Steve Brockman of Nazareth was awarded the Lions Club plaque at the regular meeting of the club Tuesday, as the outstanding farmer of Castro County in 1950. Brockman was selected for the signal honor because of his extensive soil conservation and fertilization work. The necessity of preserving the productivity of the fine soil in our county is being emphasized in every way possible and is bearing fruit throughout the county with an ever increasing number of farmers applying for soil conservation measures to their farming operations. Brockman was introduced to the Lions by Barber Eubanks, chairman of the Castro County Soil Conservation District Board of Directors. Brockman made only a few remarks following the presentation of the plaque, but all of the Lions were convinced when he had finished speaking that the plaque had been presented to an outstanding farmer. Among other things, Brockman declared that the farm he is now operating, that the place was practically free of weeds with the exception of a few small ones. He said that he soon found out why the weeds were small. The soil had not been properly cultivated and had been depleted to the point where even weeds wouldn't grow. ## Two Farms Taste Fury of Tornado

A small tornado spent its fury on two farms in the west edge of the Flagg community Tuesday at about 6:30 p. m. during the rainstorms that brought moisture to Castro County and the Panhandle. While tending to his farm chores early Tuesday evening Truett Boothe saw the tornado dip down on the Glen Youts farm just southwest of the Boothe farm where it levelled small buildings, a windmill and badly damaged a large quonset barn and moved a four-room residence from its foundation. Boothe rushed into his home, gave the alarm, and he and his wife and children drove away in their car just before the tornado struck their home. The tornado was travelling in a northeasterly direction and at the Boothe farm all outbuildings, barns, windmill were demolished, while the new modern residence was only slightly damaged. After leaving the Boothe farm the tornado travelled only a short distance before it lifted and disappeared. An estimate of the damage to the property on the two farms has not been made.

## Local Farmer Is Seriously Injured In Farm Accident

For the second time in recent weeks a near tragic accident has occurred on Castro county farms. Monday afternoon, at about 7:00 o'clock, Mr. E. H. Smith, 35 years of age, was seriously injured while working with the irrigation well motor on the Solon Clements farm southeast of Dimmitt. While Smith was manipulating the clutch lever on the well motor a mechanical defect caused the clutch mechanism to break apart and burst through the housing while the motor was turning at high speed. Broken parts from the clutch and clutch housing were hurled against Smith's body and head. As a result of the accident Smith sustained a badly lacerated forehead and a badly broken left arm, between the elbow and shoulder. He was rushed to the Plains Memorial Hospital for treatment.

Smith is an employee of Messrs Raymond Akens and George Edwards who operate the Clements farm. The well and equipment where the accident occurred is all new and had just recently been installed.

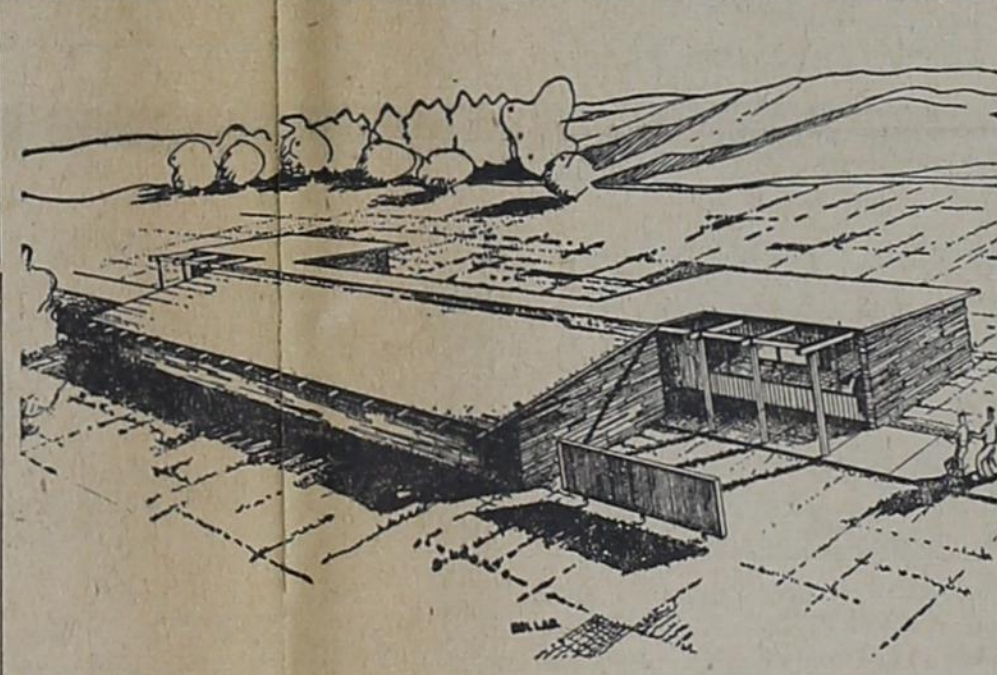

A tour of rabbit projects here in Dimmitt revealed that seven club members owned a total of 225 rabbits. Breeds represented included New Zealand Whites, New Zealand Reds, French Fox, Angora and the Chinchilla.

These rabbits make excellent 4-H projects for boys in town that do not have the room to care for larger animals, and at the same time they are projects that can be profitable as well as educational.

## Father of Mrs. M. E. Cleavinger Dies At Home In Plainview

Rev. William A. Hitchcock, 68, father of Mrs. M. E. Cleavinger of Dimmitt, was found dead in his home at 1201 West Eleventh Street in Plainview Tuesday morning. He was a superannuated Methodist minister.

According to reports he was apparently in good health when he retired Monday night. Members of the family discovered he was dead about 7 o'clock.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon at the Plainview First Methodist Church. Rev. W. E. Peterson, the pastor, Rev. L. N. Lipscomb, former Plainview District Methodist superintendent, and Rev. Marvin Boyd, present superintendent, officiated.

