ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 7 .- While not withholding praise for American spirit of lesiring to do things, the Bourse Gasette today expresses gratification that "President Roosevelt's idea of calling a seace conference to the accompaniment of the thunder of cannon has apparently shipwrecked.'

"We hope," the Gazette says, "that this will induce the American journals to give up the discussion of unsolicited intervention in the Russo-Japanese war in any shape or form. It is a mistake to suppose we are no longer in the same po sition as in 1897, when he had the open enmity of Austria and could not rely upon the friendship of Germany. The attitude of Austria, Germany, France and Italy is no longer cause for anxiety. No one knows when the war will end. There will come a time when Japan will be confronted with the might of the whole Russian nation. Then she will meet the fate of Genghis Khan."

Claim of Dog Catcher Against the City Runs Over Six Hundred Dollars for the Time He Has Served

IT COMES UP TONIGHT

Council Will Decide Whether Catching Under the Expense Which Has Developed—Is One-half of Tag Revenue

Dog catching is an expensive luxury and the city officials are beginning to thank that it should be placed in the same class with the "sport of kings."

This opinion is a recently acquired one and is directly due to he official bill of the city dog eatcher, which will come before the city council tonight. If this bill is approved the city for its dog experience will be exactly \$692.

A bill for this amount was presented to the city secretary several days ago, and by him referred to the city auditor. Auditor Nunnally, however, found nothing on the records fixing the amount of compensation the dog catcher was to receive and therefore has not put his O. K upon the bill. Now it is supposed the bill is in the hands of the street and alleg committee, into whose hands was placed the matter of naming the dog catcher and

fixing his compensation. The bill as presented by the catcher. J. F. Moss, is itemized, showing a claim of 80 cents each on 1,200 dog tags sold and a claim of a like amount upon each of 184 dogs killed. As the dog catching did not commence until September 20, this bill covers little more than two weeks' chasing of the elusive cur.

At the rate it will be seen the dog tax can scarcely be a source of renue to the city, the total income from the sale of
