## MRS. ALSWORTH TELLS OF HER TRAVELS IN EUROPE

Mrs. C. D. Alsworth of Athens, Greece, mailed the following article to her brother-in-law, P. B. Alsworth of Ranger. Mrs. Alsworth and her husband, who is employed with Standard Oil Company, have been in Athens for about three years. They will be returned to the states around the first of June.

Mrs. Alsworth had this to say about her article: "Many years ago, Mark Twain wrote a most amusing book called 'Three Men on a Broom' (a German word meaning more or less 'spree' or 'jaunt') relating his experiences together with two friends on a tour through Germany. I am therefore indebted to Mr. Twain for the idea for the title of my travelogue.

"Three Women in a Wagon" Some time ago, a Greek friend of mine, Mrs. Vitto Lambadiaris, suggested that she and I make a trip to Istanbul, or Constantinople as the Greeks always call it. She had been born there but was taken away at the age of three months and was eager to visit it. To her evident disappointment, as I had been there several times before World War II.

A month or two later, it suddenly occurred to me that since the Alsworths were leaving Europe for good in the Spring, it might after all be a good idea to make a few trips of this kind. Vitto had suggested driving her own little Swedish car and taking a third companion, but this didn't appeal to me much, as in the first place it would be rather crowded and in the second place, I didn't know how to drive this type of car. So I put on my best thinking cap and came up with the bright idea of asking Mrs. Dorothy Baehr to accompany us on our jaunt, and take her car which I could drive. She being the wife of the U. S. Agricultural Attache, has diplomatic privileges very handy in these parts!

It was finally decided to leave bright and early on Tuesday morning, March 26, 1963. There was the usual huddle as to what to take, what to wear, but we were all unanimous on taking liquid refreshments.

At 7 a.m. Dorothy drove up in our converted Conestoga, a Ford Fairlane. My luggage was piled in and off we went to pick up Vitto. To our disgust, she had two large suitcases, one large train case and one bulging tartan grip. She assured us that the cases were nearly empty, but on helping her to stow them in the trunk, both Dorothy and I were surprised to find they were already plenty heavy. However, we managed to get ourselves and luggage all stowed away, and at 7:15 a.m. we were on the open road.

From Athens, the road goes North East, through not very interesting country at first, but soon we were driving through rolling country with the first signs of Spring on the trees. We passed a very large feeder reservoir to the famous Marston Dam, Athens' main water supply, and drove on to a very well known Spa, called Kamena Vouria. This has boiling hot radium - active springs, and attracts many people suffering from rheumatism and kindred complaints. It is a very pretty setting on the sea with towering hills on its back step, so to speak. A short way past, we came to Thermopylae, the scene of the famous massacre of the Greek army by the Persians, and here it was most interesting to actually see the hot springs gushing out from the hill sides, and pouring down a trough under the road and away down the other side into the sea. It seemed an awful waste of good water, but obviously the supply is unlimited, as these springs were known to the Ancient Greeks. They also obviously suffered from the same complaints!

It was soon after this that I gave my intrepid companions their first scare, as I suddenly hollered "Oh my! There's a stork of all things." Vitto was quite surprised at my excitement over what she termed "A dirty old bird," but I had not seen any in Greece before this, so was quite interested. We were by now well on the way to Larissa, where there is a (Continued on Page Five)

The Eastland County Committee for the eradication of screwworms has asked all cattlemen to be on the look-out for worms and to send in a sample of any they find in the livestock, according to Oscar Schaefer of Route 2, Cisco, a member of the group.

Mr. Schaefer reported that the county has finished raising money for the work with a total of \$8,554.98 being raised. A final report of fund drive showed community contributions as follows:

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## Views Are Given On Professional Field of Sports

Professional athletics offer a great opportunity for athletes with ability to participate and compete with the finest players in their respective sports.

In a recent interview Coach Larry Parker stated that many athletes make the fatal mistake of signing a contract before completing at least two years of college. A college backer, according to Parker, gives the athlete something to fall back on in case he cannot make it in professional sports.

"Education is taking the place of mere physical ability in most professional sports today," he said, "and many jobs are open in the public relations field if the proper education has been acquired."

Basketball and football professional organizations are protecting the athlete by stipulating that he cannot sign a professional contract until his class has graduated from college, but baseball and other sports do not provide such protection.

Because of the fact that professional sports have become more competitive in recent years, the athlete should be familiar with or adept in more than one phase of his chosen sport. For example, concluded Parker, "A baseball scout looks for these qualities: 1. speed 2. arm 3. hitting and 4. exceptional ability; and if a player does not possess these traits, he cannot play even Class D baseball. Other sports call for the same diversity of talent and skill."