Born July 6, 1882, in Bastrop County, Rev. Hitchcock was ordained as a minister at Memphis, Texas, and served in charges of the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference until 1943. He was pastor at Hale Center when he was superannuated and moved from there to Plainview.

He served charges at Texline, Crosbyton, Perryton, Panhandle, Claude, Throckmorton, Stratford, Spearman, Miami, Sudan and Hale Center during the 28 years of his ministry.

He and Miss Flora Penner were married in Lamar County December 14, 1902. She is among the survivors. They are the parents of ten children all of whom survive.

Grocery stores were required to be in full compliance by May 14, with the new beef regulations at all levels effective, from the slaughterer to the retail stores. However, retailers of beef have until June 4 to post ceiling prices on beef.

All businessmen are invited and urged to consult with the OPS representatives when they are in the area for price clinics. The agency is seeking voluntary compliance with all regulations.

## Drouth-Breaking Rains Fall Over Area This Week

Following a continuous wind-storm of several days duration, rains of drouth-breaking proportions fell over Castro County and practically all the Panhandle area Tuesday and Wednesday. According to M. A. Kelly, who reads the rain gauge at the courthouse, there had been 4 of an inch of rain at 9:15 Tuesday morning, but the total had reached 2.7 inches at 9:40 Wednesday morning. There was enough rainfall during the day Wednesday to bring the total well above the 3 1/2 inch mark. A late reading of the court house gauge was not available late Wednesday afternoon however.

The rains Tuesday and Wednesday were general over the county in varying amounts. The Hart area received 2.50 inches or more, Big Square reported 1.50 inches, the rain gauge at the Edwin Ramsey farm east of Dimmitt registered 3.60. Cecil Crum reported 6 inches at his farm northwest of Dimmitt, while Norman Cleavinger reported that approximately 6 inches fell at his farm just across the Castro-Lamb County line.

With the exceptions of a few showers during the winter, this is the first appreciable moisture received here since last September when the last wet cycle came to a close.

A number of farmers, especially on irrigated farms, had planted considerable cotton acreage which due to the rains, will need to be replanted. With the ample moisture provided by the rains this week for a planting season it is believed that spring planting will be resumed at capacity just as soon as fields are dry enough to permit tractors to be resumed.

LATER A Girls High school to 35 inches in this immediate vicinity bring the total precipitation to 3.65. General rains also fell Wednesday and Wednesday night over the county and throughout the most of the Panhandle-Plains area.

Our girls are known for their brilliance on both ends of the court. Our girls played 42 games this year and lost two of these. A nice record.

Track is just in its third year in the class system this year, and Dimmitt is among the top in the state. We had a very strong and well balanced track team and it looks like they will have another one in 1952. They won second place in the state and set a new state record in the mile relay. We never will forget those four boys—all top athletes.

We'll always remember what good teachers we had this year. We won achievements in every field. We don't remember a teacher we had who did not teach purely for the love of teaching. We learned that these were the best kind. We had one of the finest teaching systems in the area. Our teachers taught us a lot of things: more than just the subject they taught. They were all "psychologists" or something, for they knew how to help us out any way we needed help.

Another very important characteristic of Dimmitt is the people. They supported us so enthusiastically that it was finally taken for granted that Dimmitt had the best fans in the entire state. For example Dimmitt had more people at the Girls State Basketball Tournament than any other town in Texas. That's the kind of people we had backing us.

Thank you, Dimmitt, for your faith and interest in us. We will always be proud of Dimmitt and DHS. We can hold our heads up and look anyone straight in the face. You have helped to put in our hearts and minds the memories of our youth—lest we forget.

## Bobcat Tales Is Given An Award Of Achievement For Year's Work

The 1950-51 Bobcat Tales was given a rating of high esteem this week by the Interscholastic League Press Conference when they were presented a certificate for the Award of Achievement. This is the first time the Bobcat Tales has been judged, and received this award along with six other Texas class A high school papers. The other six papers to receive the Award of Achievement were the App "Tigers Tale"; the Diboll "Pine Echo"; the Llano "Buzz"; the Missouri City "Mustang"; the Newton "Eagles Eye"; and the Ganado "Tomahawk".

Four ratings are given in the judging: The Award of Distinguished Merit, the Award of Honor, the Award of Achievement, and the Award of Merit. Most of the papers getting into the Distinguished Merit and Honor Award bracket are veterans in the ILPC, such as the White Deer "Buck's Tale" and the Panhandle "Panther Screams."

A letter of explanation of awards, from UIL Journalism Director Bluford B. Hestir, was received with the certificate from which the following statements are quoted:

"The old method of quartering the state, and assigning so many of each type of award to each conference in each quarter has been done away with. Instead, the papers of each conference are judged for the state as a whole, making it possible to recognize the outstanding papers in each classification, regardless of whether or not they are concentrated in any given area. Formerly, you will remember, it happened occasionally that the limitation on the number of awards within each conference in any given quarter of the state prevented recognition of all the really outstanding papers in that area.

"Further, the new system has adopted four new award certificates, instead of two. These are now the Award of Distinguished Merit, for the highest classification in each conference; the Award of Honor, for outstanding publications of only slightly less general excellence; the Award of Achievement, for special progress or achievement during the year; and the Award of Merit, for worthy service to the school for which the paper is published.

"The general caliber of journalistic work shown in the 225 member papers of the ILPC is very high—and continues to improve each year. Papers receiving lesser

awards may feel certain that it took truly outstanding publications, with well-rounded excellence, to be rated above them. You, as staff members for your paper during 1950-51, are to be congratulated for contributing to the generally very fine level of work done by ILPC member staffs this year."

There were four classified papers in Class A in the Panhandle. These are the Dimmitt "Bobcat Tales," the White Deer "Buck's Tale," the Panhandle "Panther Screams," and the Lafors "Pirate."

