WTU Customers In Baird Placed On "Cycle Billing"

Baird electric customers are being placed on "cycle billing," Larry Cheshier, local manager for West Texas Utilities Company, has announced.

This means that instead of trying to read all electric meters in one round each month, the readings will be divided into two cycles, about two weeks apart.

The first cycle of readings were completed this past week and bills were mailed Friday, November 14, Cheshier said. Bills for the next cycle will be mailed next week.

The result is that customers in the first

cycle will receive bills for approximately four weeks of energy use, while customers in the second cycle will receive bills for about six weeks use.

After this initial series of billings, all meter readings will be spaced about one month apart.

The area covered in Cycle One billing extends roughly from Fourth Street back to First Street; from the east side of Eugenia back to Cherry, and includes everything northeast of the creek. Cycle Two is everything north of Fourth Street and west of Eugenia.

Lone Star Gas To Raise Several Customers In Putnam Area

The Railroad Commission today approved new gas rates proposed by Lone Star Gas Co. for the unincorporated areas near Putnam, Callahan County.

However, changes in service charges sought by Lone Star were suspended 120 days.

The new rates, which are identical to the rates now in effect in the City of Putnam, were authorized by Chairman John Poerner and Commissioners James E. (Jim) Nugent and Mack Wallace

during the weekly conference on Gas Utilities Division matters.

An average residential bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas will increase from \$22.77 to \$27.72, affecting nine customers. Gross annual revenues of Lone Star will increase by \$812.

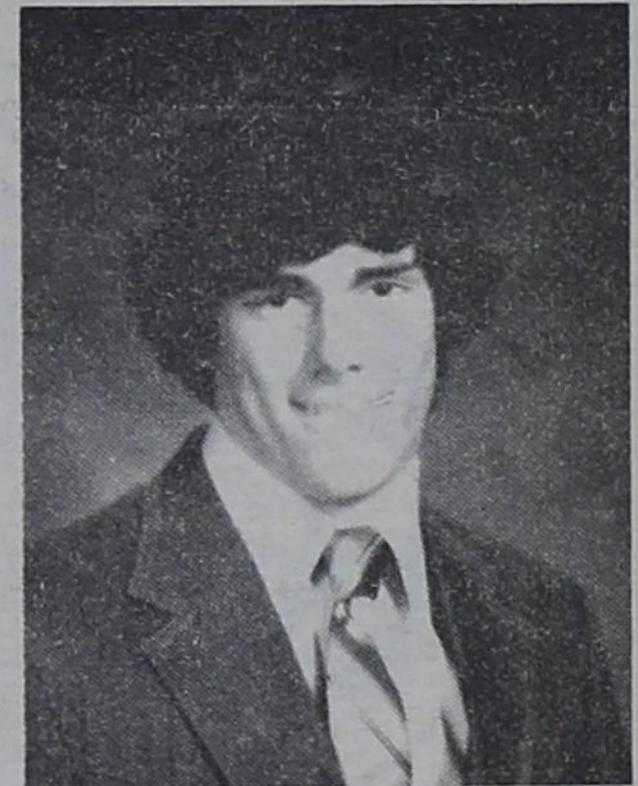
The proposed service charge changes range from \$2.50 to \$15 for three items. New charges of \$5 for returned checks and \$40 for customer yard line repair are sought by the applicant.

Eleven Callahan County 4-H members were recently named to the all-state and all-district skeet team in various divisions of the 1980 Texas 4-H Trap and Skeet Postal League, according to H.T. Davison, 4-H & Youth Specialist and coordinator of the 4-H Shooting Sports Project.

In the senior division, Mike Hicks of Clyde, Glenn Chrane and David Nichols of Oplin were named to all-state and all-district. In the junior division, Steven Mitchell of Baird, Wade Parker and Randy Chrane of Oplin were named winners. In the subjunior division, Steve Ellis was chosen to the all-state and all-district

team. Named to all-district were Mark Ellis, Marty Parker and Richard Nichols of Oplin. In the junior division, Melissa Chrane of Oplin was named to all-district.

In making the announcement, Davison said that these Callahan County 4-H'ers were selected based on shooting scores during June, July and August.

The state Postal League was organized by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Participants' scores were mailed in monthly by each of the

164 competitors.

Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent, said that the League was enjoyed by all participants and that it complemented the local 4-H shooting sports project.

He said that the shooting sports project has many avenues of participation besides just shooting. These avenues include participation in club meetings and activities, demonstrations, public speaking, project record keeping, record book awards program and competitive events.

Students Produce Traffic Safety Filmstrip

Fourth grade students in Joan Vestal's class at Baird Elementary school have produced their own colorful filmstrip on traffic safety with materials provided free of charge by the Traffic Safety Section, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

In "The Safest Show on Earth," class members create their own illustrations for a full color, sound filmstrip exploring key aspects of passenger, bicycle and pedestrian safety.


Brock Watson, Troy McWhorter, Richard Swan, Ben Mendez, and Russell Robbins.

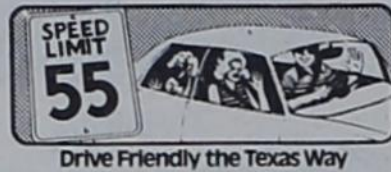

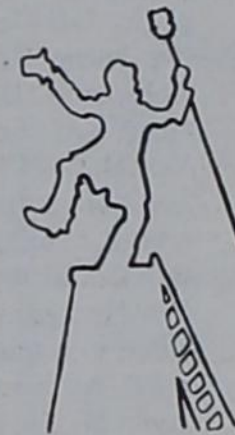

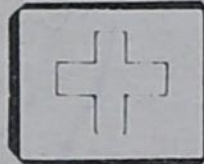