**Two County Highway Jobs Underway; Five Are Slated**

Two highway construction projects are underway in Eastland County with five others slated to begin in the near future, according to a report from the Texas Highway Department.

Base-finishing has been completed on Highway 6 from Eastland to Carbon. Surfacing is expected to begin about June 1. Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo has the contract.

M. E. Ruby of Austin is contractor for the farm to market road five miles north of Rising Star. Construction begins at at Criswell's Store on High 182 and continues west to FM 569. Grading and structure work are in the process.

New construction for Farm to Market 2067 is expected to get underway in about two weeks. The road will be located from three miles north of Cisco west in the vicinity of the Cisco lake. The contract was let to M. E. Ruby.

A contract for construction of Interstate 20 from the Calahan County line to the western city limits of Cisco for 1,834,289 also went to Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo and Public Construction Company, Denton.

The 6.2 miles of construction will include grading, structures, base and paving. Work is expected to begin in two or three weeks.

Seal surfacing from the Point Service Station east of Eastland to the junction of FM 571 and on Highway 6 from Carbon to Gorman will begin in July. McElroy Transport Co. has the contract.

**1031 Head Sold At Weekly Sale**

At the regular Tuesday sale of the Eastland Auction Company, a total of 605 cattle, 273 hogs and 151 sheep and goats were sold to 91 buyers. Sellers at the sale totaled 223.

**Income Tax Itemized Deductions Average \$955 for County Residents**

How do income tax deductions claimed by Eastland County residents compare with the amounts claimed by taxpayers in other areas?

How closely will returns be scanned this year for excessive deductions? More closely than before, according to information trickling out of the Treasury Department. Up to date electronic computers and a larger staff of examiners will make it possible.

With approximately 25 million taxpayers itemizing their deductions, the Government has compiled tables to show the average amounts that are claimed in each income bracket.

When a normal amount is listed in a return, the chances are that it will go through without being questioned. However, when it is higher than usual for a particular income, it is likely to be caught by the gimlet eye of an examiner.

In that case, the entire report may be set aside for a thorough review and the taxpayer called upon to support his claims with proper records.

What are these critical amounts that may not be exceeded with impunity? The totals, as they concern Eastland County and other communities, are detailed by the Commerce Clearing House, which reports on matters of matters of tax and business law. Its figures are based on Treasury Department findings.

For the average Eastland County family, whose gross income is approximately \$4,809 a year, according to the most recent data, the deductions should not be more than \$955 to conform to the national.

Making up this amount are contributions, \$164, interest charges, \$304, tax payments, \$288, and medical costs, \$196.

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For those with family incomes as high as \$12,500, the normal deduction is considerably greater, \$2,138. It consists of \$385 in contributions, \$630 in interest, \$670 in taxes and \$453 in medical expenses.

The Treasury Department warns, however, against using these standards as absolute guides. It points out that a taxpayer might be assessed an additional amount in taxes even if his deductions are average.

good motel. Near here, although the mountains were badly shrouded in mist, some lifted, and we had a beautiful view of the famous Mt. Ossa. It is a perfect cone-shaped mountain, and was thick with snow. Away in the murk on our left, and we only caught a brief glimpse, was the Home of the Gods, ancient Olympus, also snow covered, but down came the clouds in a very Wagnerian-Gotterdammerung effect, most eerie but beautiful. We lunched at the Motel, and then it was my turn to drive. After a while, I said in a bright and chatty manner, "Well, I haven't touched a car for two years, but here we go anyway." Vitto didn't like this very much, but it didn't faze Dorothy.

From here we drove through another ancient landmark, the road running along one side of the hill. All Greek roads call for careful driving, as turns are very sharp, and with big cars, you practically touch your tail on many of these curves. We dawdled through the Vale, as it is a very lovely sight. The river is at the bottom, and every now and then, we saw various signs: "Springs of Diane," "Springs of Venus," "Springs of the Muses." This place was also a favorite of the Ancient Greeks. All the way along, we kept seeing storks, to Vitto's disgust, and my amusement.

We were now approaching Thessaloniki, Salonica to you, and here we came upon our first bad stretch of road. The town is getting ready to build a double highway into the center, and has got the old road all churned up, full of pot holes, ruts, dust, as well as traffic. We finally got through, brushed ourselves off, and went out to visit some American friends and incidentally oil the inner man.