### Health Talks . . .

If the bug family of rod-shaped germs were compared to the Three Bears, the bacteria would be Daddy Bear, the virus would be Baby Bear and the rickettsial would be Mama Bear, about midway between Daddy and Baby Bear.

These rickettsial germs get around to mankind mainly by means of ticks, lice, mites or fleas as these insects feed upon persons or animals who have disease and then latch on to you. Rat fleas spread the rickettsial disease known as murine fever, and ticks are the source of such diseases as Rocky Mountain spotted fever, Q fever and Bullis fever.

Typhus fever is frequently confused with typhoid fever, both in name and in symptoms of the disease. They are two distinct illnesses, however, with the most common distinction perhaps in the rash that they produce; with typhoid when the rash breaks out, it stays broken out when you push on it; with typhus the rash turns white and disappears for a moment when you push the skin in.

You have a real bad headache with typhus fever, a headache that lasts the whole two or three weeks of the disease. It's the

kind of headache that makes you want an ice cap on your head all the time and since you usually run a pretty high fever that may lead to delirium, the ice cap is a good idea. In addition to bed rest and such treatment as might relieve the aching head, your doctor will probably prescribe one of the new medicines such as aureomycin to carry you through typhus with minimum discomfort. There isn't much danger of any complications with typhus if sensibly treated and one good thing about the disease is that once you've had it, you're immune.

Spotted fever, sometimes called by its full name of Rocky Mountain spotted fever, is more serious illness than typhus and in time past has had a high death rate. The new drugs have not only cut down on the complications which can arise from spotted fever but also seem to be cutting clear down on that mortality rate.

Spotted fever is caused by tick bites and is common all over the world. You usually get sick very suddenly with this disease, just developing awful headache, muscle and joint aches, shaking chills and fever, hurting eyes, upset stomach and maybe even blindness, your hair suddenly falling out. You have a high fever and you do feel real sick. The rash from which spotted

fever gets its name usually appears after the second day of the illness, first breaking out around the wrists and ankles and then spreading all over the body, even on the palms of the hands and soles of the feet.

Since ticks are more common in rural areas than in town, spotted fever is more common in the country. Every tick is not infected, of course, but knowledge of a recent tick bite, followed in 2 to 14 days by a sickness such as described above would perhaps speed up your doctor's diagnosis and permit him to start treatment early.

Wood ticks, rabbit ticks, dog ticks, and the Lone Star tick which is often called the cattle tick are the brands which spread spotted fever by their bite.

The Lone Star tick also carries around the rickettsial germ that causes Q fever, a disease much milder than spotted fever and without a rash. The Lone Star tick can infect cattle with Q fever and the germ may be carried to humans through the raw milk from an infected cow even though the cow doesn't seem to be ill. That's why pasteurization of milk is so essential.

Q fever epidemics have occurred among those in contact with cattle such as dairymen, packing-house, slaughterhouse, and laboratory workers.

Though some of the symptoms of spotted fever may also mark Q fever, they are usually much milder; Q fever nearly always has some of the symptoms of pneumonia accompanying the dis-

ease, such as chest pains and cough.

Bullis fever flared up at Camp Bullis during the training of servicemen for World War II. Those afflicted with the disease were invariably from other parts of the country. The Lone Star tick was considered responsible for this inhospitality to visiting servicemen, which laid them up with fever ranging from 102 to 105 degrees for about a week or two and then went away.

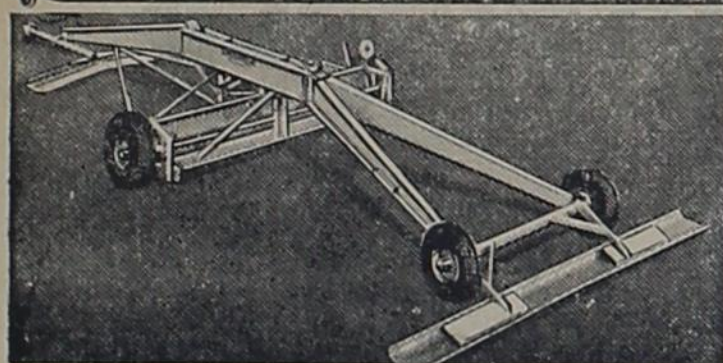

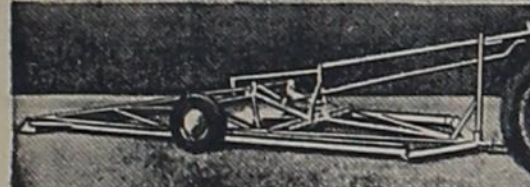

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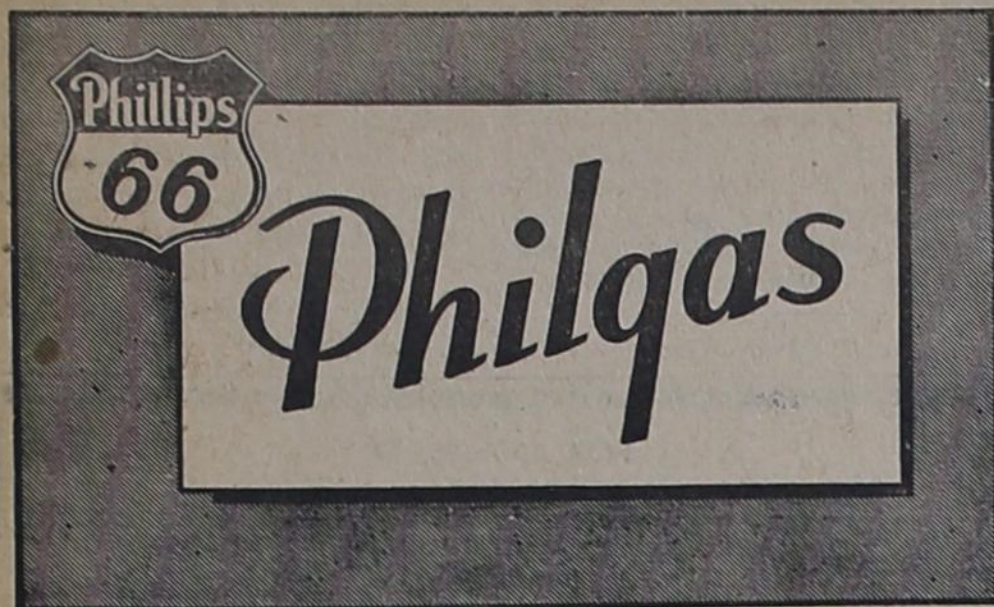

Research Farm**

Livestock and poultry feeders from this locality including Mr. and Mrs. Jack Gregory were recent visitors at the Ralston Purina Research Farm at Gray Summit, Missouri.

