## City Commission Backs Motion To Move RMA

A group of Ranger citizens appeared before the City Commission Thursday night during a meeting at City Hall to protest an earlier action of the municipal body ordering that the office of Ranger Retail Merchants Assn. be removed from city premises.

A motion to that effect — with Jan. 15 as the effective date — was passed by the Commission during its Dec. 19 meeting.

Randall Johnson of Abilene acted as spokesman for the protesting citizens who requested that the Dec. 19 motion of the Commission be rescinded.

Commissioner Fred Bennett made a motion that the body rescind their earlier action, full marriage for Mayor Mor-second.

During the Thursday night meeting, the City Commission also:

Mapped plans for a meeting at the Armory on Tuesday, Jan. 14, to protest a cut-off of the local National Guard unit.

Discussed the proposed rate increase sought by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

And transacted other routine business.

Mayor Morris Newnham and Commissioners Bennett, Falls, McGown and Dr. Jones were present.

## Ranger Bank Loans Swell During Year

Although deposits were off, loans and discounts of Commercial State Bank, Ranger, showed a substantial gain over a year ago, according to a statement of the institution's condition issued Dec. 20 in compliance with the customary quarterly call.

The latest totals reveal that as of that date the bank's loans and discounts were \$1,174,000 compared to \$1,031,634 as of Dec. 31, 1962. Current figure also is an increase over the \$1,143,797 total on Sept. 30.

The bank's statement of condition — which appears elsewhere in this issue of the Times — lists deposits of \$2,642,109 on Dec. 20, 1963, compared with \$2,801,889 a year earlier.

The annual meeting of officers, directors and stockholders of Commercial State Bank will be held Monday, Jan. 13, it has been announced.

Officers of the institution, founded in 1928, are M. R. Newnham, chairman; O. D. Dillingham, president; W. F. Creager, executive vice president; Don A. Yarbrough, cashier; and Helen Dawley and Iris L. Hummel, assistant cashiers.

Directors include Creager, Newnham, Dillingham, Wilson Guest, Morris L. Newnham and Dan D. Dillingham. Commercial State Bank is a member of Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

## Phony USAF Officer In County Jail

A dapper smooth-talking 26-year-old man, posing as a captain in the U. S. Air Force, had his wings clipped in Ranger Friday afternoon when he was arrested on check swindling charges.

E. E. Dyer of Denison was arrested at 2 p. m. by Constable Ralph Veal and is being held, pending action by the grand jury.

Constable Veal said the former USAF enlisted man, who was discharged from the service in 1957, was wanted on check swindling charges in Lubbock, Duluth, Minn., and other cities.

During his stay of several days in Ranger, Dyer resided in a local hotel and a motel.

Charges initially cover three worthless checks, totaling \$65.00, at a coffee shop, two totaling \$15.00 at a drug store, and another at a hotel of \$17.50.

Constable Veal said there was little likelihood of restitution being made to those firms.

The Ranger officer also repeated his oft-published warning to local business men to be more wary and cautious in cashing checks for strangers.

The man had been released only two weeks ago from the state penitentiary after having served 16 years for murder. He listed his home as Coolidge, Texas.

Formal charges were filed against Sims in the court of Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood Friday morning and he was transferred to Eastland County jail.

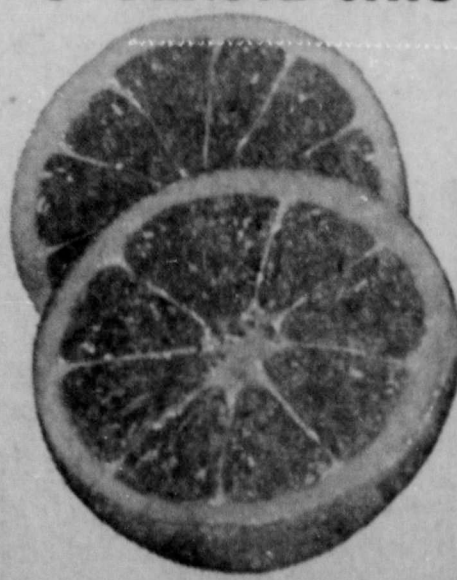

## Peace Corps Placement Test Scheduled In Area January 11

The next Peace Corps Placement Test is scheduled to be given nation-wide on Saturday, January 11 at 8:30 a. m. The non-competitive aptitude tests will be administered at 825 post offices and other federal buildings in major cities throughout the United States.

All applicants for Peace Corps service are required to take the Placement Test as well as submit a Peace Corps Questionnaire. Those who have not completed a Questionnaire will be asked to do so immediately after the testing. No applicant may take the test more than once without special permission from the Peace Corps.

Applicants should allow themselves about one and a half hours for the Placement Test. If they claim proficiency in Spanish or French they should plan an additional hour for the language achievement test — designed to test mastery of grammar, vocabulary and reading comprehension.

The Placement Test itself is composed of a 30-minute general aptitude test (made up of verbal, mathematical and spatial problems) and a 30-minute modern language aptitude test. The latter is designed to provide an indication of ones' probable degree of success in learning to speak and to understand a foreign language. Knowledge of a foreign language is not needed to score well on this aptitude test, nor required for entrance into the Peace Corps.

There are no passing or failing marks on the Placement Test. The scores are used, along with other criteria, to aid in the selection process. They help the Peace Corps to place prospective Volunteers in the most appropriate overseas assignments.