## Vets Questions And Answers

Q — A friend of mine—no relative—died without funds or family recently. Due to our long association, I arranged a funeral and picked up the tab. The deceased has served in the army from 1931 to 1935. Will the VA pay a burial allowance in this case?

A — Not unless the deceased had been in receipt of service-connected compensation at the time of death or had been discharged or retired for disability incurred in the line of duty. Neither service-connected nor disability discharge would be necessary had the deceased been a wartime or Korean Conflict veteran.

Q — What is the procedure for getting a veteran into a VA hospital in a medical emergency?

A — Patients requiring emergency medical treatment may be taken directly to the nearest VA hospital, but if possible the veteran or someone acting for him should communicate with the VA by telephone or telegraph beforehand.

Q — Can a widow of a veteran live with another man as his wife but continue to draw a VA pension as long as she does not actually marry the man?

A — No. The law governing widow pensions was amended in 1962 to declare such a person not eligible for pension.

Q — What is the story of an "extra" dividend available to holders of certain types of GI insurance and what must I do to get it?

A — A special dividend is

available only to those Korean Conflict veterans who still hold policies with the prefix RS in front of their policy number. Take one of these two actions: (a) Exchange his RS term insurance policy for a term policy that will generally cost about one-third what he is now paying. The new policy cannot be renewed as term insurance after the veteran is 50 — but it can be converted to a low cost permanent plan insurance policy any time before the insured reaches age 90. (b) Convert his policy to a low cost permanent plan now.



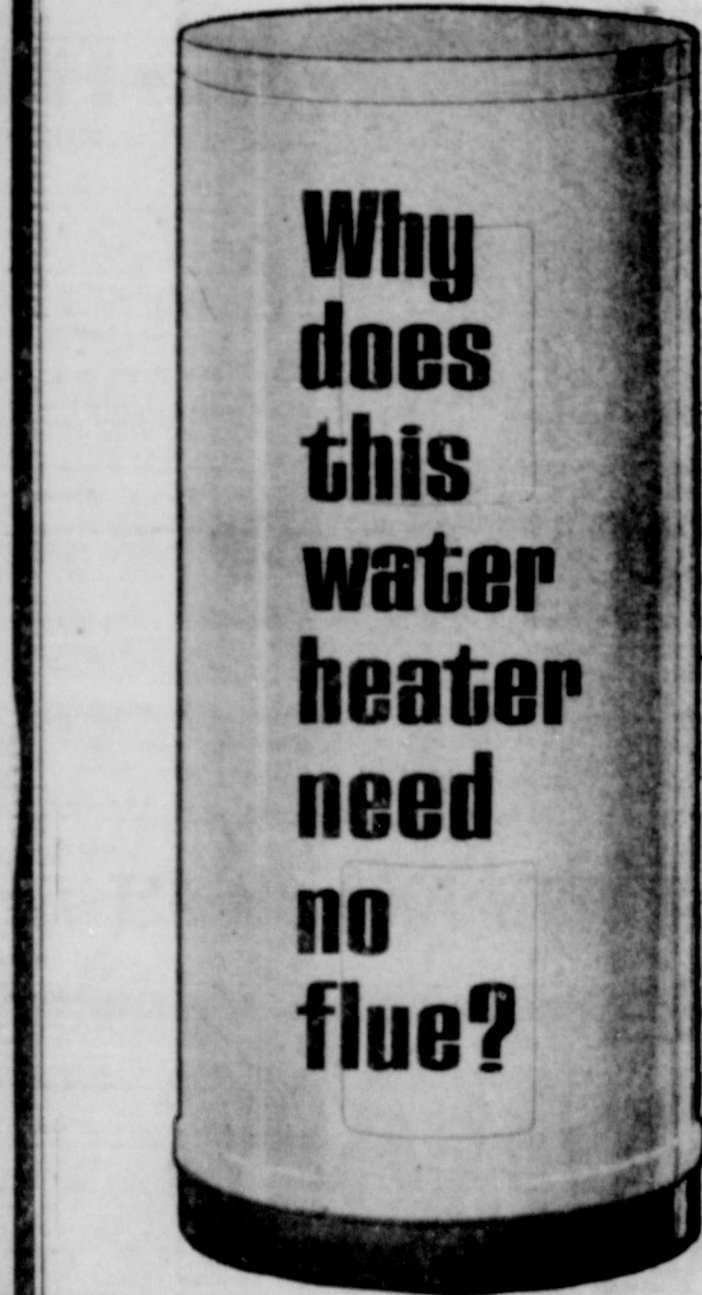