The 738-acre farm demonstrates normal, average farm conditions and the visitors were shown how grade animals and poultry can be raised profitably under typical conditions. Among the practical operations inspected were the hog farrowing and fattening units, the dairy cattle project, dry lot and show calf feeding, broiler installation, laying flocks, ducks, turkeys, rabbits, dogs, goats, game birds and fur bearing animal units.

Following the day long farm tour, the visitors were entertained

at the general offices of the Ralston Purina Grain Company in St. Louis and the next day toured the Research Laboratories and saw how various types of chows are manufactured in the St. Louis Purina Mill.

**Marvelous Brownies**

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour

Bake 25 to 30 minutes (be sure not to overbake them). Brownie tops should still be soft when touched with your finger. Cool right in the pan, then cut into neat squares. They will taste dreamy to your dream man served with a scoop of vanilla ice cream on top, or even just plain.

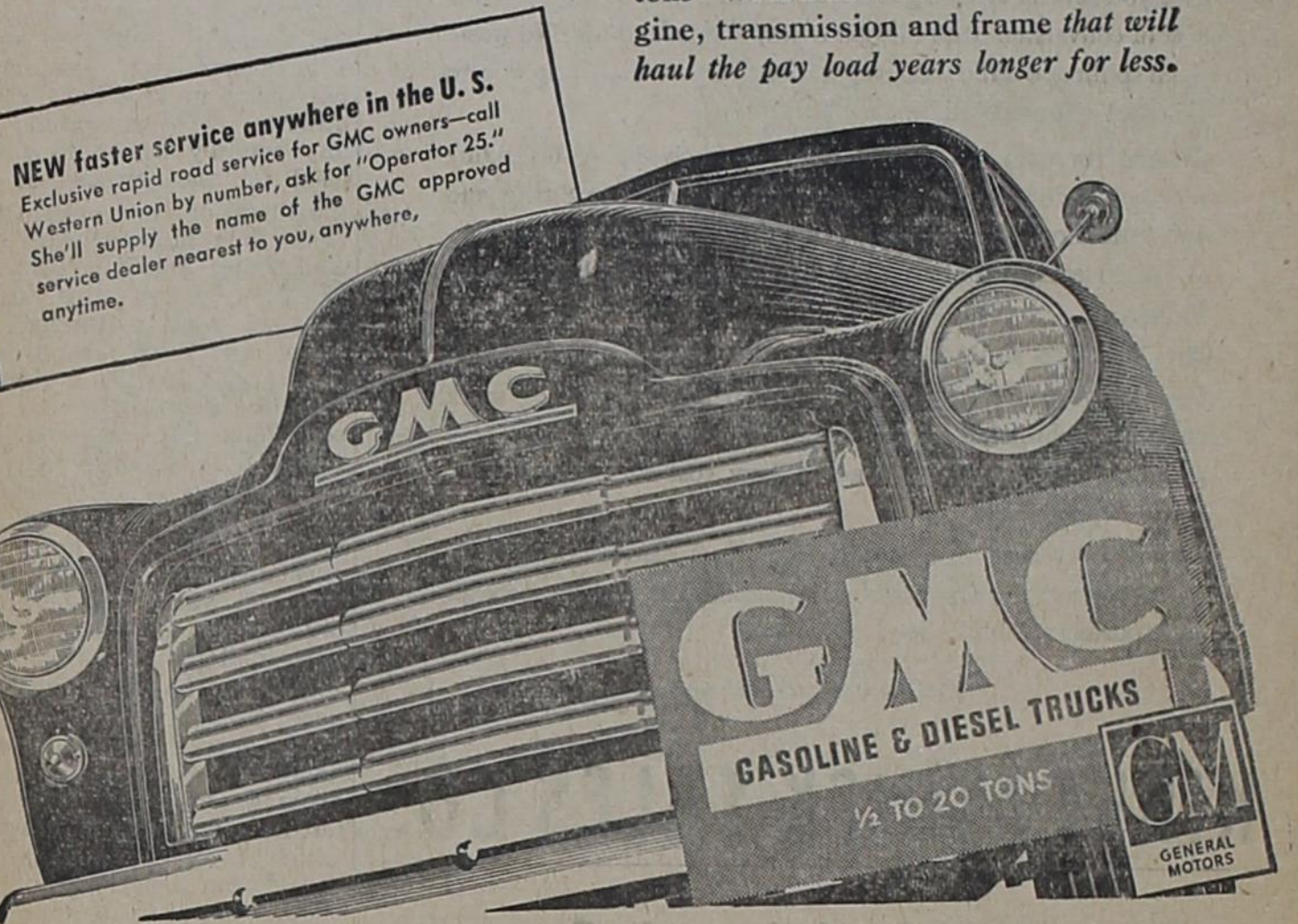

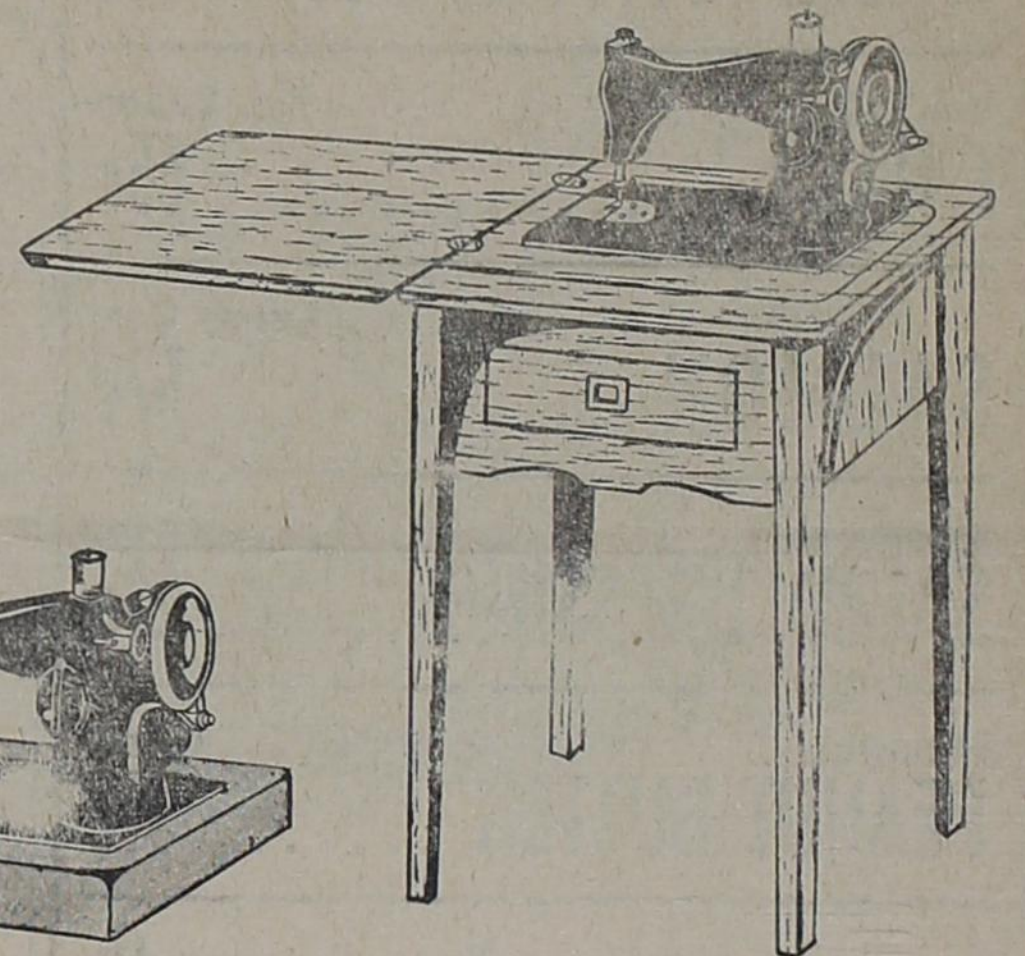

# WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

(By Congressman Walter Rogers)

Washington, D. C.  
May 11, 1951

You will recall that a few weeks ago I told you that a showdown with England was long overdue and should not be very far in the future. Events in the past few days have confirmed that information and the work of Congress toward that end. This will develop measurably and will in my opinion result in England recognizing the folly of her ways and in cleaning her own linen. If she fails to do this, you may well expect some effective and immediate action by the Congress in addition to the legislation that this week passed the Senate. Trade with China by countries accepting aid from this country is the most intolerable thing I have ever heard of, and India can certainly expect this point to be raised and prosecuted fully when the question of sending food grains to India comes before the House. If I have my way, this country is not going to furnish food or any other material or commodities to any country where they may be used for the purpose of spilling the blood of our youth. Certainly there is a humanitarian problem concerning starving peoples, but in my opinion this must be weighed from a realistic standpoint, and so far as I am concerned will be so weighed. The question of whether or not to send food grain to India could be much more serious than realized at first glance. Whether this is to be a grant or is to be paid for by India will be a hotly debated question. This operation, if carried out, would involve an expenditure of approximately 200 million dollars by this country, whether it be on a grant or loan basis. You will recall that in most of the loan transactions we have had with other countries, the notes are still unpaid. The Committee on Veterans' Affairs of which