7:30 P.M., at Tuscola.

The Baird Bears Junior Varsity took on the previously undefeated Albany Lions and won 20-0. Wayne Fox opened the scoring with a 30 yd. burts off the block ing of Russell Rhynes and Joe Payne. Darrel Canada added the extra point and the score was 8-0. Later in the second quarter, Q.B. Ronald Casey passes 5 yds. to Canada. The P.A.T. failed and the 1st half ended with the Bears on top, 14-0.

The only score in the 2nd half came after an Albany punt was blocked by Billy Deel, and "Goobar" Mitchell fell on it in the end zone for 6 points. The rest of the game became a defensive struggle, as the young Bears defense completely shut down the Albany offense.

Those having an outstanding game were: Mithchell, Jay Moore, Ben Mendez, Payne, Canada, James Frieman, and Gregg Holland on defense. Offensively Fox, Canada, Troy McWhorter, Casey, the ever present "Stormin" Norman, Brock Watson, Chris Graham, Russell Rhynes and Mark Allen.

Excellent specialty team play was turned in by Kye Corn Kenny Brubaker, Jeff Clark, Jay Clark, Richard Swan, Robert Burns, McWhorter, and Bobby Lovell, who also played well in the defensive secondary.

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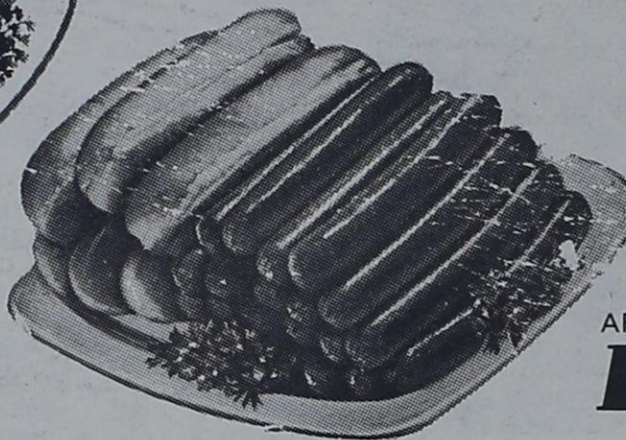
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Draper-Snyder Exchanged Vows

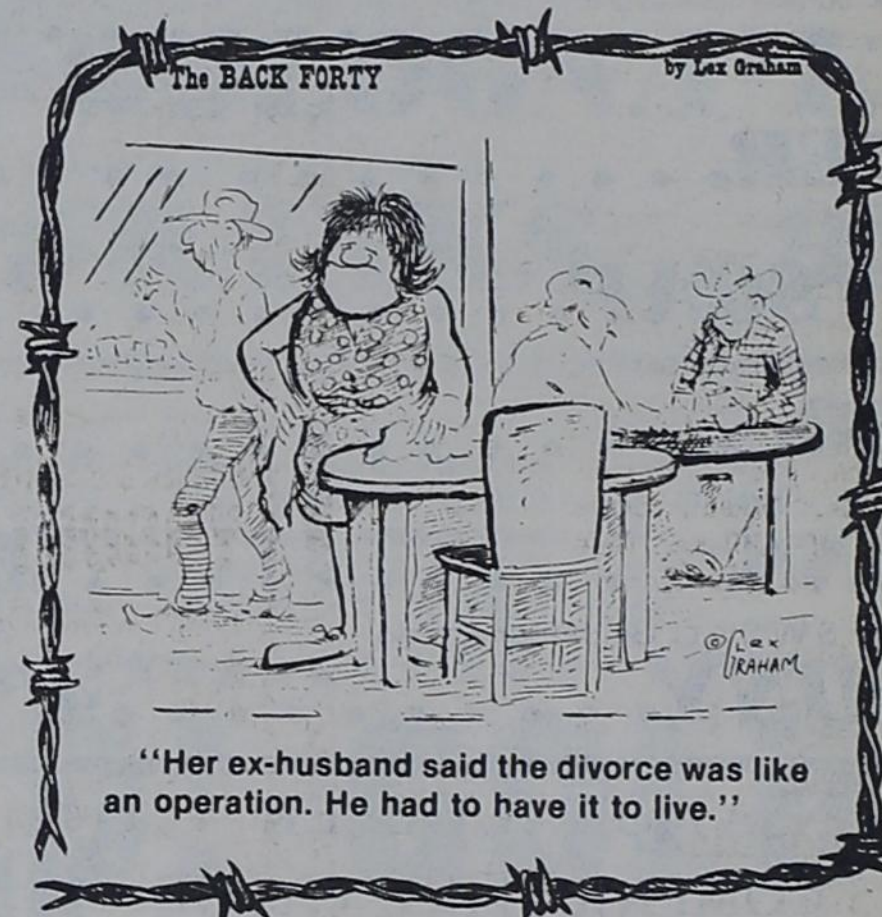

Water Conservation Board Election To Be Held October 14th

An election for a director to serve in Zone 2 on the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday, October 14th, at the Oplin Community Center, announced Ben Wilson Jr., chairman of the board. The election will be held at 12:00 noon.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 2 of the district includes an area in the southern part of Callahan County, the south boundary being the Callahan-

Coleman County line and the north boundary approximating the Brazos-Colorado River divide.

Current members of the board of directors of the Central Colorado SWCD are Ben Wilson Jr. of Coleman, J.H. Martin of Trickham, C.T. Straley of Clyde, Johnny Jamison of Voss and Harold Pittard of Novice.

The purpose of the Central Colorado SWCD, with headquarters in Coleman is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

We'll take it from there. Please don't prolong the call with questions that can't be answered. We'll be getting many other calls, depending on how widespread the outage is. And, if you're answered by a recorded message, it means that the dispatcher already has been swamped with calls and that we're working on the problem.

Oct. 5-11—National Fire Prevention Week

October 5-11 has been proclaimed as the National Fire Prevention Week.

All families and other property owners are encouraged to install smoke detectors and to be especially vigilant in guarding against fires. The proclamation gives emphasis to residential fires where detectors and sprinkler systems can reduce loses of life and property.

However, every year millions of dollars in property are lost in fires not detectable by electronic means not affected by sprinkler systems. these fires, wildfires, destroy forest and range lands in Texas.

The extremely hot, dry summer increased the number of fires this year. However, 98 percent of all fires are man-caused: debris burning, smokers, railroads and equipment, arsonists, and campfires. Lightning causes less than

one percent of the wildfires in Texas.

Of the 4,000 fires reported to the Texas Forest Service during the first 8 months of this year, almost 2,500 were debris or trash fires.

A few extra precautions can prevent these fires. Use a metal drum or brick enclosure with a screen lid as trash burners. Clear all grass and flammable material away from the burner for at least 5 feet. Keep a rake and water supply ready to put out fires caused by flying sparks. Do not burn on windy days. Never leave a fire unattended.

Detecting a fire is important, but the best way to eliminate losses from wildfires and home fires is to prevent them. Prevention begins with every citizen in the state and their desire to observe fire prevention week every day of the year.
