House was released shortly after he was taken into custody. His address was given as 404 Lula, Ranger.

Using a lifelike model, manufactured in Norway, Mr. Umberson was able to demonstrate techniques used in this method of resuscitation.

Members of the club were able to practice this life saving art under the watchful eye of Mr. Umberson, thereby gaining experience in the application. "Practice on the dummy gives one confidence should it ever be necessary that rescue breathing be used," he said.

Tragic Death Of President Mourned By Entire Nation

The tragic death Friday of President John F. Kennedy brought expressions of great sorrow from Eastland County as well as Texas, the nation and the world.

The President was struck by a rifle bullet in the head while riding in a Dallas parade from the airport to the Merchandise Market building where he was to speak. He died in a Dallas hospital without ever regaining consciousness. His wife was riding with him.

Governor John Connally of Texas, riding in the same car, had a head wound and a wound in the hand. His condition was reported to be serious.

Reaction from area residents included these comments:

Calvin Brown of Ranger, county Democratic chairman — "It was a black day for Texas. The most regrettable thing that has ever occurred in our state. I feel that Lyndon Johnson is a capable man and will carry on for the remaining term of office vacated by this unfortunate action."

Dr. S. W. Reynolds, superintendent of Cisco District of the Methodist Church — "I am too shocked to speak. My prayers are certainly for the Kennedy family and for our nation."

Don Pierson, mayor of Eastland — "The tragedy will be long remembered in the eyes of the world. America-loving citizens throughout this country mourn the death of President Kennedy and the wounding of Governor John Connally. Too often, pure American patriotism is decried as being 'out-dated' but it seems a fitting time for all of us to pledge ourselves anew to be more loyal and more vocal in singing the praises of this great America."

John H. Webb, mayor of Cisco — "This is a real blow to the entire civilized world. It was a regrettable incident... a sad day for the nation and especially Texas."

Crigger Paschall of Cisco, 17th district commander, Veterans of World War I — "Words cannot express the feeling of deep sorrow that is in my heart."

Winston Heidenheimer of Cisco, Legion Post commander — "The shock of the terrible thing leaves me with a heavy heart. Mr. Kennedy served us well as a citizen, a military man, and as an elected official. Perhaps his family will be able to find a small measure of comfort in this knowledge."

"We are deeply shocked at the assassination of our President," Judge Cecil Collins, of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, said. Chief Justice Clyde Grissom was out of town.

Judge T. M. Collie of the 91st District Court, had this to say: "All Texas is shocked and grieved at the tragic news of the dastardly attack on our President, and of his untimely death. That such a deed could have been perpetrated by a Texan is unthinkable, and it is to be hoped that the person

Demo Party Head Requests Opinions Of Ranger Citizens

Calvin Brown, local chairman of the Democratic party, recently was requested to submit a report on grass roots opinion of citizens of the Ranger area to Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith.

The four important questions:

(1) What is the major problem now confronting Ranger and immediate area?

(2) What do Rangerites feel is Texas' biggest problem?

(3) Do Ranger citizens favor more Federal control and financing of public education?

(4) Do Ranger citizens favor control of water resources?

"It is important that state public officials and members of the legislature know the sentiments of the rank and file of Texans," Democratic

Pecan Show Preparations Now In Progress By Ranger C of C

Preparations for the eleventh annual Eastland County Pecan show, to be held in Ranger in the Joseph building December 13 and 14, are proceeding nicely, according to Chamber manager Roy Plumley. The Ranger Chamber of Commerce, together with the County Pecan Association will sponsor the pre-Christmas affair.

The selection of the site was determined recently by a mail ballot of members of the association in which nearly

200 ballots were cast. The show has been held in Ranger for the past few years, having originated in Cisco in 1952.

The ladies of the Club will have charge of the concessions at the show. Also included in their responsibilities will be the pecan queen contest and the pecan bake contest.

The bake contest will feature pecan pies, cookies, cakes and other items which may be made with pecans and will be held in the same building as the pecan show.

Over thirty varieties of persh-shell pecans are expected to be on exhibit, besides the native seedling nut. All winners will receive ribbons. Four trophies, donated by the National Pecan Shellers and Producers Association, in Chicago will go to the grand and reserve champion exhibitors. First and second place entries of pecans will be entered in the Texas show at A&M University the following week.

In addition to the pecan and cake show there will be a centerpiece decoration contest. Table decorations of fall colors, leaves and pecans will decorate the show building with cash prizes going to the winners of the contest.

Murray Cox, farm radio announcer for WFAA, Dallas will give his noon broadcast directly from the show room on December 13, according to Eastland County Agent, J. M. Cooper.

20 Indictments Are Returned By District Court Grand Jury

A 91st District Court Grand Jury recessed Wednesday after eight days of deliberation, handing down 20 indictments, 20 no-bills and passing 18 cases pending further information.

Among the charges were at least four which are believed to name Cisco residents. Captias are now being delivered and names are being withheld pending completed delivery of the warrants.

