





JAIL-BREAK ATTEMPT - What could have become a serious situation ap parently was averted by the discovery of this jail-break attempt at Eastland County Jail this week. Photos, taken by Jailer John Shook shows, at left, the debris used and taken from a hole in the upper level of the north wall. Circled is a window weight apparently used as a ramrod, and the boards are those taken from windows. At right is tthe actual hole closeup - some 12 inches deep into the 16-inch wall. The work was done, Shook reports, during the time he was away from the jail assisting as a field deputy and while his wife was alone at the jail in charge of prisoners. At the time of the attempted breakout there were some ten persons in the jail and the inmates carefully cleaned up the area, putting the broken plaster and bricks on top of the upper "tank" and pasting white paper over the hole, to prevent detection. Mrs. Shook, who spends many hours a week at the jail while Shook is out, said that she repeatedly heard a "tap-tap" but would not go into the tank area alone, although she does have to feed the prisoners through a trap-door daily.