## Texas Land Use Pattern Changes Noted By State

**COLLEGE STATION** — Urbanization is having its effects upon the pattern of land use in Texas. Land in urban areas, cities and densely populated suburbs, accounted for 2,501,000 acres in 1959 compared with only 733,000 acres in 1945, reports Gerald F. Vaughn, Extension rural-urban affairs specialist.

Texas had more land in urban areas in 1959 than any other state and more cities with 100,000 or more population (11) in 1960 than any other state except California with 14, Vaughn adds. He points out that Texas cities favor elbow room. Houston, for example, with a 1960 population about equal to Baltimore, contained 328 square miles or four times more area than the Maryland city. In fact, he adds, Houston has larger in land area than New York City.

The urban population of Texas increased from 4.8 million to 7.2 million between 1950-60. This tremendous jump has brought on added problems and shifts in land use in the developing areas, he says.

Along with the population growth, Vaughn points out other land shifts. Land used for highways, railroads and airports outside cities increased from 1,151,000 acres in 1945 to 1,501,000 acres in 1959. Rural parks and wildlife areas increased from 790,000 to 1,502,000 acres and national defense areas from 773,000 acres to 972,000 acres during the same period.

On the other hand, the acreage of cropland remained stable over the period, 30.2 million compared with 30.6 million acres. Pasture and grazing land increased slightly from 95.3 million to just under 103.1 acres during the 1945-59 period. Farm and non-farm woodland acreage dropped from 35.7 million acres to 24.3 million and miscellaneous land uses, such as marshland, desert, and bare rock areas amounted to a few thousand acres to round out the state's total land area of 168,218,000 acres.

These shifts in land use, Vaughn says, are affecting agriculture and rural living in the developing areas, some of which are miles from cities.

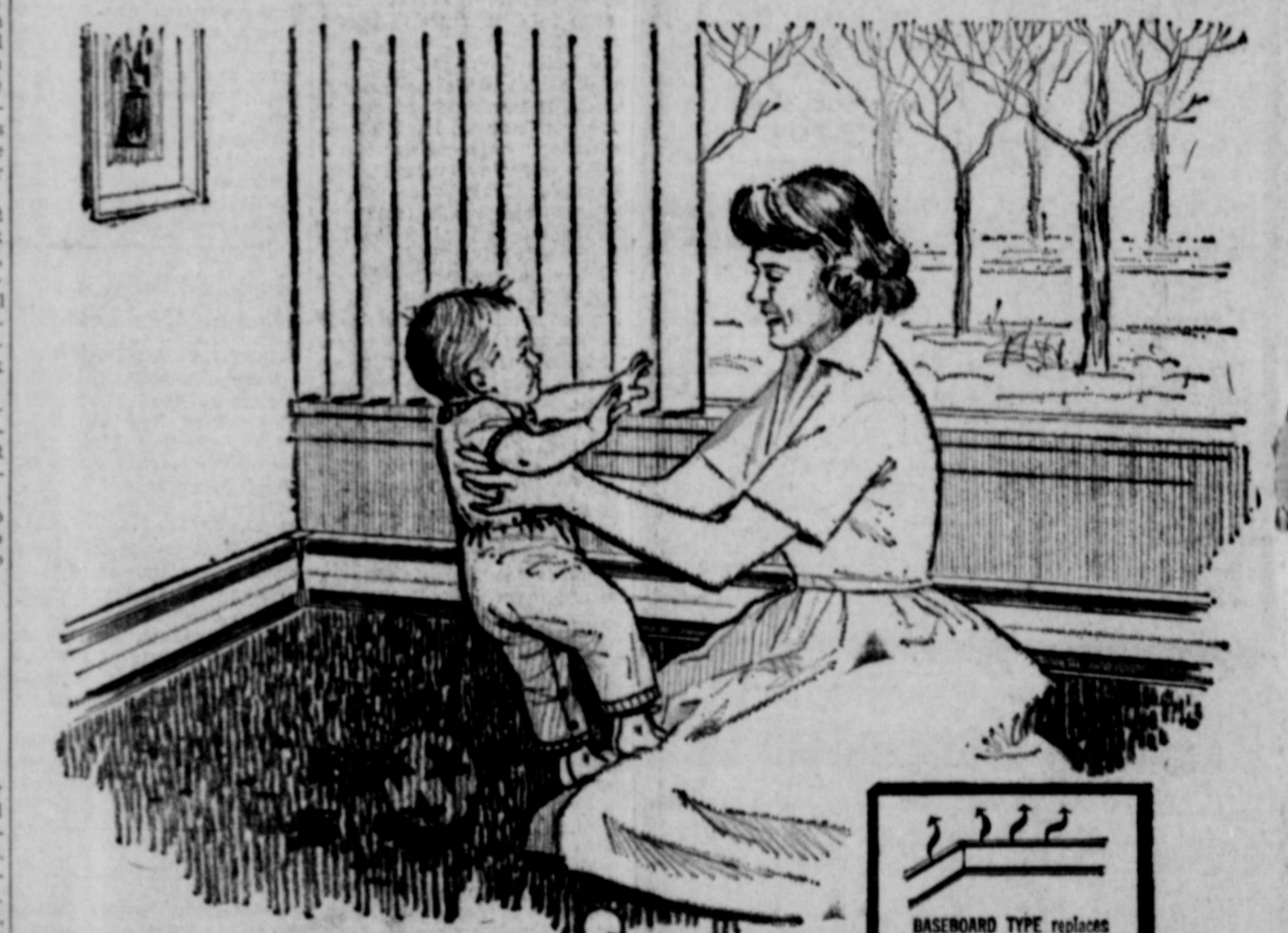
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