I am a member, is now considering legislation that would be of great benefit to many disabled veterans and their dependents, to the widows and children of veterans and to dependent parents of veterans. Some reasonable benefits could be afforded these people by an additional expenditure of less than 200 million dollars, and in many cases would mean the difference between some of these people living in poverty or having enough to eat, even a sufficient amount to wear. In this period of definite economy trends on the part of Congress many of us could well be driven to an absolute choice between sending the grain to India or providing these small additional benefits to these folks who are the victims of wars. I am wondering what the people would want me to do in such a case. I think I know, but I would like to hear from you on the question. I will tell you frankly that the choice would not be too hard for me; I would help the veterans.

**APPROPRIATIONS:** The departments, board, bureaus and

agencies are becoming greatly concerned over the many sizable cuts that the House is making in non-defense appropriations. Many of these appropriations bills have been amended on the House floor to provide that for every four employees who are released by a department during the coming fiscal year only one employee can be replaced. This simply means that if a department loses 100 employees during the fiscal year, there will only be 25 that can be employed to take the place of these 100. This is intended to stop the growing Federal payroll, and although it is not as effective as I would like to see it, it is at least a step in the right direction. It was placed on legislation by former Congresses but has always been taken off before final passage of the appropriations bills. Whether or not it will remain in the law upon final passage by this Congress, I do not know, but I will say there is going to be a terrible fight before it is taken out.

**VISITORS FROM THE PANHANDLE:** Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford was in the office this week. He was in Washington attending a meeting of the National Wheat Growers Association. These people, as well as most wheat farmers in the Panhandle, are disturbed, and rightfully so, about the green bug situation. I have discussed this matter with the Department of Entomology in the Department of Agriculture and tried to impress upon them the seriousness of the problem. There has been only one man from the Bureau of Entomology working on this program and I have insisted that additional men be assigned to the work. I am afraid that most of the people of this country are failing to understand what could happen to the breadbasket if this problem is not solved. This is certainly a problem that is of vital importance to national defense. I do want you wheat farmers to give me all the information that you have concerning the problem because we do not want to leave one stone unturned.