However, it was believed that Chester E. Couch who has been charged with assault with intent to murder in connection with the shooting of Cisco Police Chief C. S. Parkinson, has been so indicted.

An indictment for murder with malice presumably names the Ranger woman who fatally shot her husband last month and is so charged.

The list of indictments is as follows:

One murder with malice; two assault with intent to murder; four thefts; three burglaries; two forgeries; two DWI (driving while intoxicated); one DWI, second offense; one rape; one assault with intent to rape; two swindlings; and one accessory to armed robbery.

The accessory indictment was believed to be in connection with the March armed robbery of Worth Food Store in Ranger, and names an Eastland man.

The rape charges result from a recent Cisco incident, it was reported.

The grand jury statement, signed by Foreman Art Fisher of Rising Star, thanked the bailiffs and officers for their assistance during the term.

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Rangers Open Cage Season Monday Night

The Ranger Junior College basketball team will inaugurate the 1963-64 season Monday, Nov. 25 at 7:30 p. m. against the Texas Wesleyan reserves.

Coach Jim Lewis and 15 members of the team have been working hard in preparation for a successful season.

The starters back from last year are: Gary Watson, 6'2" from Dallas Samuels High, high point man from last year, Dail Abies, 6'3", with a 16.0 average for last season and Scooter Palazzolo, 5'8" from Fontana, California, carrying a 7 point average over from last year. Rounding out the returning lettermen is Grant Davis 6'2", from Brewer High in Fort Worth.

Coach Lewis reports that he has not determined his starting line-up as yet, but it would include the four returning lettermen with one of the following newcomers; Freddy Marshall, 6'3" from Crockett, Tom Shaw, 6'5" from San Antonio, Jerry Chamberlain, 6'2" from Carlisle, or Richard Hooper 6' from Dallas.

(Continued from Page 1.) committing the act is not a Texan. "Our deepest sympathy and prayers are with Mrs. Kennedy and the other members of the family. "Our deepest sympathy is extended to the family of the Secret Service agent who lost his life in defense of the President. "To Governor Connally, we wish a speedy and complete recovery." County Judge Scott Bailey said: "We are shocked and saddened to learn of this untimely loss of our Chief Executive. Our heartfelt thoughts and prayers go out to Mrs. Kennedy and his loved ones. "This tragic event ranks in its infamy along with the Battle of the Alamo and the Goliad Massacre. The fact that this terrible crime happened in our State adds further shame and insult to the great injury that the United States and the Free world has suffered. President Kennedy was a brave man and had courage

MARKER FOR CAMP SALMON IS PLANNED AT EASTLAND

A Confederate Memorial Information Marker for Camp Salmon, C.S.A., will be erected this month in Eastland, according to Mr. John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical marker will stand on the Eastland County Courthouse lawn.

Camp Salmon, which guarded the Frontier during the Civil War, was located 17 miles west and 6 miles north. It was established as part of a chain of posts a day's horseback ride apart stretching from the Red River to the Rio Grande. The Texas Frontier Regiment occupied the fort which was named for Capt. John Salmon, a frontier Indian fighter and post commander. The camp was later renamed Camp McCord. Short of food, supplies, ammunition and horses, troubled with Indians, and sharing fear of the glories of the War at the cost of many lives these men served to protect the Texas Frontier.

Confederate Memorial Information Markers are erected by the State Building Commission. The TSHSC researches the subject and writes inscriptions.

Members of the State Building Commission are Governor John Connally, Attorney General Waggoner Carr and Honorable E. E. McAdams, chairman of the Board of Control.

The Camp Salmon, C.S.A. Marker is to be Texas pink granite, stands five feet high, and has the Texas star and wreath incised at the top. Placed in the public squares and along highways, these stones are designed to inform the public and contain comprehensive historical information. One-hundred and ninety-three markers have been approved this year.

This marker is part of a comprehensive program to observe the Civil War Centennial. Markers designate locations of battles, Indian raids, frontier forts, coastal fortifications, sites of manufacturing and supply, sites where

distinguished units were mustered-in, as well as graves, structures and homes of men associated with the period and counties named for prominent Texas Confederates.

County Historical Survey Committees are recording and marking the graves of Civil War Veterans. These Committees are also gathering information on each county's part in the Civil War — soldiers' letters and diaries and minutes of Commissioners Courts. This material will be placed in individual county folders in the State Archives.

The week of April 20-26, 1964, has been set aside as Texas Civil War Appreciation Week — a time for civic clubs and school programs dealing with the war. The 110 historical museums in Texas will be asked to feature Civil War exhibits. Nine Seminars are being held this year throughout the state, to encourage discussion and interest and to plan the program.

Centennial awards of merit are given each year to the authors and publishers of outstanding books on Texas in the Civil War.

The commemorative program is being planned by the Civil War Advisory Committee of the TSHSC.

"The Texas program is not designed to rekindle the Civil War but to honor the brave men who gave their lives for what they thought was right," Sheppard said. "We cannot bury this part of our history by saying nothing happened in Texas between 1861-1865."