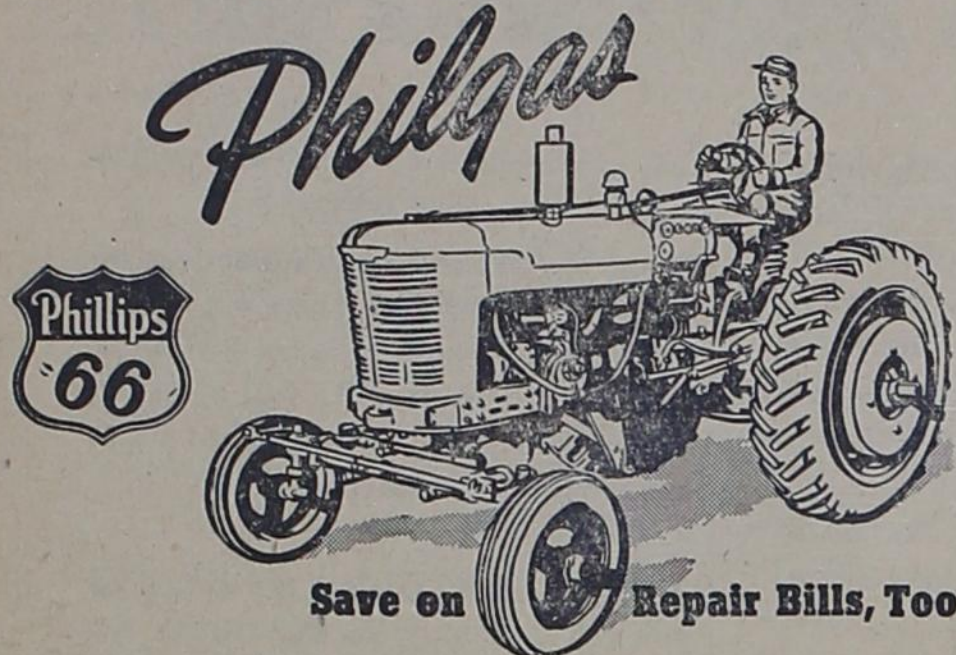

### OUR FAVORITE RECIPE

#### Real Lemon Meringue Pie

- 1 nine-inch baked pie shell
- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 5 tablespoons flour
- Few grains salt
- 1/2 cup lemon juice (about 4 lemons)
- 1 1/4 cups boiling water

Bake a 9 inch pie shell. Separate eggs and beat yolks until slightly foamy (save whites for meringue). Stir 1 cup sugar into

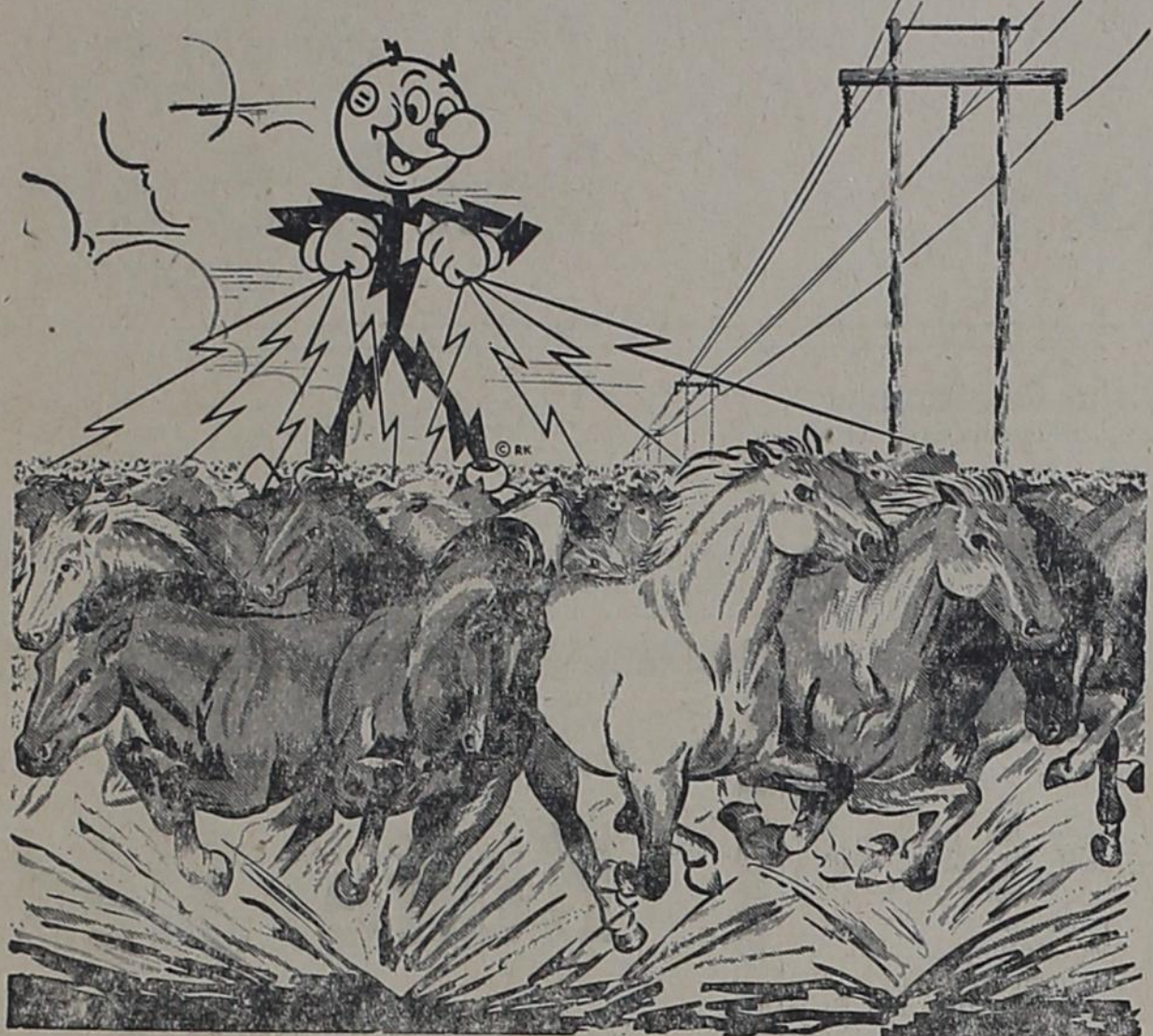
the beaten yolks very gradually, beating constantly. Now stir in the flour and salt until smooth, then pour in lemon juice and mix thoroughly. Add the boiling water last. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until the filling is smooth and thick as mayonnaise (takes about 20 minutes). Cool before pouring into pie shell.

Start your oven at 325°F or slow and beat up the meringue like this: Beat egg whites until they stand in peaks but are not dry-

looking, then gradually beat in the remaining 1/2 cup of sugar until smooth and satiny (hard beating is one of the secrets for successful meringue). Pile meringue over pie filling carefully, making sure rim of pie is sealed with meringue, and bake 20 to 25 minutes or until meringue peaks are tipped with gold.

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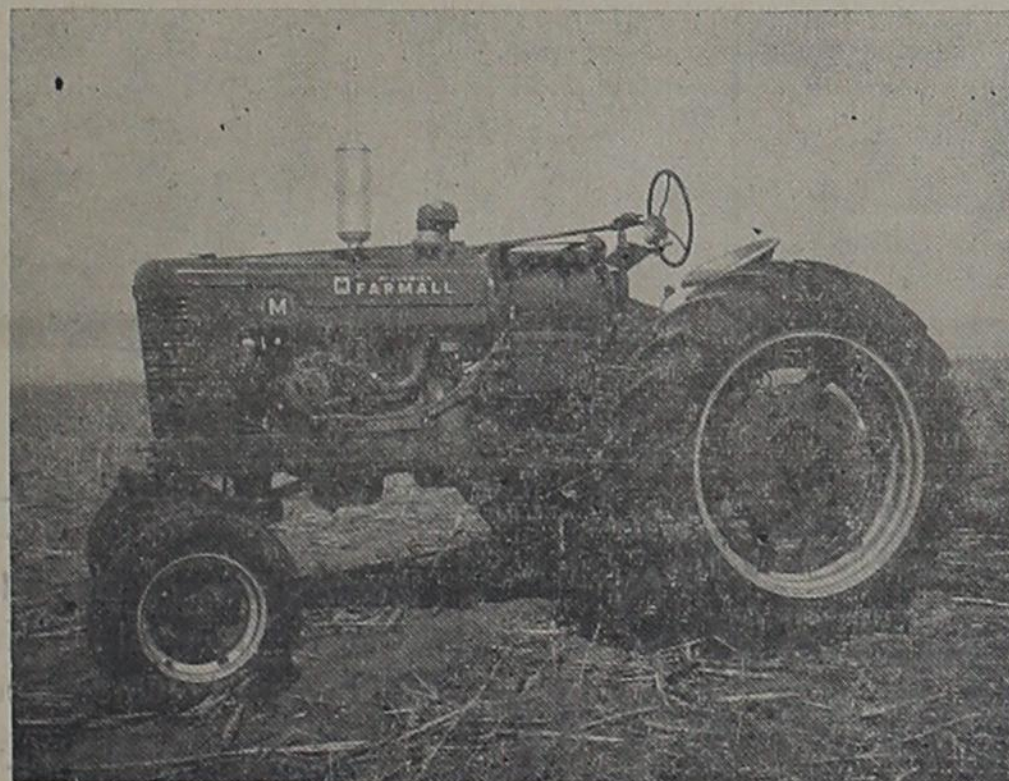

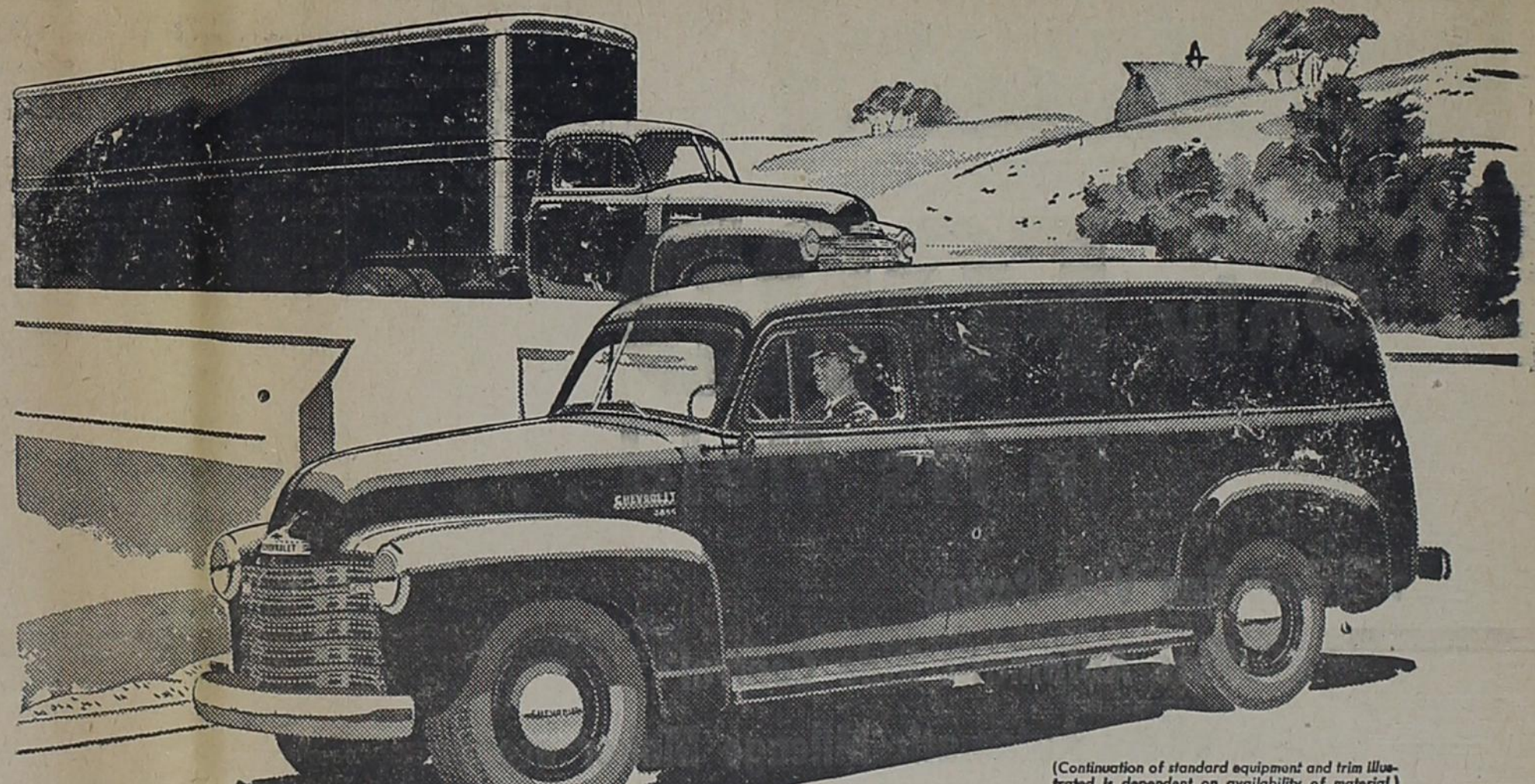

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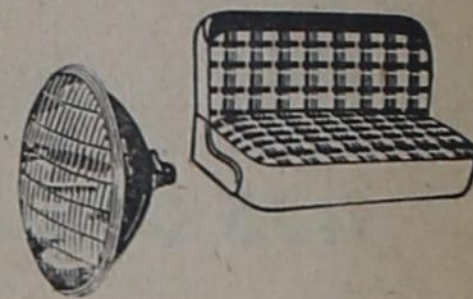

Place strawberries in baked shell. Spread with frosting. Brown in moderate oven (350), about 15 minutes.

2 egg whites  
1 1/2 cups suar  
1 1/2 teaspoons light corn syrup  
or 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar  
1/3 cup cold water  
Dash of salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Place all ingredients except vanilla in double boiler; mix thoroughly. Cook, beating constantly with rotary or electric beater until mixture forms peaks, about 7 minutes. Remove from heat; add vanilla; beat until of spreading consistency.

**STRAWBERRY PRESERVES**  
4 cups strawberries  
5 cups sugar  
Put berries and sugar in pan and slowly heat until sugar is melted. Turn heat up and boil 12 minutes. Skim, and let cool. Put in jars and seal with paraffin. Another method to make the preserves is 4 cups berries, 4 cups sugar, juice from 1/2 lemon, using the same method cooking etc.

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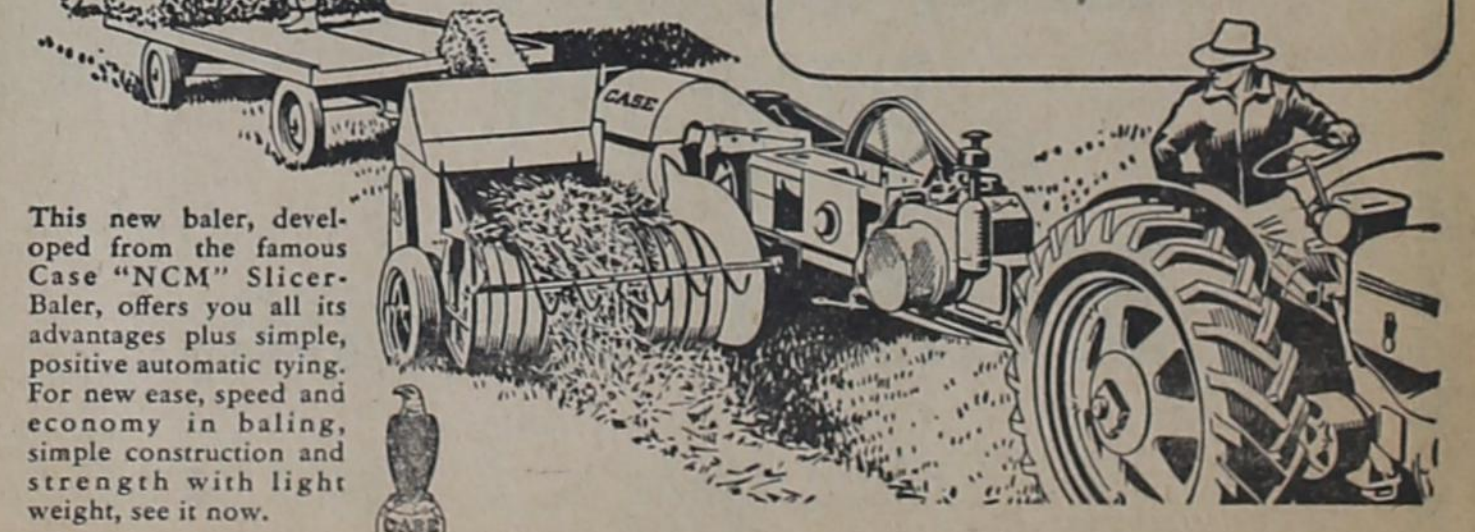
